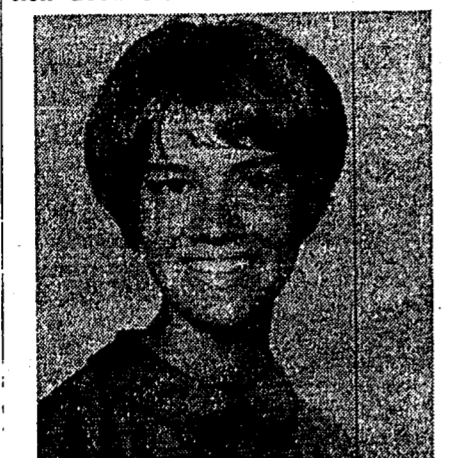

## WRECKER BUSY PAST TWO DAYS

The Latah County Soil and Water Conservation District Board has set up a meeting in Kendrick for the purpose of informing the people of this area — about the University of Idaho and City of Moscow filing for Water Rights on this water.

George Gagon will represent the University of Idaho; Marvin Kimberling and Dick Day will represent the City of Moscow. It will be an informative meeting only.

The meeting will be held on Monday, Dec. 18 at 7:00 p. m. in the Kendrick High School cafeteria. All interested are welcome to attend.

It is emphasized that this meeting is "Informative Only!"

## MORE AND MORE COMES TO LIGHT ON WATER APPLICATION

More and more information is coming to light on the application of the University of Idaho for almost, if not all the waters of the Potlatch River, the first publication of which was first dated Nov. 20, and the last one Nov. 21, with a protest deadline of Dec. 29, 1967.

Following publication of the first article on the matter, Thursday, Nov. 30, in the Gazette, the following card was received from Elvon Hampton, Genesee, a member of the University Board of Regents:

"Dear Bill: Thanks for the paper. Your article on Water Rights was real interesting. I had no idea water problems reached so far. Sincerely, Elvon Hampton."

"At the Wildlife Federation meeting held here Tuesday, Dec. 5 the matter was brought up, and the following information brought out: We quote from the Lewiston Tribune: 'The group voted to oppose the University of Idaho's request to drain 33.91 cubic feet of water per second off the East Fork of the Potlatch River for domestic use.' Felton said that the federation's flow records show that the creek drops to 3.6 cubic feet per second at its low point and only averages 37 cubic feet per second."

"From the Lewiston Tribune of Thursday, Dec. 7:

"George Gagon, Moscow, director of the physical plant at the University of Idaho, said Wednesday that he had no comment on the action voted by the District Two Idaho Wildlife Federation regarding its opposition to the university's plan to use water from Potlatch Creek for domestic use."

"He did say, however, that the University has filed for water rights for domestic use on the Potlatch River, in accordance with the Board of Regents instructions."

"The request," he said, "was filed with the State Bureau of Reclamation as a necessary phase of preliminary planning for a supplemental water supply to the university's deep wells."

"It is felt that a supplemental water supply will be necessary within the next 10 years. The University cannot afford to make a detailed feasibility study on any proposed source of water without first knowing whether or not water rights will be granted."

"The Potlatch River, it is believed, has considerable potential, and thus the request for water rights was made."

"Situation Very Serious  
Don Jain, Bovill, said Friday morning:

"This application for water is a very serious problem in the Bovill area, and could do untold damage to the economy of our area. The proposed first dam is on the Dennis Jain ranch, one mile southeast of Bovill, and within 150 or 200 yards of his home."

"The second proposed dam or diversion point is at the confluence of Hog Meadow Creek and the Potlatch River — leaving almost no water for our entire area."

"Protests must be filed and filed now."

"I have invited members of the Board of Regents to come to Bovill and let us show them just what they propose to do — I really don't believe they realize what their action would mean. I don't know whether they will come or not — but I hope they will."

"Why The Secrecy?"  
Big, unanswered question in the minds of everyone to date is: 'Why the secrecy and no comment attitude on the part of the Board of Regents and other officials at the University?'"

"Perhaps the answer to that will come to light as protests increase."

"Daily Paper Publicity  
In the Sunday issue of the Lewiston Tribune the first real big daily paper publicity was given the matter — which was most welcome."

There was one error, however. The paper stated W. L. McCreary discovered the legal publication. Such is not the case. It was discovered by Mel Hamilton, Juliaetta, who with Bill Olson, also Juliaetta, is leading the fight in that area."

Locally, some good kills were made, but they were the exception rather than the rule.

At Blewett's Grocery, where most of the local cutting is done, they report the kill perhaps a bit ahead of last year, but still much below that of an "average season."

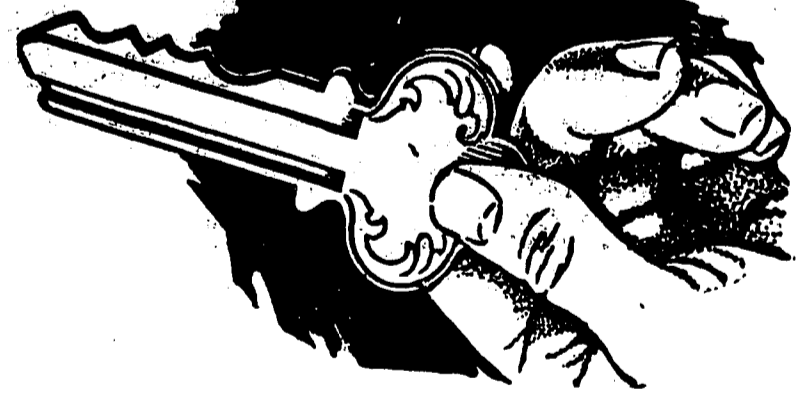

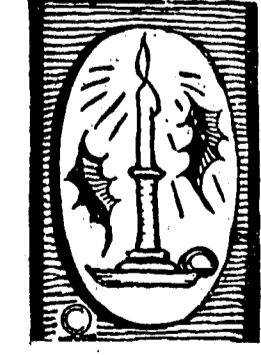
