

### EVERYDAY GOOD THINGS

A nice pudding, which may be quick-Bordeaux Pudding. -Cut sponge cake into layers, spread with jam, put together again and cover with sweetened

whipped cream; flavor to taste and sprinkle with chopped nuts. A delicious sauce to serve with fish is pre-

pared as follows: Lemon Catsup.-Mix a tablespoonful of grated horseradish with the

grated rind of four lemons, add three scant tenspoonfuls of salt, the juice of the lemons, three dessertspoonfuls of white mustard, and celery seed, Mr. and Mrs. Jake Berriman four cloves and a few dashes of cayenne pepper. Boil thirty-five minutes and bottle.

Beef Goulash.—Take two pounds of lean beef cut into two-inch squares, three large onions sliced, two tablespoonfuls of fat, one cupful of chopped cabbage, eight small potatoes, two tublespoonfuls of salt, onehalf teaspoonful of paprika, one cupful of boiling water and one-half cupful of milk. Brown the meat in the fat, remove and add the vegetables, fry for five minutes, then add the water and seasoning with the meat, The potatoes are better added after Whitinger and family, Sunday, the cabbage, as they require less time

Potato Soup.—Cook and mash three good-sized potatoes. To a quart of milk (skim milk may be used) add a slice of onion and a stalk of celery; scald and remove the vegetables and pour over the mashed potato. In a saucepan put two tablespoonfuls of butter-four if skimmed milk is used -and two tablespoonfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of salt, and cook until well blended; add to the soup and when smooth serve with toasted

Chestnut Cakes .- Cook a pound of chestnuts fifteen minutes, shell and skin them, then cook in boiling water until tender. Rub through a sieve and to every cupful of chestnut puree add one egg yolk; season with sait and pepper, dip into egg and fry in butter. Serve with broiled steak.

When Pullet Is Laying

Whether a pullet has started laying or not is easily learned by merely examining the distance between the lay bones. If these are spread so that three fingers may be placed between them, it may safely be assumed that she has commenced laying. Early layers produce the most eggs while the tardiest ones are the slackers even after commencing. By going through the flock of pullets after most of them have begun laying, the few that show no signs of productivity may be mar-

### REINDEER HER MEAT







### RELICS OF GODS FOUND IN ITALY

Discovered on Site of Sanctuary of Demeter.

Rome.—Interesting excavations have been undertaken by Prof. Ettore Gabrici, director of the Palermo museum, on the site of the ancient sanctuary of Demeter Malophoros at Selinunte, near Palermo.

An enormous number of objects of historical and artistic value have been excavated. Of these stone, bronze and terra cotta votive offerings and decorations there are several thousand. All have been taken to the Palermo museum to be examined, docketed, studied and placed in order on the shelves.

The work of removing these treasures from the deposit where they had been imbedded on account of the filtering of the rains of many centuries was slow and difficult. One very interesting lot consists of lanterns, with selidduring ceremonials. Here, just as at Eleusis, the rite was proscribed, for the goddess Demeter was worshiped at night. That she was a popular deity is placed on her shrine. She later became the goddess Ceres of the Romans and undoubtedly was considered very powerful. Though there is no definite date in which this rite was introduced into Selinunte, from the decorations found in the courtyard of the sanctuary it dates back to the Seventh cen-

tury B. C. City Founded by Greeks.

Evidently when the city was founded by the Greek colonists from Megara Hatblea they built the sanctuary when they built the fortress. As was the custom in ancient Greek communities when, for one reason or another a group which was dissatisfied with the home town decided to found a colony the matter was discussed and the Oracle was consulted in regard to the choice of a leader.

Thus it was that in Megara, capital of Megaris, one mile from the sea, opposite the island of Salamis, a number of colonists wished to go to the island of Sicily and found a colony, which they named Megara Hyblaen. From this first colony, others were founded throughout Sicily, including Selinunte. in 628 B. C. It began brilliantly, and from its ruined buildings one can see that it was of great importance and

grandeur. But this state of predominance lasted only until 408 B. C., a short two hundred years, when it was destroyed by the Carthaginians, as they feared its competition. It was partly rebuilt, but never regained its importance, and was for a second time destroyed after the Punic war in 250 B. C., when it was left as the modern excavators found

The present excavations are all the more important, as they throw light on a city of which only the mere outlines of history are known.

Feminine Figures Crumble. There are innumerable tanagra heads, but the feminine figures have crumbled. One very interesting slab of yellow tufo, equal in artistic value to any bas-relief of the Acropolis, represents Proscrpine when carried to the lower regions by Adoneus.

It is the oldest, possibly the earliest, representation of the fable of Proserpine and at first it was thought to be a tablet commemorating symbolic dances. Further inspection proved that it told in a series of designs the story of Proserpine, Though neither in the Hiad nor the Odyssey is this tradition related, in the whole of ancient Sicily the story was linked with the worship of Demeter, Proscrptue's

chios, the Greek counterpart of the god Jupiter. He was the accepted god of the sky by all Greeks long before the Homeric age. He was allied to Demeter, the earth goddess, and hence his effigies were placed in her temple. He Greek commandment "Thou shalt not remove thy neighbor's landmark," was attributed to an order issued by Zeus Milichios, the dread deity of the ghost world whom the singer had to placate And evidently in Sociaunte there were many who sought to please him,

In many cases there are also votive offerings of the people of the coun-

Heads Only Reveal Beauty. What is more important in these obfects are the designs in terra cotta, figures of great variety and perfect in design. Unfortunately none of them is intact: only the heads remain as evidence of their great beauty.

Without doubt these are the most important excavations in recent years in Sicily, as they throw new light on the civilization of the early Greek col onles throughout the island. Profes sor Gabrici is busily compiling a book of his studies on what he has excavated.

Professor Gabrici's success in excavating has induced the government to reconstruct the Temple of the Fortress, in a similar manner as was accomplished at Girgentl, when the columns of the Temple of Jove were raised from the ground.

### SHIP IS TOWED BY BIG WHALE

Alaskan Monster Weighs About 100 Tons.

Tacoma, Wash .- The greatest whaling season ever experienced at Alas-

kan stations has been recorded this year, declare skippers, whose vessels are arriving here for winter wharfage. Close to 500 whales were caught and processed during the summer. Whaling, which began off Kodiak island May 1, kept 18 ships busy for months, about 40,000 barrels of oil and an enormous quantity of fertilizer being prepered for shipment. No ambergris was found this season.

The largest whale harpooned this season measured 86 feet. The world's record whale is 98 feet 6 inches. The Alaskan monster, weighing about 100 tons, straightened out 400 feet of heavy hauser, besides towing the whaler seven miles before tiring out.

Whales were attracted to Alaskan waters this season, it is believed, by large schools of small fish, squids and hallbut. Years when these species are abundant, whales are numerous. Sperm whales arrived in large numbers.

It is now thought the feeding grounds for sperm and finback whales lies off the coast of Africa, and by the end of October practically all of the Alaskan leviathans will have started for winter haunts.

The whale oil from the season's catch has been marketed in the East with soap makers, steel and leather manufacturers.

A shipment of 300 saited whale tails were brought down destined for Japanese markets where this section of the mammal is as popular as turkey in America.






