Break Birth Records

Boise, Idaho—One thousand four hundred eighty-eight babies reported by registrars to have been born in Idaho during the month ending July 10 breaks all previous records, according to the bureau of vital statistics at Boise. Records for illegitimate children and twins also were broken, the report showing 16 illegitimate and 28 pairs of twins. Last year there were 57 illegitimate births and the records show 43 for the first six months of 1923.

Of the 1488 babies born, 743 were boys, 740 were girls and the sex of five was not stated. All were white. Parents of 1342 of the babies were born in the United States.

The report also shows that there were 461 deaths during the above reporting period, one of the persons who died being colored. Accidents claimed 27 victims. Ten were killed in automobile accidents, 10 by accidental drowning, 6 were electrocuted by high tension wires, and one was killed by lightning. Organic diseases of the heart claimed 24 persons.
