STATE OF IDAHO.

Idaho is one of the newest states in the union in its comparative development. There is an abundance of evidence that the development and equipment of farm lands, industrial life, private homes and the state institutions of Idaho is more modern and satisfying to the normal, sturdy citizen than can be found in a similar developed area in older states. The following table indicates something of the rapid growth and development of Idaho during the past several years:

The consistent, rapid growth as shown by these tables must indicate that Idaho has a just claim to the slogan "The 'growingest' state in the Union." The reason is easily understood. The mining industry, which gave the state the first employment and wealth, has produced constantly and consistently. Investors operate upon well-defined lines and have largely eliminated speculative uncertainty.

The live stock upon the open ranges furnished the first agricultural development. Earnings from the mines and ranges have built comfortable homes, business blocks, established banks, built railways, sawmills and constructed gigantic irrigation enterprises.

Agriculture, as applied to all domestic farm products, will always be the state's greatest wealth producing resource. Closely allied is agriculture as related to the forests of the state.

Mining and the range herds will continue to be important affiliated industries that furnish profitable employment to large numbers and will yield even larger financial returns in the future. Manufacturing is making steady progress. Transportation is now having its greatest growth. With the further development of the Columbia-Snake River water course, more regular boat service will be established to Lewiston, Idaho, which is the most interior seaport of the entire northwest. The district is destined to become of vast strategic importance in transportation matters.

Most of the larger development enterprises have had the guiding influence of a pioneer hand. This always inspires confidence with outside

The topography of the state varies greatly and accommodates many needs. The lowest elevation is 600 feet and exceeds 13,000 feet in the high mountainous districts. The lower elevations allow a long grazing season and comparatively mild winters which permit the growing of tender varieties of fruits and nuts.

HORTICULTURE.

The horticultural division of agriculture has had a remarkable development during the past few years. The apple crop is yielding very profitable returns chiefly because of the superior natural environment for this crop. Southwestern Idaho has become one of the world's chief prune producing districts. Other fruits are extensively grown but the apple and prune are the principal fruit crops.

GENERAL AGRICULTURE.

Diversified farming as applied to general agriculture will always be the state's chief source of wealth. With the vast acreage of irrigated lands and the rapidly enlarged area that is being brought under cultivation by applying dry-farming methods, it is freely predicted that Idaho, within a few years, will be producing not less than four times the present yield of wheat, or about 60,000,000 bushels annually which is more than is being produced in any one state at the present time. Live stock upon the farms is increasing in a satisfactory way. Range cattle, however, have decreased in number. The live stock industry will yield the largest returns of any one branch of agricultural pursuit. The unusual amount of superior grazing furnished by the domestic pastures, particularly under irrigation and the regulated cheap grazing available in the National Forests and upon state lands will continue to support vast numbers of range stock.

MINING.

Idaho has for many years been an important lead and copper producing state. Producing properties yielding practically all of the precious metals are found in practically all parts of the state, but the largest properties are found in the northern part.

IRRIGATION AND POWER.

Co-ordinate with the development of the great irrigation systems, several large hydro-electric power plants have been installed which generate great quantities of electricity which is widely distributed over extensive transmission lines. It is fitting and proper that the natural waters

of our lakes and streams should furnish the town and farm homes with the most important factor in modern comfort,—electricity. The following table indicates something of the development of irrigation farming. Very great progress has also been made in the districts where irrigation is not needed,—particularly on the cut-over lands in the northern part of the state.

STATE AND SECTARIAN EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.

The State of Idaho has made liberal provision for those of her youth who, having completed the primary, intermediate and high school courses desire to continue their education.

Almost a quarter of a century ago the legislature of what was then Idaho Territory established the University of Idaho, locating the institution at Moscow in Latah county.

An Agricultural Experiment Station, co-operating with the United States Department of Agriculture, is now an important adjunct of the University School of Agriculture. Branch experiment stations are conducted at Clagstone, Caldwell, Gooding and Aberdeen.

The high standard maintained and the strong faculty employed has given the University a place of high rank among similar institutions in other states. Our young men and women are enabled to fit themselves for engaging in the professions, arts and trades. The success that has attended our university graduates who have gone forth is testimony of the efficiency of the institution.

Dr. K. C. Babcock, specialist in Higher Education in the United States Bureau of Education, says of our State University: " * * * The University of Idaho surprised me by the excellent quality of its equipment in buildings, grounds and laboratories. * * * The quality of the faculty is surprisingly good, both as to training and experience. Conditions are such that it has a better degree of stability than have several other of the State Universities of the west. * * * "

The number of students enrolled in the university for the year 1912-1913 as shown by the December (1912) report was 709. This enrollment represented seventeen states and two foreign countries.

Idaho supports two state normal schools, one at Lewiston and one at Albion. These schools are well equipped, and offer exceptional advantages for preparation to the young man or the young woman who expects to engage in the profession of teaching.

The Academy of Idaho, located at Pocatello, the Idaho Industrial Training School at St. Anthony, and the State School for Deaf, Dumb and Blind at Gooding are other state educational institutions with excellent records.

In addition to the various state institutions of learning, there are scattered throughout the state many schools supported by various churches. Among these are the College of Idaho (Presbyterian) at Caldwell, St. Margaret's Hall, (Episcopalian) at Boise, Ricks Academy (Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints) at Rexburg, and the Academy of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (Catholic) at Coeur d'Alene. The Methodist church has in contemplation plans for the establishment in the state of a high grade college. If these plans materialize this institution will in all probability be located at some point in the southern part of the state.

IDAHO COMMERCIAL LAWS.

Prepared especially for this publication by Luther W. Tennyson, of the Boise City Bar.

Acknowledgements may be taken within the state at any place, by a Justice or Clerk of the Supreme Court; within the city, county or district, for which the officer was elected or appointed, a judge or clerk of a court of record; a County Recorder, a Notary Public, or a Justice of the Peace. Without the state, but within the United States, and the jurisdiction of the officer; a justice, judge or clerk of any United States, State, or Territorial Court of Record; a commissioner appointed by the Governor; a Notary Public, or any officer having authority under the laws of the state or territory where the acknowledgment is taken. Without the United States, a Minister, Commissioner, Charge d'Affairs, a Consul or Vice-Consul of the United States resident and accredited where taken. Judge of a Court of Record of the county where taken. Commissioner appointed by the Governor, or a Notary Public. Deputies may take in the name of their principals. A conveyance or incumbrance of the homestead, or that part of the community property occupied or used by the husband and wife as a residence, is void unless acknowledged by the wife.

ACTIONS—Common law pleading abolished and Code system adopted.

ARREST—(Civil)—Defendant may be arrested in action for recovery of money or damages arising upon contract, where he is about to depart from State, with intent to defraud creditors, or when action is for wilful injury to person, character or property, knowing property to belong to another; in action for fine or penalty, on promise to marry, or for property or money embezzled, or fraudulently misapplied, or converted to his own use by a public officer, or an officer of a corporation, attorney, factor broker, agent or clerk, in the course of his employment, as such, or by any other person in a fiduciary capacity; or for misconduct or neglect in office or in a professional employment, or for a wilful violation of duty; in an action to recover possession of personal property unjustly detained when the property or any part thereof has been concealed, removed or disposed of to prevent its being found or taken by the sheriff. When defendant has been guilty of fraud in contracting the debt or incurring the obligation for which the action is brought, or in concealing or disposing of the property, for the taking, detention or conversion of which the action is brought. When the defendant has removed or disposed of his property, or is about to do so, with intent to defraud creditors. Affidavit showing existence of necessary facts and bond required.

(Federal Statute on Bankruptcy abrogates State law.)

NEGOTIABLE INSTRUMENTS—What is known as the "Uniform Negotiable Instrument Law" is operative in the State of Idaho.

ATTACHMENTS—May issue in all actions upon judgment or contracts for the direct payment of money, unsecured by mortgage or lien upon real or personal property, or if so secured, when such security has without any act of the plaintiff or person to whom the same was given, become valueless; also in all cases in an action upon a judgment or contract against a non-resident. No showing of fraud is necessary. Affidavit must be filed and undertaking given before writ issues. Any creditor of a defendant may share prorata with the attaching creditor by starting suit and prosecuting the same to final judgment within 60 days after posting of notice of attaching creditor.

CHATTEL MORTGAGES—A mortgage of personal property is void against creditors, or subsequent purchasers or incumbrancers of the property in good faith, unless:

First. It is accompanied by the affidavit of the debtor that it is made in good faith and without any design to hinder, delay or defraud creditors.

Second. It is acknowledged, as grants of real estate, and the mortgage, or a true copy thereof, is filed for record with the County Recorder where the property is located.

No personal property of either husband or wife, that is by law exempt from execution, shall be mortgaged by either husband or wife without the joint concurrence of both.

GIVING OF WORTHLESS CHECKS AND DRAFTS—Any person who shall in payment of any debt in whatsoever manner contracted give any check or draft upon any bank or banking association wherein such person shall not have sufficient funds for the payment of the same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not to exceed five hundred dollars or imprisoned in the county jail not to exceed six months, or both such fine and imprisonment.

SALE AND TRANSFER OF STOCKS OF GOODS IN BULK.

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of every person, who shall bargain for or purchase any stock of goods, wares or merchandise in bulk, for cash or credit, to demand and receive from the vendor thereof, and if the vendor be a corporation, then from a managing officer or agent thereof, at least five days before the consummation of such bargain or purchase, and at least five days before paying or delivering to the vendor any part of the purchase price or consideration therefor, or any promissory note or other evidence of indebtedness therefor, a written statement under oath containing the names and addresses of all of the creditors of said vendor, together with the amount of indebtedness due or owing, or to become due or owing, by said vendor to each of said creditors, and if there be no such creditors a written statement under oath to that effect; and it shall be the duty of such vendor to furnish such statement at least five days before any sale or transfer by him of any stock of goods, wares or merchandise in bulk.

Sec. 2. After having received from the vendor the written statement under oath mentioned in Section 1 of this Act the vendee shall, at least five days before the consummation of such bargain or purchase, and at least five days before paying or delivering to the vendor any part of the purchase price or consideration therefor, or any promissory note or other evidence of indebtedness for the same, in good faith notify or cause to be notified, personally or by wire, or by registered letter, each of the creditors of the vendor named in said statement, of the proposed purchase by him of such stock of goods, wares or merchandise; and whenever any person shall purchase any stock of goods, wares or merchandise in bulk, or shall pay the purchase price or any part thereof, or execute or deliver to the vendor therefor or to his order, or to any person for his use any promissory note or other evidence of indebtedness received from his vendor the statement under oath as provided in Section 1 of this Act, and without having also notified or caused to be notified all of the creditors of the vendor named in such statement, as in this Section prescribed, such purchase, sale or transfer shall, as to any and all creditors of the vendor, be conclusively presumed fraudulent and void.

Sec. 3. Any vendor of a stock of goods, wares or merchandise in bulk, who shall knowingly or wilfully make or deliver, or cause to be made or delivered, any false statement, or any statement of which any material portion is false, or shall fail to include the names of all of his creditors in any such statement as is required in Section 1 of this Act, shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished accordingly.

Sec. 4. Any sale or transfer of a stock of goods, wares or merchandise out of the usual or ordinary course of the business or trade of the vendor, or whenever thereby substantially the entire business or trade theretofore conducted by the vendor shall be sold or conveyed or attempted to be sold or conveyed to one or more persons, shall be deemed a sale or transfer in bulk, in contemplation of this Act: Provided, That nothing contained in this Act shall apply to sales of executors, administrators, receivers or any public officer acting under judicial process.

Sec. 2792. Every corporation not created under the laws of this State must before doing business in this State, file with the County Recorder of the County in this State in which is designated its principal place of business in this State a copy of the Articles of Incorporation of said corporation duly certified to by the Secretary of State of the State in which said corporation was organized, and a copy of such Articles of Incorporation duly certified by such County Recorder with the Secretary of State, paying to the latter the same fees as are provided by law to be paid for filing original Articles of Incorporation, and must within three months from the time of commencement to do business in this State, designate some person in the county in which the principal place of business of such corporation in the State is conducted upon whom process issued by authority of or under any law of this State, may be served, and within the time aforesaid must file such designation in the office of the Secretary of State, and in the office of the Clerk of the District Court for such county, and a copy of such designation certified by either of said officers, must be evidence of such appointment; and it is lawful to serve on such person so designated any process issued as aforesaid, and such service must be deemed a valid service thereof. Such notice and designation of agent on whom process may be served, shall run from the time of filing same as herein provided, until his successor is appointed by such filing, or said office becomes vacant by resignation filed by such agent in the office in which his appointment is filed, or by his death, or removal from such county; and in case of such vacancy of said corporation shall within sixty days thereafter refill said office as herein provided. No contract or agreement made in the name of, or for the use or benefit of such corporation prior to the making of such filings as first herein provided can be sued upon or be enforced in any court of this State, by such corporation, and such corporation cannot take or hold title to any realty within this State prior to making such filings, and any pretended deed or conveyance of real estate to such corporation prior to such filings shall be absolutely null and void; and any and all officers, agents and representatives of said corporation, or persons claiming to be officers or agents of the same, who shall make or attempt to make any contract or agreement or contract any indebtedness in the name of such corporation or for its use and benefit, before such original filings are made, or while such corporation is in default, upon filing a reappointment as therein provided, shall be jointly and severally personally liable upon and for all such contracts and agreements as principal contractors. Every such corporation which fails to comply with the provisions of this section shall be denied the benefit of the Statutes of the State limiting the time of the commencement of civil action, and any limitations in such Statutes shall

only run in favor of any such corporation during such time as such person duly designated, as aforesaid, upon whom such service can be made shall be within the State: Provided, further, that such foreign corporations complying with the provisions of this section shall have all the rights and privileges of like domestic corporations, including the right to exercise the right of eminent domain and shall be subject to the laws of the State applicable to like domestic corporations.

COURTS—Justice's Court has civil jurisdiction up to \$300; Probate Court has civil jurisdiction up to \$500. District Courts are courts of general jurisdiction.

DEEDS—Deeds must be signed by grantors, or attorney in fact authorized in writing and proved or acknowledged, and recorded in the office of the Recorder of the county where the property is situated. Husband and wife must join in the execution of all conveyances of community property. Deeds given to secure a debt are treated as mortgages.

Dower and Courtesy are abolished.

Wife may convey her separate property without signature of husband.

EXECUTIONS—May issue at any time within five years from rendition of judgment. One year is allowed debtor for redemption of real estate. Judgments docketed in the office of the Clerk of the District Court are liens upon real estate of debtor in the county for five years.

EXEMPTIONS—Homestead to the value of \$5,000, by head of family, to value of \$1,000 by any other person may be selected by written instrument duly acknowledged and recorded; chairs, tables, desks, books to the value of \$200; household furniture, including sewing machine, stoves and beds to value of \$300; wearing apparel, pictures, six months' provisions, two cows and hogs, with their calves or pigs; farming utensils to the value of \$300; team, harness, wagon and six months' feed; water right of 160 inches; crops growing or grown on fifty acres of land cultivated by debtor; mechanics' or artisans' tools to value of \$500; professional instruments, libraries and office furniture; miner's cabin to value of \$500; his implements to value of \$200; prospector's saddle and pack animal and implements to value of \$250; team, vehicle and six months' feed of drayman, peddler, physician or clergyman; debtors' earnings for thirty days, if necessary for family; homestead association shares worth \$1,000; life insurance purchasable yearly premium of \$250; arms required to be kept by law, and one gun. No article exempt on judgment recovered for purchase price.

INTEREST—Legal rate, seven per cent; contract limit, twelve per cent; usury forfeits all interest and costs to creditor and renders debtor liable to forfeiture to school fund of ten per cent per annum on the entire principal, whether part payments have been made or not. Innocent indorsee protected. Compound interest is not allowed, and is held usurious by Supreme Court.

JUDGMENTS—Executions on may issue at any time within five years years date; are a lien on realty of debtor for five years.

LIMITATIONS—Involving real property, five years; on judgments and actions for mense profits of real estate, six years; written contracts, five years; oral contracts, accounts, etc., four years; for relief on ground of fraud or mistake three years.

MARRIED PERSONS—All property acquired by either husband or wife after marriage, except as hereafter mentioned, is community prop-

erty. The husband has the control and management of the community property, and it is liable for his debts but he shall not sell, convey or encumber the community real estate unless the wife join with him in executing the deed or other instrument of conveyance by which the real estate is sold, conveyed or encumbered. Property owned before marriage by the husband or wife, or acquired after by gift, devise or descent, or that she shall acquire with the proceeds of her separate property is separate property. Wife's separate property not liable for husband's debts.

Sec. 2. During the continuance of the marriage the wife has the management, control and absolute power of disposition of her separate property, and may bargain, sell and convey her real and personal property, and may enter into any contract with reference to the same in the same manner and to the same extent and with like effect as a married man may in relation to his real and personal property; provided, that the husband shall be bound by such contracts to no greater extent or effect than his wife under similar circumstances would be bound by his contracts.

Sec. 3. A woman may, while married, sue and be sued in the same manner as if she were single; provided, that except in actions between husband and wife, the husband shall not be chargeable in any manner with the wife's costs or other expenses of suit.

MORTGAGES ON REAL ESTATE—Must be executed and recorded in the same manner as deeds, and foreclosed by action in the District Court.

POWER OF ATTORNEY—Must be signed, acknowledged and recorded as conveyances of real estate; if realty is dealt with, of married woman relating to her separate property, need not be signed by her husband. May be revoked by an instrument executed in the same manner.

REDEMPTION—Land sold on execution or foreclosure one year, sixty days each for each subsequent redemption, but within the one year.

Reviver of action only by written instrument.

STAY OF EXECUTION—Only after appeal taken, by an undertaking to pay judgment.

IDAHO FISH AND GAME LAWS.

(Synopsis Acts of Legislature, State of Idaho, March 11, 1909, and March 9, 1911.)

Section 1. The administration of the Idaho Fish and Game Laws is delegated primarily to the State Fish and Game Warden, whose duty it shall be to protect the fish and game in this state and enforce the laws relating thereto.

Sec. 2. The State Fish and Game Warden has power to divide the state is not to exceed six (6) districts, and he may appoint one chief deputy and as many assistant chief deputies as he may deem necessary, not exceeding, however, one assistant chief deputy for each of the districts so created, and he shall also have the power to appoint one or more deputies, as the emergency may demand, in any of such districts.

Sec. 3. The State Fish and Game Warden is authorized and directed to maintain fish hatcheries for the purpose of hatching, propagating and distributing food and commercial fishes, and for the purpose of distributing game birds and such game animals as can be raised on the premises occupied by said hatcheries.

Sec. 4. It is unlawful for any person to wantonly waste or destroy any of the fish and game of this state in violation of the laws. Any person, association or corporation may establish or own a private park, lake or stream for fish, game, or both, on premises owned by him or it, respectively, and may preserve and propagate such fish and game, which will be protected by the Game Warden. Such fish and game may be used by the owner as he may see fit, but he will not be entitled to sell the same out of season, and such owner will be surrounded by the same restrictions for shipping as those fishing and hunting in public domains of the state. It is a misdemeanor for anyone to ship fish or game without a license, and express, railroad and other transportation companies or common carriers are forbidden to receive any fish or game for shipment unless they are presented with a duplicate of such licensed shipping permit.

Sec. 5. It is unlawful for any person or persons to catch or kill any species of fish whatever, in any of the streams, rivers, lakes, reservoirs, or waters of this state with any seine, net, spear, weir, fence, basket, trap, gillnet, dip-net or any other contrivance; except that salmon may be taken from the Snake River from Lewiston, Idaho, as far up stream as Shoshone Falls, and in the Clearwater River as far up stream as the same is meandered, except from April 15th to June 1st of each year, and fish may be taken from the waters of Bear Lake except between April 1st to June 1st.

Fish may be caught with a hook and line attached to a pole or held in the hand at any time of the year, except that trout must not be caught in any manner between the first day of April and the first day of May of each year.

Salmon may be caught or speared on a snag hook not less than four (4) inches in length.

It is unlawful to catch any kind of fish through the ice at any time of the year except from Bear Lake and Pend d'Oreille Lake, and in the latter lake it shall be lawful to fish through the ice for white fish only.

It shall be unlawful to fish within three hundred feet of a fish ladder in any stream.

The amount of fish taken from the public waters of the state is limited to twenty (20) pounds of trout, bass, cat-fish, greyling or sun fish in any one day, and all persons are forbidden to have more than (30) pounds of fish in their possession at any one time. It is unlawful to take black bass or trout, from any of the waters in the state, less than four (4) inches in length, and the possession of such fish is a misdemeanor.

Sec. 6. It is unlawful to deposit sawdust or chemicals or any other substance that will or may tend to destroy or drive away the fish from any stream, or to kill any fish by the use of poison or deleterious drugs, or by the use of an explosive substance.

Sec. 7. It is against the law to kill, ensnare, trap or destroy any English, Chinese or Mongolian pheasants, prairie chickens or pinnated grouse in the state of Idaho. Quail are protected, except between the first day of November and the first day of December, and it is unlawful to kill more than eighteen (18) in any one day, and they cannot be sold at any time. Partridge, pheasant or grouse must not be killed or destroyed except between the 15th day of August and the first day of December, and north of the Salmon River the same must not be killed except between the first day of September and the first day of December, and not more than twelve (12) of these birds shall be killed in any one day.

The closed season on wild duck, goose, snipe and plover is between the first day of February and the first day of September of each year, and no more than twenty-four (24) ducks, snipes or plover, or four geese shall be killed in any one day, and it is unlawful to kill or destroy any species of swan at any time in the state of Idaho for a period of five years from March 9th 1911. Sage hen or turtle dove may be hunted or killed between the 15th day of July and the first day of December except in Fremont County, and in that county they may be hunted or killed between the 15th day of August and the first day of December, and not more than twelve (12) sage hens or twenty-four (24) turtle doves shall be killed in any one day.

It is unlawful for any person to kill more than twenty-four (24) birds in any one day, or to have in his possession more than twenty-four (24) birds of any kind at any one time.

Sec. 8. Moose, buffalo, antelope, beaver or caribou shall not be killed within the state of Idaho at any time.

It is lawful to hunt or kill deer, elk, mountain sheep or mountain goat only between the first day of September and the first day of December of each year, except that elk may be killed in the counties of Fremont and Bingham (or in such territory as was included in these counties on January 1st, 1911) from September 1st to December 31st. Deer may be killed within the counties of Bonner, Kootenai, Shoshone, Latah, Nez Perce, Clearwater and Idaho only between the 20th day of September to the 20th day of December of each year, and in these last named counties elk shall not be hunted or killed for a period of five years from the date this act takes effect. Trapping any deer, elk, mountain sheep or mountain goat by means of pitfall, trap, snare or other means is forbidden at all times, and the use of dogs to hunt, chase or capture any of the animals herein mentioned is forbidden at all times.

Females may hunt or fish without a license, but every male must have a license before he can fish or hunt, and must be over twelve (12) years of age. A license for a bona fide resident of the state is \$1.00 to be paid any Justice of the Peace, deputy or state game and fish warden. The license will state the name and place of residence of the person holding the same and must not be transferred.

A non-resident must pay \$25.00, which will entitle him to hunt and kill any kind of big or small game. For \$5.00 a non-resident will receive a bird license, which will permit him to hunt and kill such number of each kind of birds as is stipulated in the license. For \$2.00 a non-resident may receive a license which will permit him to fish with hook and line in any of the streams or public waters of the state. All licenses have a synopsis of the game laws on the back thereof.

Sec. 9. It is unlawful during the open season of the year for any person to kill more than one elk, two deer, one mountain sheep, one ibex and one mountain goat. All licenses issued state all animals that may be killed. The license entitles the holder to ship within the state under the direction of the game warden. It is unlawful for any person or corporation to sell any fish or game protected by this act.

Sec. 10. Transportation companies or common carriers and their employees are forbidden to receive for shipment any game or fish killed in violation of the provision of this act.

Sec. 11. Song birds are protected, and the destruction of any birds of this nature is forbidden by law except the English sparrow, black bird, magpie and bee bird.

Sec. 12. It is the duty of the State Game Warden and all deputies appointed under the provisions of this act, and every sheriff, deputy sheriff, city marshal, constable and police officers within their respective jurisdiction in the state of Idaho to enforce all the provisions of this act, and such officers are constituted ex-officio game wardens for their respective jurisdiction.

Sec. 13. It is made the duty of the State Game Warden and his deputies to see that all the provisions of this act are enforced, and they, together with the officers named in section twelve (12) are given authority to arrest without a warrant any person or persons found violating the same.

Sec. 14. A proper fishway must be maintained at the head of every irrigation ditch or canal for the purpose of preventing the fish from entering the same.

Sec. 16. It is a misdemeanor to store or receive for storage any game or fish within the state except during the open season when the same can be stored only by the person lawfully in possession thereof. Any game warden, constable, or any officer of the law may at any time seize and take into custody any game or fish or any portion of the same that have been killed or taken unlawfully.

Sec. 17. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this act will be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall (except where a special penalty is provided) be fined in a sum not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$300.00 and the cost of the prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not to exceed six months, or may be punished by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 23. Any officer neglecting to do his duty shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

IDAHO MINING LAWS.

(Abridgement of the Mining Laws of the State of Idaho. Locating Claims.)

Mining claims hereafter located upon veins or lodes of quartz, or other rock in place bearing any of the metals or other valuable deposits mentioned in section 2320, of the Revised Statutes of the United States, may extend to three hundred feet on each side of the middle of the vein or lode; provided, that when the locators have set, posts or monuments, to indicate the line of the vein, ledge or lode, such stakes, posts or monuments must be taken for the purpose of such location, to mark correctly the line thereof, and such line must not afterwards be changed so as to affect rights acquired or interfere with any locations made subsequent thereto.

The locator, at the time of making the discovery of such vein or lode, must erect a monument at such place of discovery, upon which he must place his name, the name of the claim, the date of discovery and distance claimed along the vein each way from such monument. Within ten days from the date of discovery he must mark the boundaries of his claim by establishing at each corner thereof, and at any angle in the side lines, a monument, marked with the name of the claim and the corner or angle it represents; also at the time of so marking his boundaries he must post at his discovery monument his notice of location, in which must be stated:

1. The name of locator.
2. The name of the claim.
3. The date of discovery.
4. The direction and distance claimed along the ledge from the discovery.
5. The distance claimed on each side of the middle of the ledge.
6. The distance and direction from the discovery monument, to such natural object or permanent monument, if any such there be, as will fix and describe in the notice itself, the location of the claim.
7. The name of the mining district, county and state.

Within sixty days after such location, the locator or his assigns, must sink a shaft upon the lode to the depth of at least ten feet from the lowest part of the rim of such shaft at the surface. And of not less than sixteen square feet area. Any located claim upon which work has been done in compliance with the above requirements is not, unless abandoned, subject to relocation for a period of ninety days from and after the date of location.

Within ninety days after the location of the claim the locator or his assigns must file for record in the office of the county recorder of the county or of the deputy recorder of the mining district in which the claim is situated, a substantial copy of his notice of location.

Within sixty days after any time set or period allowed for the performance of labor, or making improvements upon any lode, or placer claim, the person in whose behalf such work or improvement is performed, or some person for him, must make and record an affidavit in substance as follows:

State of Idaho: That such expenditure was made by, for, or at the expense of.....owner of said claim, for the purpose of holding said claim and all stakes, monuments or trees marking boundaries of said claims are in proper place and positions.

The fee for administering the oath and recording the foregoing affidavit, when taken before the county recorder or deputy mining recorder shall be fifty cents. Such affidavit, or a certified copy thereof in case the original is lost shall be prima facie evidence of the performance of such labor.

The location of abandoned claims shall be done in the same manner as if the location were of a new claim; but the locator may instead of sinking a new discovery shaft, sink the original discovery shaft ten feet deeper than it was at the time of his location.

No location notice shall claim more than one location, whether the location is made by one or several locators, and if it purport to claim more than one location it is absolutely void.

For the convenience of prospectors and locators, the County Recorders of the several counties must appoint a deputy at any place where he may deem is necessary, and at all places more than twenty miles distant from an existing office whenever ten or more mining locators interested, petition for the appointment of a deputy. Upon failure of any recorder to appoint a deputy for ten days after the petition in writing has been presented to him, the resident miners in such district may appoint temporarily one of their number to act as the recorder for the district.

It is the duty of the County Recorder to forward within fourteen days to the Deputy Mining Recorder of the district where the claim is located, all location notices, both quartz and placer, not already recorded in such district, and the Deputy Mining Recorder shall record all such notices in his records and return the same to the County Recorder.

Placer claims, as mentioned in section 2329, of the Revised Statutes of the United States, may be located for the purpose of mining deposits and precious stones after the discovery of such deposits.

The locator of any placer mining claim located for the purpose of mining placer deposits or precious stones, must at the time of making the location, place a substantial post or monument as is required in the location of quartz claims at each corner of the location, and must also post on one of the same a notice of location containing the date of the location, the name of the locator, the name and dimensions of the claim, the mining district (if any) and county in which the same is situated. Within fifteen days after making the location, the locator must make an excavation upon the claim of not less than one hundred cubic feet, for the purpose of prospecting the same. Within thirty days after the location, the locator must file for record in the office of the County Recorder of the county, or of the Deputy Recorder of the mining district in which the claim is situated, a substantial copy of his copy of notice of location, to which must be attached an affidavit such as is required in the case of quartz claims.

At or before the time of presenting a location notice for record, whether it be for a quartz or placer claim, one of the locators named in the same must make and subscribe an affidavit, in writing on or attached to the notice, substantially in the following form, to-wit:

I,, do solemnly swear that I am a citizen of the United States of America (or have declared my intentions to become such), and that I am acquainted with the mining ground described in this notice of location, and herewith called the..... ledge, lode or claim; that the ground and claim herein described or any part thereof has not, to the best of my knowledge and belief, been located according to the laws of the United States and of this State, or if so located, that the same has been abandoned or forfeited by reason of the failure of such former locators to comply in respect thereto with the requirements of the said laws, and (in case of quartz claims) that I have opened new ground to the extent or depth of ten feet as required by the laws of Idaho.

The fee to be tendered for making such record, administering the oath to the locator and certifying the same, for indexing the names appearing on the notice and to include recording the notice by the recorder, as hereinafter required, and the indexing by said recorder, is two dollars.

MINING PARTNERSHIP.

A mining partnership exists when two or more persons who own or acquire a mining claim for the purpose of working it and extracting the mineral therefrom are actually engaged in working the same.

A purchaser of the interest of a partner in a mine when the partnership is engaged in working it takes with it notice of all liens resulting from the relation of the partners to each other and to the creditors of the partnership.

RIGHT OF WAY ACROSS CLAIM.

The owner, locator or occupant of a mining claim, whether patented under the laws of the United States or held by location or possession, may have and acquire a right of way for ingress and egress, when necessary in working such mining claim, over and across the lands or mining claims of others, whether patented or otherwise.

MINING TUNNELS.

Any person or company who has or may hereafter have a tunnel or cross-cut, the mouth of which is located upon his own ground or upon the ground in his lawful occupation, shall have the right to drive and continue the same through and across any located or patented claim in front of the mouth of such tunnel, but not to follow or drive upon any vein belonging to the owner of such claim.

Each tunnel or cross-cut may be driven and worked for the purpose of drainage and for the purpose of reaching and working mining ground of the tunnel owner beyond the intersected claim. The owner or owners of any vein or any claim or claims so intersected, or his duly authorized agent, shall have the right to enter such tunnel upon application to the owner or owners or person in charge of such tunnel without resorting to

any process of law for the purpose of making a survey and inspecting such vein or veins as may be crossed within the boundary lines of such intersected claim, and if the owner or owners of such tunnel shall, by bulk heading, damming back, or in any manner prevent the inspection of survey herein provided for, or if such owner or owners shall in any manner prevent the natural drainage of water from such intersected claim or claims without the consent of the owner or owners thereof, it shall work a forfeiture of all rights granted under section 1 of this act.

If any ore, the property of the owner of the claim intersected or crossed be extracted in driving such tunnel, it shall be the property of the owner of the vein from which it was taken, and the owner of the tunnel shall be liable for all actual damages or injury done to the owner of the claim crossed by his tunnel.

In all actions between the tunnel owner of others involving the right to any vein discovered in such tunnel, the burden of proving that the vein so discovered is not the property of the adverse claimant in such action shall be on the tunnel owner.

RECORDING MINING CONTRACTS.

Written contracts relating to prospecting or mining, or to the formation of co-partnership for that purpose, when signed by the parties thereto and indorsed by at least one witness, may be recorded in the office of the county recorder of the county wherein it is proposed to prosecute the business of said co partnership, or where the property affected by such contract is situated.

Such record shall be constructive notice to all persons of the matters contained in such contract or co-partnership agreement.

SPECIAL NOTICE.

It shall be the duty of any person, persons, company or corporation, engaged in working any mine, mines, mining premises or in developing any mining claim or claims, whether quartz or placer, or in the running of any tunnel, or in the erection or repair of any building or other structure, or in the construction of any canal, ditch, railroad, wagon road or aqueduct, in every case where mechanics or laborers are employed in or about the properties above mentioned, to make, record and publish a statement, under oath, setting forth such data as are provided in section 2 of this act.

The statement required by the preceding section shall contain the following data:

1. The name or names of the owner or owners of the mine, mines, mining claim or premises, tunnel, building, canal ditch, railroad, wagon road, aqueduct or other structure upon which work is being done or upon which it is intended to begin work.
2. The name or names of the person, persons, company or corporation engaged in or which contemplates engaging in work upon any of the properties or structures mentioned herein.
3. The conditions under which said person, persons, company or corporation is prosecuting said work, whether as owners, agent, lessee, contractor, sub-contractor, contemplative purchaser or lien holder.
4. The principal office of said person, persons, company or corporation, and, if a corporation, the state or county where incorporated and the agent in this state on whom service may be had.

5. The day of the week or month when payment of the laborers, mechanics and material men will be made and the place where said payments will be made.

6. A statement of all mortgages and liens against the property on which work is being done, with the amount of each of said incumbrances and whether or not the same is due.

REGARDING ALIENS.

That any person, whether citizen or alien (except as hereinafter provided), natural or artificial, may take, hold and dispose of mining claims and mining property, real or personal, tunnel rights, mill sites, quartz mills and reduction works or necessary or proper for the reduction of ores, and water rights used for mining or milling purposes, and any other lands or property necessary for the working of mines or the reduction of the products thereof: Provided, That Chinese, or persons of Mongolian descent not born in the United States, are not permitted to acquire title to land or any real property under the provisions of this act.

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any county government, or municipal or private corporation organized under the laws of this State, or organized under the laws of another state, or territory or in a foreign country and doing business in this State, to give employment in any way to any alien who has failed, neglected or refused, prior to the time such employment is given, to become naturalized or declare his intention to become a citizen of the United States.

INSPECTOR OF MINES.

The Inspector of Mines shall receive as full compensation for his services a salary of twenty-four hundred dollars per annum and his actual and necessary traveling expenses when traveling in the discharge of his official duties, not to exceed eighteen hundred dollars per annum, and all necessary expenses for clerk hire, postage, stationery, printing and the compensation of deputies, not exceeding \$1200.00 per annum.

The Inspector of Mines shall not, at the time of his appointment, or any time during his term of office, be an officer, director or employe in or of any mining corporation in this State, or in or of any milling corporation in the State engaged in the business of smelting or reducing ores.

It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Mines, at least once each year, to visit in person each mining county in the State of Idaho and examine all such mines therein as, in his judgment may require examination for the purpose of determining the condition of such mines as to safety and to collect information and statistics relative to mines and mining and the mineral resources of the State, and to collect, arrange and classify mineral and geological specimens found in this State and to forward the same, to the State School of Mines.

It is hereby made the duty of the owner, lessor, lessee, agent, manager or other person in charge of each and every mine, of whatever kind or character, within the State to forward to the Inspector of Mines at his office, not later than the first day of June in each year a detailed report showing the character of the mine, the number of men then employed and the estimated maximum number of men to be employed therein during the ensuing years.

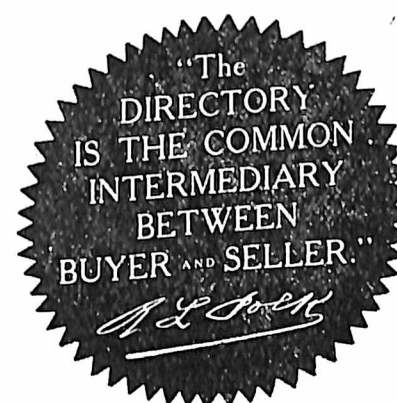
Whenever the Inspector of Mines shall receive a formal complaint in writing, signed by three or more persons, setting forth that the mine in which they are employed is dangerous in any respect, he shall, in person,

visit and examine such mine: Provided, That all complaints shall be duly verified by the parties complaining before some officer authorized by law to administer oaths.

And it shall be the duty of the Inspector of Mines, upon the neglect or refusal of any owner, lessor, lessee, agent, manager, or other person, in charge of any mine or working, notified of the unsafe or dangerous condition of his mine, promptly to comply with the requirements of the notice served upon him to at once notify the attorney general of such neglect or refusal, and the attorney general must thereupon immediately commence action in the name of the State against the party so notified for the recovery of the penalty mentioned in section 5, in any court of competent jurisdiction, and the amount so recovered shall be paid into the general school fund of the state and constitute a part thereof.

With the consent and approval of the governor, the Inspector of Mines may appoint such deputy inspector as in his judgment may be necessary. Such deputy inspectors shall be allowed as full compensation for all services five dollars per day for each day actually engaged in the performance of their duties.

Whenever a serious or fatal accident shall occur in any mine in the State of Idaho, it shall be the duty of the owner, lessor, lessee, agent, manager or other person in charge thereof, immediately and by the quickest means, to notify the Inspector of Mines or his deputy, as may be most convenient, of such accident; and upon receiving such notice, the Inspector or his deputy, or both, shall at once repair to the place of the accident and investigate fully the cause of such accident, and the Inspector or his deputy shall be present at any coroner's inquest held over the remains of any person or persons killed in any such accident, and shall have the power at such inquest to examine and cross-examine witnesses, and may have process to compel the attendance of necessary witnesses at such inquest.
