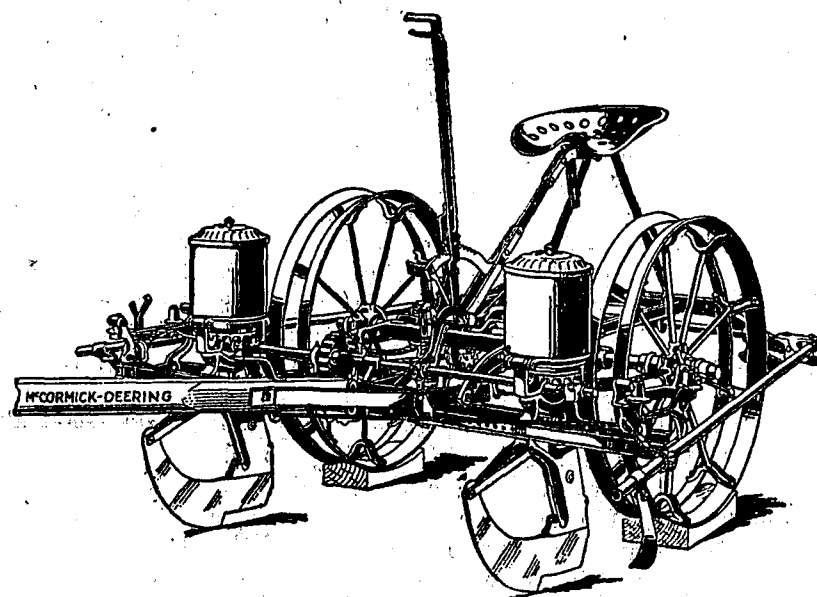

To Build Cameron Road

Bids have been invited on two small links of highway in the vicinity of Cameron on the main road from Kendrick to Southwick, it is announced by County Engineer W. P. Hughes. One link south of Cameron eliminates a heavy grade and cuts off 1,100 feet in distance.

The approximate quantities in the projects are 4,000 cubic yards of common excavation, 2,840 station yards of overhaul, 500 cubic yards of borrow, and one wooden cattle pass.

The proposals will be opened today at the office of Mr. Hughes in Lewiston.

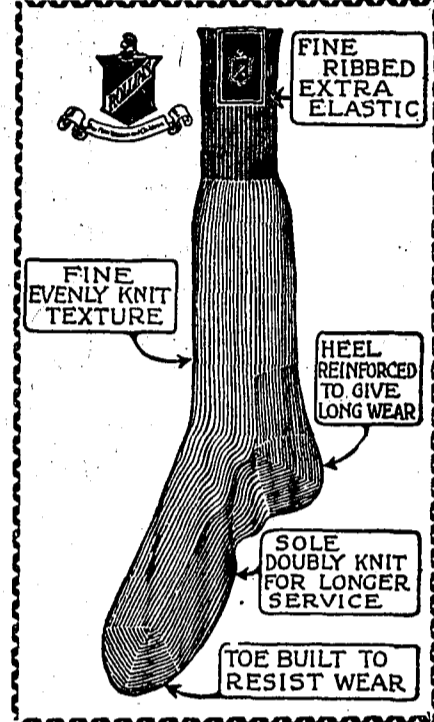
