





#### LEGUMES IN IMPROVING SOIL

Thousands of Farmers Have Introduced Various Crops into Their Cropping Systems.

Over 350,000 farmers, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture, introduced legumes, principally soy beans, cowpeas, velvet beans, and alfalfa, into their cropping system as a result of demonstrations in the use of legumes in soil improvement given in 1921 by agricultural-extension agents.

#### **QUAIL DEVOUR MANY BUGS**

Bob-White Is Particularly Fond of Beetles or Adults of Pestiferous Corn Rootworm.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The bob-white eats the adults or beetles of the corn rootworm which "That Girl Montana." adapted lay the eggs that later become larvae from the novel by Marah Ellis Ryan, or worms and infest the corn. As



United States Department of Agriculture, have been found in the stomach of one bob-white. The red-headed woodpecker, nighthawk, cardinal kingbird and phoebe also eat the beetles and reduce the damage done by the corn rootworm.




