

NEWS NOTES FROM KENDRICK SCHOOLS

Events of Interests to School Patrons.

A balcony has been constructed in the gymnasium this week by the manual training boys. The work was begun only last Tuesday afternoon, but the boys were willing to sacrifice their time and hard labor to be able to accommodate the large crowds which are expected to attend the games this season. A Monroe Standardized Arithmetic test was recently given to the intermediate and upper grades with the following results noted: All the grades were slightly below standard; in the 5th grade, only three were above, those being Elbert Long, Mattie Reid, and Lelah Taylor. The sixth grade were considerably below and it will take a great deal of hard work to bring them up to standard. There were eight in the 7th grade above standard, and fifteen below, those above being, Charles Sturdevant, Shirley Clem, Carl Sparber, Ellis Carlisle, Hester Knepper, Myrl Onstott, Delbert Turner and Harry Flaig; and in the 8th grade only four pupils, Arthur Whalen, Loren Lewis, Clarice Leith and Maudie Compton were above the standard, while nine were below. These results show that a great deal of emphasis must be put on arithmetic reasoning, and it is hoped that the next test will show much improvement.

The 5th and 6th grades are taking their six week tests this week. Lawrence and Ovid Jarvis withdrew from the sixth grade Tuesday. They are leaving for Sandpoint.

Dr. Smith Locates Here

Dr. D. Smith, who for the past 30 years has practiced dentistry at Southwick, closed a deal this week for the dental equipment formerly owned by Dr. Veon. He will open dental offices here December 1. Dr. Smith stated this week that he had forty years' experience back of him in his profession and believed that the larger territory offered here justified him in making the change from Southwick to Kendrick. The high school facilities here also were an inducement.

Federal Aid Highways

Ten thousand miles of federal aid highways were completed in the last fiscal year, bringing the total mileage to 19,308, says an announcement of the Bureau of Public Roads, Department of Agriculture. The year's work constituted a new record.

Texas leads in miles completed federal aid roads with 1,733 miles, while Minnesota is second with 1,416. Texas also is first in mileage under construction with 1,408 miles, and Nebraska is second with 970 miles. Iowa is third with 945 miles.

Texas and New York receive the largest allotments of federal aid, which is distributed on the basis of population and mileage of state highways.

Aside from the federal state highway work, the Bureau of Roads has completed one thousand three hundred and fifty-two miles of road in the national forests, and there are under construction 617 miles, the whole to open up regions of great natural beauty.

Based on available data, bureau officers state, the sum to be spent this year on highways will total \$742,000,000. The figures include federal aid roads and projects built in addition by the state, and smaller municipal units without the aid of federal funds.

More than 30 miles of bridges have been built under the federal aid highway program since 1916. One of the largest of these bridges, that from Mandan to Bismarck, N. D., is more than three and one-half miles long and cost \$1,428,000.

Highway building over the country is to be given additional impetus, as the result of assistance offered by the federal government.

Paper Prices Going Up

Fires Destroy 2 Houses

Two fires occurred in Kendrick the first of the week. The George Riggan house burned to the ground about 3 o'clock Sunday morning and the Ira Gentry house was totally destroyed Monday evening.

George Riggan was in Lewiston at the time of his fire, having gone there on the Saturday night train. The fire was discovered by O. E. MacPherson, the night awakening him, after the house was a mass of flames. He gave the alarm but found it almost impossible to wake anyone at that unearthly hour in the morning. By the time a volunteer fire brigade had been organized and the water turned on, the house was practically a heap of cinders. A collie dog was roasted in the fire. Mr. Riggan says that when he left for Lewiston he made a bed on the back porch for the dog and put him out of the house, so it is a mystery how the dog got in the house before the fire started. The house and contents were covered by \$1200 insurance.

The Gentry fire was discovered by some of the high school students who were on their way to the gymnasium to practice basket ball. The house was not occupied so they broke in the door, which was locked, but the building was so full of smoke they could not remain inside. They gave the alarm at once and it was but a few minutes until a crowd had gathered. The fire hose was connected but was two lengths too short to be of any service so a delay was occasioned until more hose could be secured from the hose house at the city hall. In the meantime the school house fire hose was pressed into service and kept the fire under control to some extent until the city hose could be brought into action. It is believed that the fire would have burned the school house if the water had not been turned on promptly. The origin of the fire is unknown. Insurance to the amount of \$950 was carried on the property.

Money Conditions

In its eighth bi-monthly survey of industrial conditions in the United States in October, the National Industrial Conference Board, 10 East 39th Street, New York, says today:

Money conditions have been characterized during the past few months by relatively low rates of interest and rediscount, large availability of credit, increased specie reserves and continuance of heavy investment activity. As indications of improvement in the economic situation are the growth of commercial loans of banks in all reporting cities and expansion in note circulation, which are traceable more to increase in fundamental business activity than to seasonal demands of agriculture which assert themselves at about this period of the year. The drain on foreign gold stocks still continues and the ratio of reserves to liabilities of the Federal Reserve Banks hovers around 78%.

Partial explanation of the increasing strength displayed by some of the principal foreign exchanges may be derived from the fact that absorption by American investors of foreign securities, both governmental and private, has amounted to \$653 millions in the first half of 1922, compared with \$826 millions during the whole of 1921. A circumstance of particular interest in this connection is the large increase in investments in foreign corporate enterprises, which together with the evidence attests to the importance of the American market as a source of capital supply. Because of the paucity of liquid capital throughout the world and the urgent demands for it in the coming years, of replacements of and additions to existing stocks as a result of the war's exigencies, this country will have to guard against the financing of questionable ventures and will have to undertake the task of diverting investments along lines consistent with sound principles of industrial and commercial development.

Vexations as the question of reparations is bound to be in its recurring forms, it is a relief to find the first of next year. Belgium's acceptance of the German terms of payment has temporarily postponed the whole matter. Meanwhile, the latter country continues to be inundated with floods of fresh currency from day to day, but despite these measures, the money and credit stringency remains unabated, paradoxical as it may seem. The Reichsbank has raised its rate of discount from time to time but it has never the less failed to stem the tide of credit demand. At a time when private banks are receiving from their customers higher rates of interest, an increase of 1% or 2% of the Reichsbank rate will probably prove to be ineffective. At the root of the present chaos in Germany lies the policy of deficit financing pursued by the government, and so long as this evil is not curbed, inflation will exact a greater and greater toll through economic disorganization.

Our foreign trade has kept up remarkably well in the past six months and the usual tapering off which appears in the summer period did not not take place this year. Imports in August were the heaviest in volume of any month since 1920, probably in large part due to anticipation of the new tariff provisions, and exports were somewhat ahead of July but still considerably below the figure for the corresponding month of 1921. It remains to be seen what effect the new tariff rates will have on our foreign trade. It is in large degree probable that although government revenues from imports may be swelled, this impingement may be at the expense of trade volume.

A 20 Pound Turnip

R. Whetstone of American ridge brought a big turnip to town Saturday and put it on display at the Farmers Bank. It was raised in Mr. Whetstone's garden and without extra care or "feeding" it reached the proportions of 20 pounds and 13 ounces.

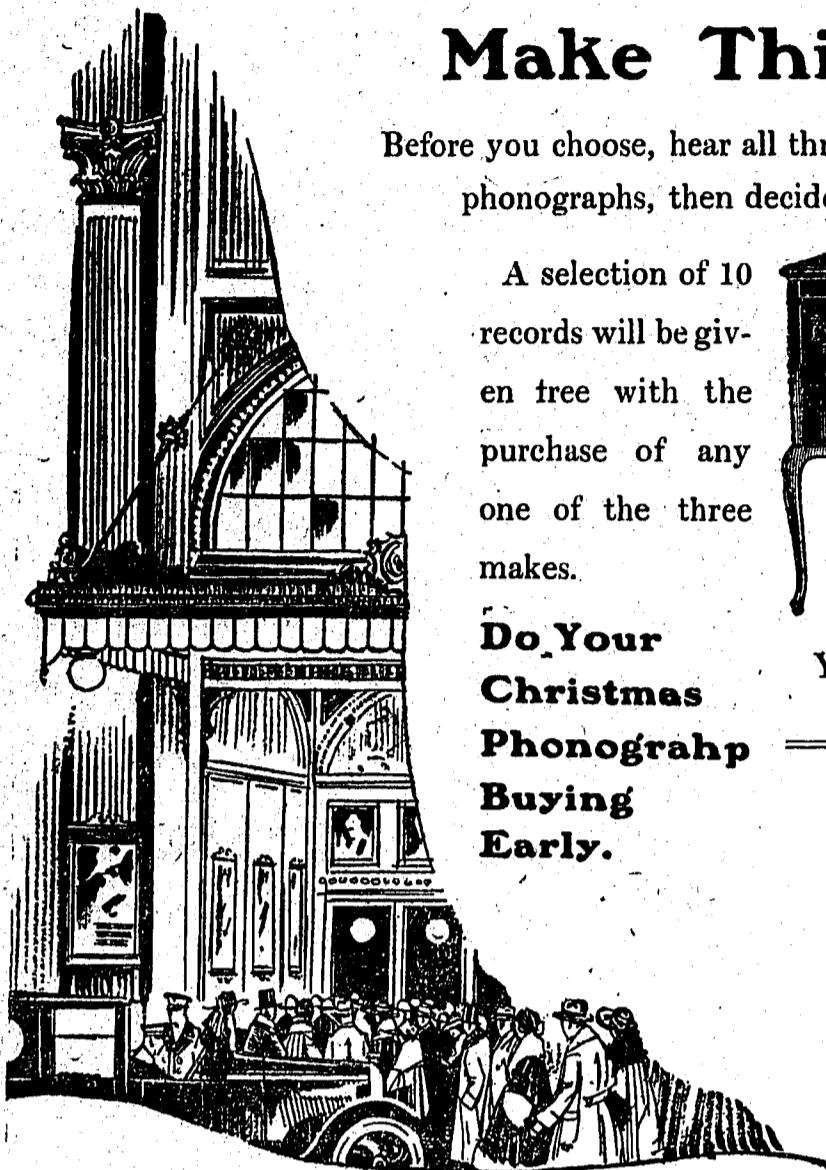

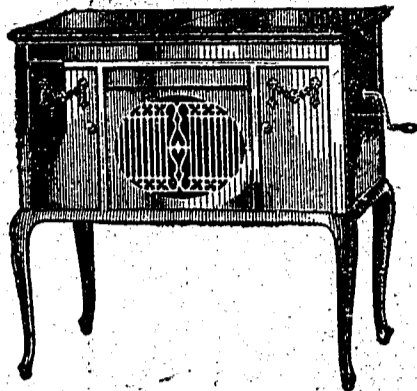

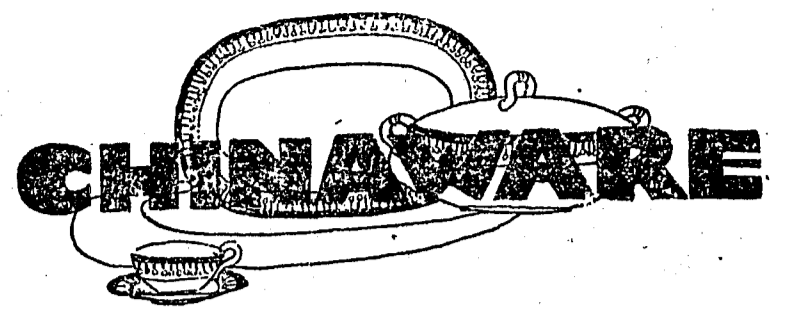

DESTROY WEEVILS IN BEANS

Carbon Bisulphide Will Kill Insects
 If Placed in Tightly Covered
 Vessel Over Night.

Weevils can be killed in beans and peas by the use of carbon bisulphide. To treat these put them in a jar, tub or other vessel which can be covered tightly. Put into a glass about one teaspoonful of carbon bisulphide for each ten gallons of space in the enclosure and place the glass in with the beans. Allow them to remain in the fumes of the carbon bisulphide over night, then take them out and place in dry storage quarters. Do not take lamps or lighted matches near the material, and do not breathe the fumes.

GIVE HARNESS BEST OF CARE

Hardened Grease is Conveniently Removed by Scraping With Knife—Oil While Damp.

Harness should be washed and oiled when it becomes dirty or extremely dry. For washing, use tepid water, a neutral soap, such as castile or white toilet soap, and a sponge or fairly stiff brush. Hardened grease is very conveniently removed by scraping with a dull knife. Rinse in clean, tepid water, and allow the harness to stand in a warm place until it is no longer wet but still damp. Then oil it and leave it in a warm place for 24 hours before being used. Harness should be oiled or greased while still damp; otherwise, it may take up so much grease that it will pull out of shape or take up sand and grit, which will injure it, as well as spoil its appearance. Harness should never look or feel greasy.

GRADED POTATOES ARE BEST

More Attention to Proper Handling Will Boost Price—Dirt is Most Undesirable.

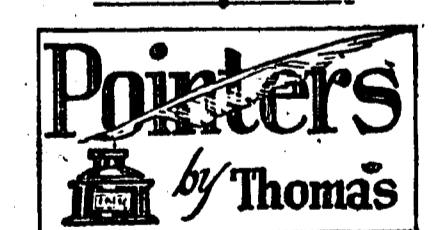
Potatoes properly graded bring a better price than the ungraded product. Whether stored or sold direct, the freer the crop from dirt the better. Provision should be made for storage of 45 to 50 degrees in the storage ventilation and a steady temperature cellar.

WIRE PARTITIONS NOT GOOD

Drafts Permitted Which Are Bad for Young Pigs—Do Not Give Sows Needed Seclusion.

In carrying on experimental work in swine breeding the United States Department of Agriculture has found the use of wire partitions in farrowing houses undesirable and is replacing them with solid wooden divisions about 32 inches high. The wire-fencing partitions permit drafts, which are bad for the comfort and health of the young pigs. Open partitions also permit sows to notice anything going on in adjoining pens, which often causes them to become nervous and irritable, and sometimes to try to fight each other. Sows at farrowing time must be kept as quiet as possible.
