LEGUMES IN IMPROVING SOIL

Thousands of Farmers Have Introduced Various Crops into Their Cropping Systems.

Over 350,000 farmers, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture, introduced legumes, principally soy beans, cowpeas, velvet beans, and alfalfa, into their cropping system as a result of demonstrations in the use of legumes in soil improvement given in 1921 by agricultural-extension agents.

QUAIL DEVOUR MANY BUGS

Bob-White Is Particularly Fond of Beetles or Adults of Pesticiferous Corn Rootworm.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The bob-white eats the adults or beetles of the corn rootworm which lay the eggs that later become larvae or worms and infest the corn. As many as 12 of the beetles, according to the bureau of entomology of the

United States Department of Agriculture, have been found in the stomach of one bob-white. The red-headed woodpecker, nighthawk, cardinal, kingbird and phoebe also eat the beetles and reduce the damage done by the corn rootworm.

The floor of the poultry house should be dry. It should always be well bedded with straw.

A platform under the roosts keeps the floor clean and increases the capacity of the house.

Old stone piles which are a breeding place for weasels are dangerous to the poultryman's profit.

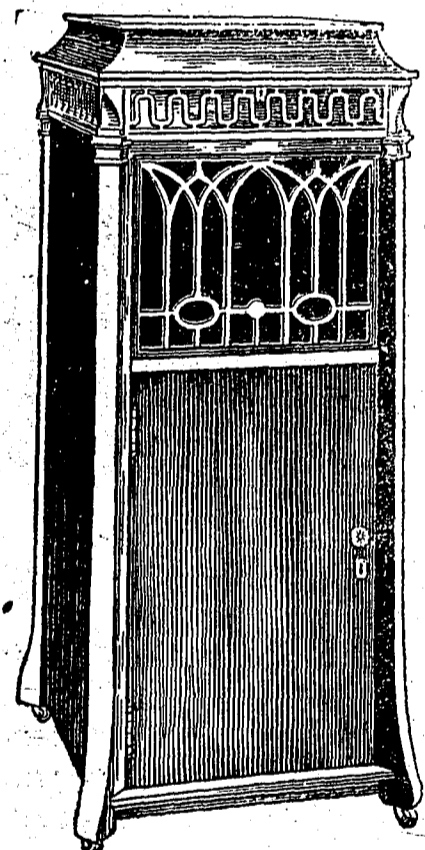
