## V. F. W. Will Seek Community Support To Help Preserve Building

The V. F. W. needs your help. To preserve the integrity of the structure of the V. F. W. Hall, a new roof will be needed. As the older generation can remember, at one time the building was the school gymnasium. After the school district received approval from the voters for a new facility, the old buildings were purchased by the local Veterans of Foreign Wars with the stipulation that the school buildings had to be torn down. With volunteer help, the former school was torn down and through the years the members of the V. F. W. Post and Auxiliary have worked hard to raise money and do the work required to maintain and improve the facility which has served as a social, business and recreational asset for the area, especially for large gatherings, as well as the Post home for the Kendrick V. F. W. Post and Auxiliary unit.

While expenses have traditionally been taken care of within the organization, a project the size of a new roof appears beyond our means. Some residents of the surrounding area as well as the community have indicated a willingness to donate to the effort to keep the building available and even suggested that all residents in the area be given the chance to contribute. Since preliminary estimates for a new roof are in the area of \$9,000 to \$10,000, the local post has reluctantly decided to pursue this course of action in order to continue the availability of the facility to serve the needs of the area. Accordingly, the V. F. W. is asking for support through individual donations to enable the necessary expenditure for a new roof. Donations may be made to the V. F. W. Young people need support from many areas including:

- 1) Family support—Families need to provide a high level of love and support.
- 2) Positive family communications—Young people and parents need to communicate freely.
- 3) Other adult relationships—Young people need other adults with whom to communicate.
- 4) Caring neighborhood—Young person needs caring neighbors.
- 5) Caring school climate—School provides a caring, encouraging environment.
- 6) Parent involvement in schooling—Parents involved in helping young persons succeed in school.

Other adult relationships can be as simple as the Owens Corning's Newark, Ohio plant that gives hourly employees a paid hour off each week to mentor elementary students or volunteer at school events.

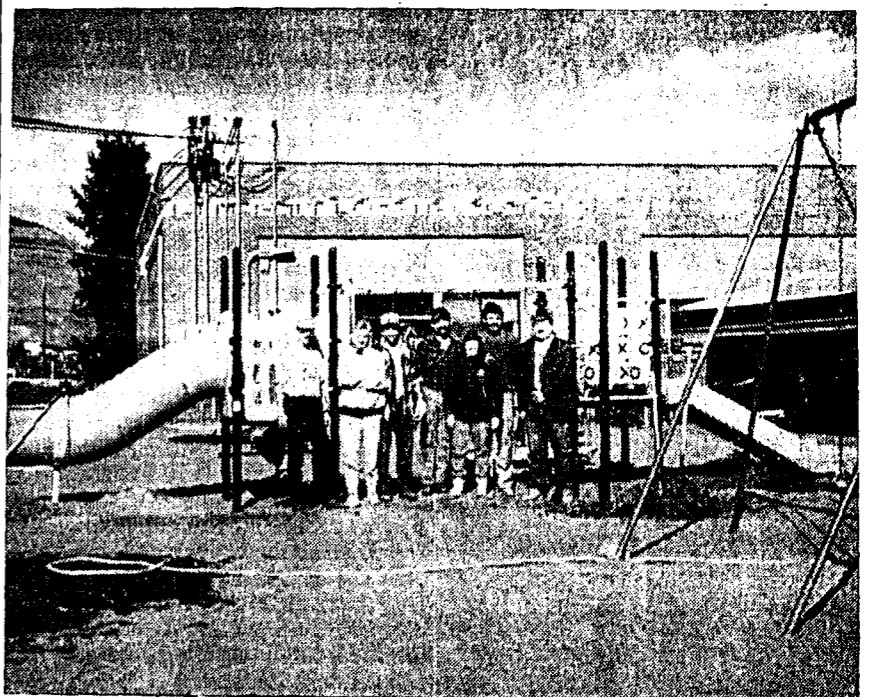
## Hospice Offers
