



Juvenile Disorderly Persons Defined. SECTION 1019, C. S. Every chila within the provisions of this Article who does not attend school, as provided in the preceding section, or who is in attendance at any public, private or parochial school, and is vicious, incorrigible, or immoral in conduct, or who is an habitual truant from school, or who habitually wanders about the streets and public places cupation or employment, or who habitually wanders about the streets in the night time, having no employment or lawful occupation, shall be deemed a juvenile disorderly person, and be subject to the provisions of this Article.

Provided, however, That, in Independent School Districts, and school districts having graded schools, of three or more teachers, the probate court, upon the request of the board of trustees of said district, shall appoint a probation officer living within such district; said probation officer having authority to act upon the request and under the direction of the probate court or board of trustees of said districts. 




