Juliaetta, March 19 — Ferdinand Richie, 87, a retired farmer, died last night at his home here. He had resided here for the past 12 years.

Mr. Richie was a pioneer of this section, residing in the Gold Hill community for 23 years before moving to Juliaetta. He was a member of the German Lutheran church.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Sarah Lawrence, Southwick, and Mrs. Helen Jewett, Walla Walla; four grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Funeral services were held at the Juliaetta Lutheran church Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock, with the Rev. Theo Meske of Cameron officiating. Mrs. Dave Demmer, Mrs. George Demmer and Mrs. Carl Fleiger, accompanied by Mrs. J. M. Hedler, sang "Ivory Palaces" and "Abide With Me." Pallbearers were Walter Demmer, Dave Demmer, Carl Fleiger, J. Interment was by the side of his wife in the Moscow cemetery, with Short's Chapel, Moscow, in charge.

## "90" WRITTEN FOR P. C. MCCREARY, VETERAN NEWSMAN

Death, in the form of a peaceful passing in his sleep, wrote the final "90" for P. C. McCreary, veteran newspaper publisher of Latah County at 3:40 o'clock Tuesday morning, March 22, 1949, at the family home in Kendrick, the immediate cause of death being heart failure, although he had been in poor health for the past two years.

Parker C. McCreary was born near Canton, Ill., September 22, 1872, being 76 years and six months of age to the day at the time of his passing.

He grew to young manhood in that territory, leaving the printing business on the old Lamar Democrat at Lamar, Missouri. He went from there to New York City, where he learned to operate a Linotype in the early days of that machine, later returning to Canton, Ill., where he was one of the early machine operators on the old Canton Daily Register.

On Christmas Day, 1901, he was united in marriage to Virginia Alice DeJarnette at Sheldon, Mo., and to this union was born one son, William L. McCreary, Kendrick, who survives, his wife having passed away in 1922.

Shortly after their marriage they moved to Colorado Springs, Colo., where the deceased was associated with his brother, J. C. McCreary, in the newspaper business. In 1904 they moved to Santa Fe, N. M., where he was composing room foreman on the old Santa Fe New Mexican. Later they returned to Colorado Springs, where he was again associated with his brother in newspaper work, publishing a paper at Colorado Springs and one at Manitou, Colorado.

In the year 1908 they came west, he being employed for a short time at Ellensburg, Wash., then moving to Yakima, Wash., where he was composing room foreman on the night shift for the old Yakima Daily Republic. Here he suffered a breakdown in his health, and leaving the printing trade, was associated with his brother, F. E. McCreary, in the operation of a fruit ranch at Selah, Wash.

In 1912, having regained his health, he purchased from C. F. Brune, the Genesee News at Genesee, taking charge of that paper in December of that year, and operated it until October of 1928, when he sold it to its present owner, E. D. Peterson.

In March of 1929 he purchased the Stanwood News, at Stanwood, Wash., operating it until October of that year. In December of the same year he purchased the Kendrick Gazette, taking charge December 28, 1929 — and continued its operation until his retirement, due to ill health, some two years ago, it having been operated since his retirement by his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. McCreary.

P. C. McCreary loved the newspaper work, and to him a well-edited and well-printed newspaper was the ultimate in achievement. He did not try to "dig up the dirt" on this or that happening. He believed in the simple facts of life, and took joy in chronicling them faithfully, week by week — leaving editorials and political writings to the big daily papers.

He was a member of the Federated church at Genesee, having joined there with his wife many years ago, and preferred to leave his membership there. He belonged to no lodges or other fraternal groups, but, until his retirement, took a keen interest in the Kendrick Commercial Club and its activities, serving on numerous committees of that group, although he consistently refused office.

Besides his son, W. L. McCreary, he is survived by two grandchildren, Patricia Jean and Frank Parker McCreary, Kendrick; one brother, John C. McCreary, Colorado Springs, Colo., and one cousin, Millie J. Johnston, Canton, Ill.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Community church, Kendrick, at 2:00 o'clock Friday afternoon, March 25, with Dr. J. H. Coulter, minister, bringing the message. Interment will be in the family plot at Genesee by the side of his wife.

## Mrs. A. W. Jones Passes Away

Word was received in Kendrick Wednesday morning that Mrs. A. W. Jones had passed away at 7:00 o'clock that morning at the St. Joseph's hospital in Lewiston, where she had been taken for treatment following a heart attack suffered at her home here last week.

## Cancer Drive To Begin

Hundreds of volunteer members of the Idaho Division of the American Cancer Society will actively participate in the state-wide fund raising campaign of the society, which begins April 1. Leo J. Falk of Boise, president and campaign chairman, said this week.

Last year the cancer society campaign raised \$86,400, which has been used in carrying on the fight against the disease. During the year the disease claimed the lives of 532 Idaho residents.

"Volunteer members of the organization in every county and community in the state have completed their plans for the campaign and are ready to launch the 1949 drive."

"Funds raised by the Idaho Division of the American Cancer Society are used to combat the disease through education, service to cancer patients, and for the national scientific research program," he said. "Much has been accomplished in each of these fields, yet much remains to be done."

"It is not the purpose of the society to spread fear, panic or hysteria about cancer," he said. "Rather, we urge all of the residents of Idaho to take advantage of the April campaign to learn the facts about the disease and to lend us their support to carry on the fight against cancer."

Falk pointed out that financial records of the society are available to anyone, and that 25c of every dollar contributed is allocated for research; 15 cents for the national education and service program, and 60 cents remains in the state for the state program.

## FEDERAL POWER SET-UPS COULD STAND CLEANING

Citizens of this community, through their federal taxes are helping to foot the bills for losses of government-subsidized hydro-electric projects, H. C. Schupfer, area manager for the Washington Water Power company, said here this week.

Evidence for the W. W. P. manager's statement was contained in an official report submitted at current hearings of the senate subcommittee on deficiency appropriations and circulated last week in utility circles and through national news services.

Prepared originally by an investigative staff of experts under the direction of Robert E. Lee, former FBI executive, for the house public works committee of the 80th congress, the report was sharply critical of federal power operations. Lee was assisted by A. B. Roberts, nationally known consulting engineer, and W. H. Sigerson, certified public accountant. The 127-page study was 12 months in preparation.

The W. W. P. official here said the report showed the Bonneville Power Administration and the 15 Bureau of Reclamation projects in northwestern and western states failed by a wide margin to make their own way. It was disclosed that the B. P. A. had collected \$18,070,000, but should have charged \$36,493,000.

Other excerpts from the report quoted by Mr. Schupfer include: "Federal power revenues in 1946 amounted to \$71,280,000, but should have been \$147,010,000 if all federal hydro-electric projects had been completely self-supporting."

"Federal public power at so-called 'cheap' rates is possible only because citizens outside the power areas help pay the bills of customers of the federal projects. To pay out the investment in a normal, business-like method, federal power rates would have to be doubled, on the average."

"The government power operations paid nothing in lieu of federal taxes, while the privately owned companies in 1946 paid 11.4 percent of their revenues to the national government."

"In addition to making little or no provision for taxes, the federal projects failed to show all operations and maintenance charges, made small or no depreciation charges, made interest payments that were much less than privately owned utilities would have to make, and their amortization or repayment of principal to the government was only nominal."

It was further stated in the report that public power accounting methods are vastly different than those private businesses are required to use, and tend to obscure the true status. "For example," the report said, "one such project which claimed a profit of \$1,063,000 for 1947 actually was in the red \$5,029,000."

Bureaus are planning 455 additional projects, many with facilities duplicating those of private companies at a cost of \$13,000,000 more.

Concluding, the official report recommends that the rights of the states to control streams within their borders and to regulate accounting and rate-making procedures in connection with power generation at federal projects need further studies.

Also, says the report, "the federal hydro-electrics should stop 'wasteful' duplication of transmission facilities constructed by private utilities, and the government should
