



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Must Make Application by July 15.

County' Agent O. S. Fletcher has received word from E. R. Bennett who is in charge of the inspection of potatoes for certification as seed in Idaho, stating that all applications for certification must be made; by July 15. Latah county farmers who have not applied for inspection and who wish to have potatoes inspected this season should apply to County Agent Fletcher at Moscow before that date. The inspection fee this season is \$4.00 for five acres or a traction thereof and fifty cents additional for each acre over five acres. Fitfy percent of the inspection fee must accompany the application.

In applying for certification, tarmers should give their names and addresses, community, variety of putatoes and number of acres to be inspected.





During the last few years, the United States Department of Agriculture has been studying the disease in certain localities and now sums up what is known about it in Department Circular 227, Eastern Blue-Stem of the Black Raspberry, by R. B. Wilcox.


Profits Curtailed. The disease, which is marked by a peculiar curling of the young leaves and blue stripes on the canes, gradually reduces the productivity of the plantations and kills the affected plants in two or three years. In some sections where faspherries have been grown extensively for years profits are curtailed to such an extent that farmers are not encouraged to stay in the business and the center. of production is gradually shifting as disease follows the new plantings. Where investigations have been made the infection of fields has ranged from 0 to 75 per cent, and total loss in the northeastern part of the country is thought to be very large. Some slightly infected patches have been found in Michigan and Wisconsin.

The general effect of blue-stem is a gradual stunting of the plant, with a reduction of the yield and dwarfing of the berries. When affected tips are planted they make little growth, and the following spring they start feebly or not at all. Often the grower may suspect that the trouble is winter-killing. No recoveries have ever been noted. If the affected parts are cut off the disease will soon show up in another part. Plants started by rooting the tips of diseased plants will always have the disease. No bacteria or fungi have yet been found that might be said to be the cause, but certain features of the malady, such as the mottling and deformity of the leaves and the stunting and final death of the plants, indicate that it may be of the mosaic type.

The only practical method to get ahead of blue-stem is to get stock from a nursery known to be free of it and set as far as practicable from diseased plantations. Young fields must be carefully watched and plants showing blue-stem symptoms removed and replaced by healthy tips.



## **Black Raspberry** Hurt by Disease

#### Differ in Adaptation and Yielding Ability and Resistance to Drought.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) There are twelve varieties of dyrum wheat commercially grown in the United States. They differ in their adaptation and yielding ability, resistance to drought and rust, and in the quality of their grain, as well as in their appearance. They are all described by J. Allen'Clark and John H. Martin of the United States Department of Agriculture in Farmer's Bulletin 1304, "The Durum Wheat," just published.

The durum wheats are all spring varieties with thick, compact heads, long stiff beards and large hard kernels. They are grown principally in the northern Great Plains area, where they are best adapted because of their resistance to drought and rust, which enables them to outyield other spring

The distinguishing characteristic and the adaptation of the twelve different varieties are discussed in the bulletin, which may be had free of charge from the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, **D**. C.

#### **Difficulties in Getting** Good. Start of Alfalfa


There are a few difficulties in the way of getting a good start of alfalfa in the spring, and when these are guarded against it is easier than to get red clover started. It is of but little use to seed alfalfa on land which is sour in both surface and subsoil, and even then it is risky until limestone has been applied. Alfalfa can secure the same food from humus as from limestone, but it can get it from the humus only as the humus decays, and during the dry part of the summer the humus may cease to decay sufficiently to supply enough food, and the alfalfa perishes. If plenty of limestone is present the alfalfa may secure the same kind of food even when the humus does not decompose.

#### New and Effective Way to Protect Cucumbers

A new and effective method of controlling the striped cucumber beetles is recommended by the entomology section of the Iowa experiment station. This method consists of dusting the young cucumber plants with a material made of one part of calcium arsenate and twenty parts of gypsum. Plants should be kept thoroughly protected by frequent applications of this dust. This method has been found more effective than the old method of spraying the vines with lead arsenate. The calcium arsenate acts as a poison and the gypsum stimulates plant growth,


