We often see statistics showing that less than 5 per cent of the population of the United States controls a large part of the national wealth. Of the total annual income received by the people of this country it is now known that about 88 per cent goes to those receiving \$5,000 and less a year. As the country grows older its wealth is more equally distributed. A century or more ago less than 5 per cent of the population owned more than 1/2 the country's wealth.

The high water last week did considerable damage to the roads up Bear Creek and Potlatch creek. The most serious damage in Kendrick highway district is on the Bear creek road, and the bridge is damaged to some extent. However, the

commissioners have a highwater mark to help them in the location of the mile strip of road which they contemplate building up Potlatch creek. As the creek flooded the road in its present location at several points, the road bed will have to be changed to keep it out of the high water danger zone. The commissioners believe they will still have enough money to build this piece of road, although the high water did some damage which will require additional expense.

The agricultural appropriations bill provides \$20,000 for "study of the behavior of fruit in transportation." After an exhaustive research on the part of a commission authorized for this purpose, a report will be issued to the department of agriculture and no doubt it will contain as its principal findings that under favorable conditions part of the fruit behaved all right but that in isolated cases where there was insufficient ice, the behavior was not so good and in extreme cases it was so bad that it spoiled. And on top of this there will also probably be a demand for an extension of funds to continue the valuable work.

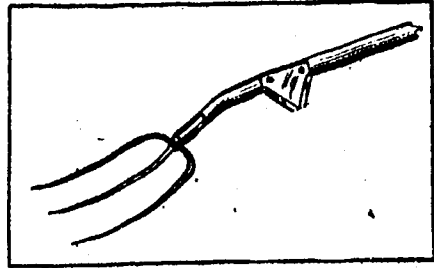

Striking Example Furnished by Kentucky, Who Markets Eggs, Poultry and Fruit.

An example of the part that quality plays in a business of direct marketing of farm produce is furnished by the experience of a man in Kentucky who markets eggs, dressed poultry, meats and fruits to consumers in Nashville, Tenn.

The business was established over two years ago by obtaining a friend as the first customer. From this modest beginning the producer has obtained sufficient customers to buy all of the high-grade produce he can supply. Most of the shipments are made by parcel post.

This business is conducted on the basis of high quality with adequate returns, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Customers are selected with as much care as most consumers show in selecting a producer from whom to buy farm produce. Customers are retained by never breaking the rule to supply only the best produce raised on his own farm. If, when an order is obtained, this farmer does not have produce of the highest quality, he informs the customer and states that unless otherwise instructed the produce will be shipped at the earliest possible date.

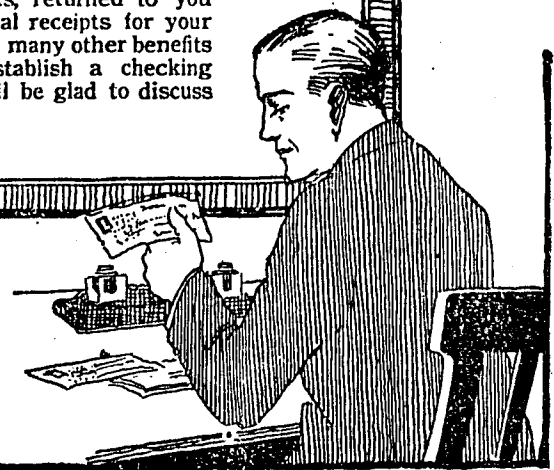

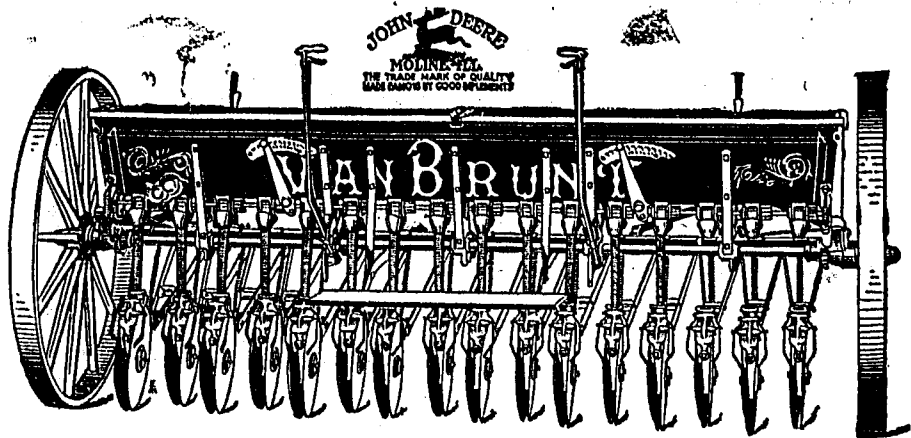
