#### Crispness and Tenderness Come With Rapid Growth

them must grow rapidly. If they grow slowly the leaf crops will be tough and will get strong quickly. Crispness and tenderness come with rapid growth. Peas and beans are better flavored. Radishes are less pithy, the afternoon, races, tug-of-war Corn is deeper and better set, and I think the flavor is better, too.

Rich soil is a prime factor in forcing rapid growth, but it is not all. Cultivation to preserve the soil moisture is a help. Irrigation is not much practiced but where it is possible it will often save a crop from a severe check in a dry spell, and these checks make for toughness.

It has been shown by tests that a little artificial feeding will not only make vegetables better in quality but in many cases will keep such plants as tomatoes setting when ordinarily they stop in hot weather. Then shade or partial shade will often make the leaf crops more tender and sweet.

Save Soil Moisture.

The conservation of soil moisture is one of the most important roles of tillage. The moisture of the soil around the plant is rapidly exhausted by being ' taken up by the plant and evaporated through the leaves.







#### Find Salt Effective in Killing Barberry

Chemicals to Play Important Part in Eradication.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Chemicals will play an important part this year in the eradication campaign against the common barberry, which aids the spread of black stem rust to the wheat fields. Where only the digging method has been practiced it was difficult to remove all the roots, especially in rocky ground or around tree stumps. Where even the smallest fragments of the roots were not destroyed, sprouts have sprung up the following year, necessitating a repetition of the work. In lawns or gardens where a consecution of the work and the consecution of hauling done the places from which bushes have been removed, digging is all right, for In a year or two all roots left at the first digging will have sprouted and can be removed.

To make the eradication of the bushes simple and sure, two chemicals have been found by the United States Department of Agriculture to be effective for use in such places as pastures and wooded lots and along fences where it is difficult either to dig bushes up completely or to locate these two, common or crushed rock with success. The bushes either may be left standing or cut down. If left standing, they are easily focated and the necessity of re-treatment more easily determined.

### Deadly Turkey Disease

Is Traced to Chickens Recent research Indicates that chickens and turkeys-especially turkeyswill not thrive when raised together within comparatively close quarters and small field range. It has been found that blackhead, which is said by investigators to be responsible for 90 per cent of losses among growing turkeys, may be produced in the poults by feeding them the eggs of a small worm found in the blind gut of chickens. The germ which causes blackhead may and does live in the eggs of the common intestinal worm of hens.

"Even turkeys sick with blackhead are not so dangerous to their kind," says Dr. W. A. Billings of the agricultural extension staff, University of Minnesota, "as are common hens or the soil on which the hens are raised. The turkeys should be hatched and raised where they will not come in contact with chickens or chicken yards, for it is possible to produce blackhead in chickens by simply feeding them contaminated soil from a hen yard. Damp weather and early morning dews do not cause blackhead, according to investigators. This upsets a theory long maintained by some poultrymen. In order to contract the disease the turkeys must get the germ. and the fact is established that they often do get it by eating the eggs of the chicken intestinal worm. Doctor Billings says the way to raise turkeys successfully is to protect them from infection which they get from chickens and chicken yards.

#### Green Feed Required for Summer Feeding

There is probably no feed which ex-

iënt mity production. To be sure, the highest records of milk and butterfat have not been made on a grass ration, but in economy of production, grass ranks first.

Good grass is not available during all of the summer months. Eventhough the cows are pastured over a large area containing plenty of grass, there are times in late summer when it becomes dry and of poor quality. If milk production is to be maintained, some provision must be made to furnish the dairy cows a green, succulent ration other than grass during such a period. The soiling system has come to be used rather generally in many dairy sections.

#### Watch Young Plants

Carefully for Bugs Watch young plants carefully for Insects. If aphis appear on cabbage and cauliflower, the infested plants should be removed and the aphis destroyed. If the aphls are wide spread over the plants, they should be sprayed with a nicotine solution. Dust cabbage plants with arsenate of lead to destroy the

#### Alfalfa and Clovers

Sources of Nitrogen Red and alsike clover, as well as alfalfa and sweet clover, have been found to supply 75 to more than 100 pounds more available nitrogen for a following grain crop than does a nonlegume, according to one state agricultural college. These legumes are said to be the cheapest source of nitrogen.

#### Quality Hides Will Bring Higher Prices

Exercise the utmost care in removing hides and skins from the carcass with the idea of avolding cuts and scores. Use fresh, clean salt on hides and skins. There is little strength in spent salt and consequently insufficient curing properties. Quality, hides bring higher prices.

#### Advantages of Motor Trucks in Corn Belt

The experience of other farmers who have owned motortrucks is the best guide in determining if one will prove profitable on a farm and if so what size will prove most profitable, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. Farmers, Bulletin 1314, "Motortrucks on Corn Belt Farms," by H. R. Tolley and L. M. Church of the division of agricultural engineering, is just off the press and gives data based on the experience of over 500 grain and live-stock farmers located in the Corn Belt who have owned motortrucks for more than two years. Well-sprayed orchards, however, have some infestation. In Illinois a large percentage of unsprayed scale was found alive, in some localities as muchas 60 to 80 per cent. Some states are recommending lubricating-oil sprays as developed by the bureau of entomology.

In Idaho there is very heavy infestation of the scale along the shores of the Shake river and on islands in the river. Fruit orchards adjoining are repeatedly reinfested. At Emmett and Parma apple orchards are infested. even in the best-cared-for orchards. In Bolse the pest occurs on currants, pear, cherry, apple and rose.
