Crippled physically with polio early in childhood he went on to become a successful and respected businessman in the community and more important, a successful and respected human being. Faced with the lifelong trials he was forced to endure, a person of lesser courage and spirit might have given up and become a sad, embittered soul, but not Ted Mielke. He was a cheerful uncomplaining person, active in the life of the community and interested in all around him and it seemed, as often happens, his own troubles and pain gave him a special patience and tolerance of his fellowman. He had a quick and clever mind and if the sometimes ineptness of other people vexed him, he never let it show. There was always the smile, always the laugh, always the understanding that you were doing your best.

Ted's passing was a stunning shock to me; for just Monday morning we had engaged in a usual ritual. He would pull up in front of the Gazette office, honk the horn, and I would go out and see him. I was in the process of printing some insurance forms and had been delayed in getting paper. Ted had been waiting for the forms for about three weeks and I was explaining about the strike and all — I remember he\_slipped back behind the wheel of the car, laughed and said, "Don't worry about it, Bill, we've got plenty of time yet." Now Ted has an eternity of time and I have the memory of a man who was better than I'll probably ever be.

Ted was a man who took adversity and from it gained strength, character and understanding. And, Ted Mielke, whose crippled, tormented legs never let him walk, will face His Judgment, as one of the strong-est, straightest men I have ever known.---Bill

### Free Immunization Will be Offered at Health Fair

One of the services to be offered at the Kendrick-Juliaetta Health Fair on June 12 and 13, will be immunizations.


> Several diseases can be prevented if you are immunized against them. These diseases include tetanus, diphteria, pertussis (whooping cough) polio, measules, mumps, and rubella (3 day or German measles). All of these immunizations will be available at the Health Fair.

An immunization law now is in effect in Idaho. This law says that children entering kindergarten, first, second or third grade in September of 1979 shall have 4 or more DPT's, 4 or more polio, and 1 measles, mumps and rubella. These immunizations are to be documented with the month, day and year received. A booster dose of tetanus and diphteria should be given to adults

every 10 years. If you plan to have immunizations at the Health Fair, please bring all immunization records with you. Children must be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult. Your Health Fair will provide
