STATE LAND FOR SALE.

Governor N. B. Willey, president, Attorney General Geo. H. Roberts, Secretary of State A. J. Packham, and Superintendent of Public Instruction J. E. Harriman, comprising the state land commission, met on Tuesday, and having ascertained that some of the state land is all ready selected were desired by intending purchasers at a price above the minimum, the following order was issued:

The land included in the list comprises forty-two sections more or less of 36-40 acres. By counties it is located in Ada county, 14 sections; Cassia county, 4 sections; Bingham county, 8 sections; Latah county, 11 sections; Nez Perce county, 5 sections.
