FREDERICK MIELKE DIES IN CALIFORNIA AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Frederick William Mielke, 74, of San Francisco, Calif., died at his residence at 60 Corona Street, June 2. He had been ill for three years.

Mr. Mielke was born Jan. 12, 1892, in New Auburn, Minn., a son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Mielke. He moved to Cameron, Idaho, with his parents in 1901, receiving his elementary education in New Auburn and Cameron, and his high school education in Kendrick, Idaho, and Spokane, Washington. His legal education was obtained at George Washington University, Washington, D. C., where he received an L. B. degree in 1917. He was admitted to the bar in Washington, D. C., in 1920, and the California bar in 1923.

He married Cressida Maura Flynn on July 14, 1917. In 1919, after returning from Service in World War I he and Mrs. Mielke moved to New York City, where he began his career as an income and estate tax consultant. In 1923 they moved to San Francisco, where he was on the

legal staff of the Southern Pacific Railroad Co. until 1928. From 1928 to 1942 he was associated with the law firm of McCutchen, Olney, Manon and Greene; then a member of the firm of Moran and Mielke from 1943 to 1945. Since 1945 he was in practice in his own name. He was a director of Delta Terminals, Inc., and Feather River Railway Co.

His affiliations included the Commonwealth Club of California; the Bohemian Club; the California State Bar, and the San Francisco Bar Association.

Mr. Mielke received the honor of being chosen a member of "Who's Who in the West", and also a member of "Eminent Americans."

Besides his widow he leaves a daughter, Mrs. Cressida T. Edmondson of Granada Hills, Calif.; two sons, Frederick W., Jr., of Menlo Park, and Robert E. of Oakland; two sisters, Mrs. Ida Newman and Helen Mielke of Cameron, Ida.; three brothers, William of Lewiston, Ida.; and Herbert and Edwin of Cameron; six grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were held at N. Gray and Company Funeral Chapel, with Rev. Kenneth T. Caudill, pastor of the Lutheran Church of Our Saviour, officiating. Interment was in Golden Gate National Cemetery.

All members of the class, their spouses and families, and class instructors and their spouse are urged to attend.

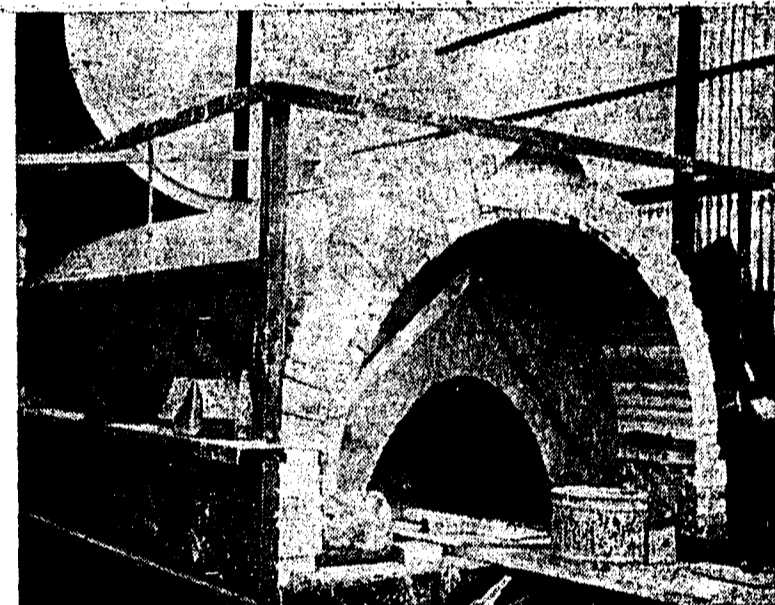

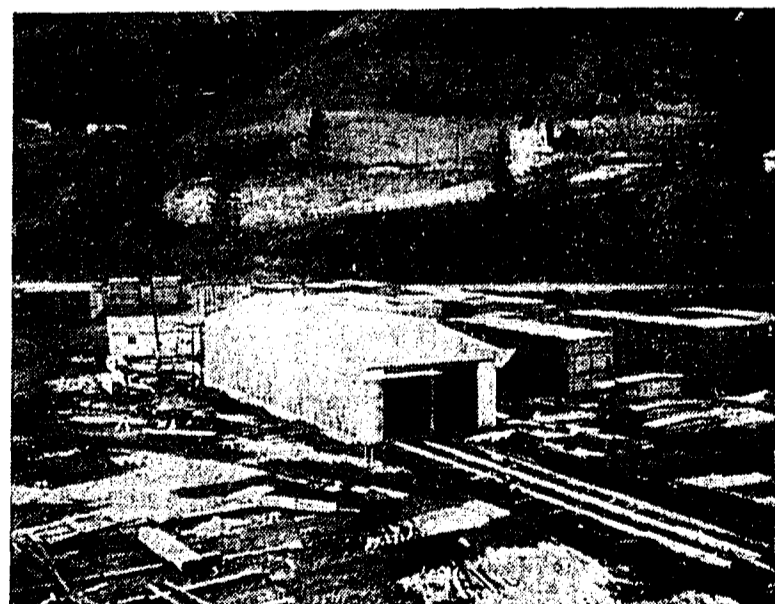
RAPID PROGRESS BEING MADE IN THE CONSTRUCTION OF NEW JULIAETTA MILL

FIRE CLAIMS LIFE OF 5-YEAR OLD BOY THURSDAY P. M.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. Reinhardt Schroeder and took the life of their five-year-old son Thursday afternoon.

Two other children were saved by their mother. The dead child pulled from his mother's grasp as she was trying to drop him from an upstairs window and ran back into the flaming section of the building. She was unable to find him. Saved from the blazing structure were Mark, three, and Angela, eight months.

The children were all asleep in an upstairs bedroom when fire broke out in the two-story frame home. Schroeder and a neighbor, Lowell Huffman, were repairing a fence about half a mile from the house at the time. By the time they ran to the house it was too late to save it.

The ranch is located about 4 1/2 miles southeast of Cavendish, and the burned house was situated 100 yards inside the Nez Perce County line. Units of the Kendrick Fire Protective District and the state forestry department at Orofino arrived too late to quell the blaze.

The farm is owned by Reinhardt Wilken of Leland, Mr. Schroeder's uncle. Mrs. Schroeder and the two younger children were treated at Orofino for burns and released.

Funeral Services Held

Funeral services for five-year-old Ralph Reinhardt Schroeder, who was born at Lewiston, Idaho, January 30, 1961, and passed away on June 9, 1966, were held at the Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Cameron, on Monday, June 13, with the Rev. Theo Meske, pastor, officiating. The hymns "Jesus Loves Me" and "What a Friend We Have In Jesus" were sung by Duane Meske, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Theo Meske. Pallbearers were Walter Eberhardt, Lowell Huffman, Edward Grieser and Homer Marvin. Interment was in the Cameron Cemetery.

DEADLINE ON NEW WHEAT APPLICATION

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new farm" allotment for the 1967 crop of winter wheat on a farm which does not have a 1966 wheat allotment, should get in touch with the ASCS county office during the next few weeks, Melvin Procnier of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County committee said. Such farmers have until July 1 to file applications for such an allotment.

A producer eligible to file such an application is one with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been established, and for which neither the owner nor the operator has an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm, who has available land and adequate equipment and facilities for the successful production of a wheat crop on the farm; who, during the last five years, has had at least two year's experience in producing wheat, and who as an operator expects to receive 50 per cent or more of the current year's income from the total production on the farm (not including the anticipated income from wheat produced on a "new farm" allotment). Other factors are involved, and it is suggested that interested producers discuss the detail with officials at the

ASCs county office. The chairman said that formal application for a "new farm" wheat allotment may be made by filing a written application at the ASCS county office prior to the July 1 deadline.

TO PAY HUGE TAX

The Washington Water Power Co. announced today that it will make the final, or second-half payment of its 1965 Idaho property tax bill this week. J. P. Buckley, WWP tax agent said that the second-half payments will total \$935,192.65, with payments going to ten Idaho counties.

The WWP spokesman said that the utility's total Idaho property tax bill for 1965 will amount to \$1,870,422.84.

Tax payments by counties are as follows: Benewah, \$27,654; Bonner, \$298,061; Boundary, \$23,363; Clearwater, \$29,385; Idaho, \$33,363; Kootenai, \$177,995; Latah, \$81,845; Lewis, \$23,250; Nez Perce \$178,019, and Shoshone \$83,268.

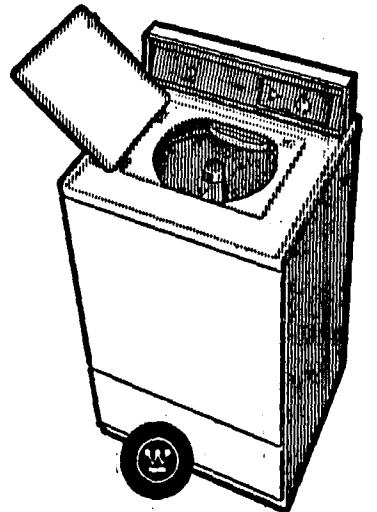

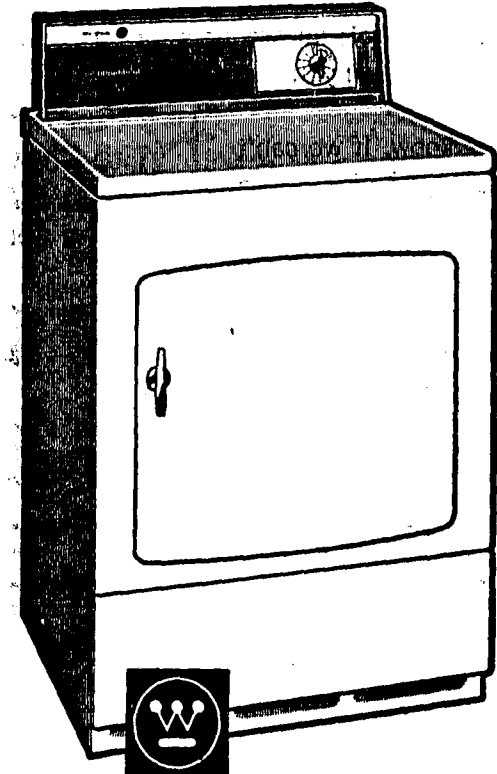

DWIGHT J. INGLE SPOKE AT U. OF R.

Rochester, N. Y. — Dwight J. Ingle, chairman of the Department of Physiology at the University of Chicago and a writer on the philosophy of science was this year's Eastman Visiting Professor at the Uni-

versity of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry.

Prof. Ingle was at the school during the week of May 16 to May 20. During that time he presented two major lectures and also met with students and faculty, both individually and in seminar groups.

In his own field of research, the visiting professor has made major contributions to the understanding of the metabolism of steroids, chemicals which help regulate basic functions of the human body. In addition he has written extensively on the philosophies of science and the relationship of science and scientists to contemporary society. His writings in this field include "Principles of Research in Biology and Medicine," "A Dozen Doctors" and "I Went to See the Elephant."

Born at Kendrick, Idaho, Ingle was graduated from the University of Idaho in 1929, and received his mas-

ter's degree there in 1931. He received his Ph. D. from the University of Minnesota in 1941, and was a senior research scientist with the Upjohn Co. from 1943 to 1953.

In 1953 he joined the University of Chicago as professor of physiology at the Ben May Laboratory. He was named chairman of the Department of Physiology in 1959. In addition to his teaching, research and administrative duties he is editor of Perspectives in Biology and Medicine, a journal of scientific ideas and opinions.

ADMISSIONS AT U. TO CLOSE JUNE 30

U. of I. Moscow — In view of the extreme pressure for admission to the University of Idaho, the Board of Regents has officially established that the University will accept no applications for admissions this year after June 30, it was announced this week by President Ernest W. Hartung. The new ruling applies to Idaho residents, as acceptance of non-resident students had already been stopped as of May 13.

"Limitations on space, facilities and funds to hire additional faculty members requires putting on the brakes," said Dr. Hartung. About 6,400 students are already scheduled for the 1966 fall term. This means limiting the increase over last fall to about 400.

Warning of a possible early cutoff in acceptance of applications have been issued by Frank Young, director of admissions. The Regents approved final plans for an Engineering Laboratory building as presented by Anton Dropping, Boise architect. The building has been estimated to cost \$1,971,840. Preliminary plans for a College of Education building, presented by Chet Sawyer, Boise architect, were also approved. This structure has been estimated to cost \$1,909,908.

For the two buildings, totaling almost \$4,000,000 the last session of the state legislature appropriated \$2,000,000. Federal funds totaling \$657,000 are to be applied to the engineering laboratory. It is hoped that \$824,548 in federal funds will be received for the College of Education building. Part of this sum has already been authorized by the federal government. In addition, the Regents will issue \$600,000 in bonds for the education building, with the bonds to be paid off from fees.

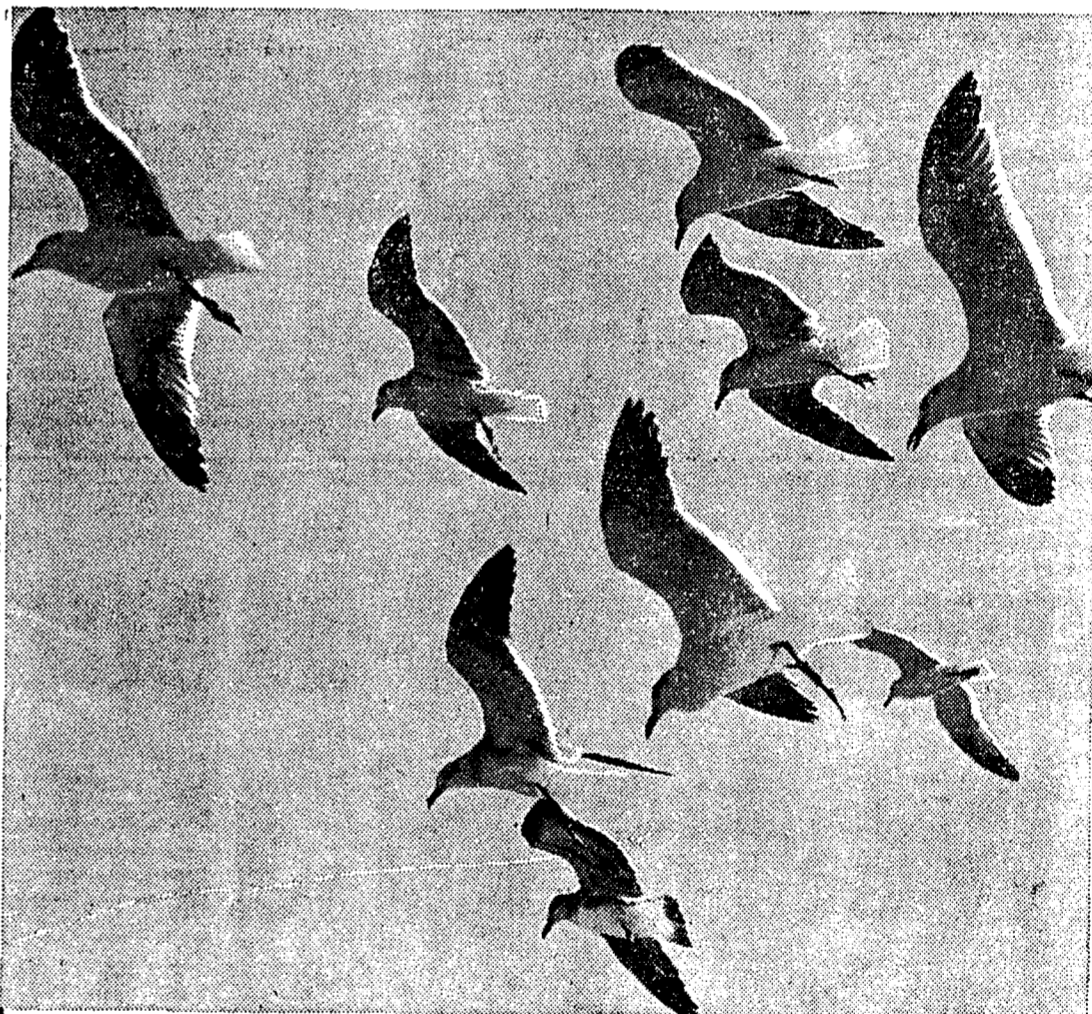

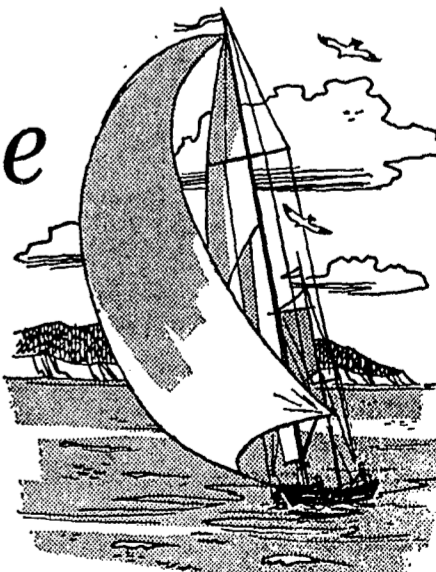

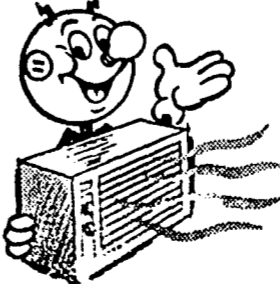
