





#### IDAHO FARM CALENDER FROM STATE UNIVERSITY

#### Dairying

Fly repellant or sprays give only temporary relief and do not materially reduce the number of flies. Attempts to screen against flies in dairy barns have also resulted unsatisfactorily. In too many cases the flies follow the cows inside, and the screens act as a method of caging the pests in the barn rather than a means of keeping them out. In fact, no measure except destruction of natural breeding places has proven effective.—F. W. Atke-

#### Poultry

A bright sunny morning is desirable for moving chicks to range houses. The chicks will return to their range houses better if they are confined, fed, and watered in their new surroundings for a day or two. Once on range, it is not advisable to change pullets from one house to another as it usually cuts down the appetite and slows down their development.—R. T. Parkhurst.

#### Agronomy

Experiments conducted at the Aberdeen substation to determine the best time for irrigating alfalfa grown for seed show that the plant should be allowed to make a slow but steady growth. Frequent and light applications proved much better than one heavy irrigation.—A. E. McClymonds.

#### Horticulture

No man should engage in garden seed production unless he will take the pains to study well the types of various strains he is growing and will eliminate all plants not conforming strictly to the type geing grown. That is, he must rogue his field systematically. Unless he does this, and will take the pains to select for a particularly desirable tpye, he will always have diffculty in disposing of his crop to reputable seedsmen for remunerative prices.-C. C. Vincent.






