#### No Trace of Lost Hunter

With a searching party numbering at times as high as 200 persons, under the direction of Sheriff Summerfield, hunting the woods in the vicinity of Harvard for the 27 year old Genesee man, R. C. Kleweno, no traces have as yet been discovered. The young man had been lost since Tuesday of last week and not a sign of him has been found since he left his companions who were on a hunting trip with him near Harvard. It was thought for a time that those who were looking for him had found where he had tried to build a fire but it was later learned that members of the searching party had done this. It is said that the search will be continued indefinitely, but little or no hope is held that the unfortunate man will be found alive.

### HAPPENINGS IN KENDRICK TWENTY YEARS AGO

#### Taken From Gazette Published in 1906.

A. H. Smith of Leland was in town Wednesday. Mr. Smith has recently purchased the hardware stock of Inman & Co. of that place and is now one of the merchants of the hill town.

R. C. West, deputy game warden, assisted by Martin Thomas, distributed 10 cans of fish at different points in the Potlatch. The fish were put off here the first of the week by the government car sent out from the hatchery in Dakota, which has been placing brook trout and bass at all the stations along.

Joe Long, proprietor and editor of the Potlatch Herald, has transferred the plant to A. K. Carlson, who is at the present time teaching school at Harrisburg, Idaho. Mr. Long will continue the publication of the paper until the first of the year. After that time he will leave here, but has not fully decided where he will go.

N. Brocke and Charles Hamlin are summoned as jurors in the district court of Latah county which meets at Moscow.

Dr. J. E. Hoyt of Moscow whose card is in this issue is assisting Dr. Rothwell and will look after his practice while he takes a much needed vacation. Dr. Hoyt comes highly recommended, having assisted Dr. Gritman of Moscow and has been physician of the Potlatch Lumber Co. at the latter town.

Kendrick the metropolis of the Potlatch region is on a cash basis and the town also enjoys the distinction of being the first important grain shipping point in the Inland Empire to pay cash for wheat since the development of the financial stringency.

### Panhandle Poultry Show

A Poultryman's Day luncheon at the Hotel Moscow, will be a special feature of the twelfth annual show of the Panhandle Poultry association which is to be held in Moscow, December 14, 15 and 16, it has been announced. The luncheon, at which time talks will be made by prominent poultrymen and agriculturists, is sponsored by the Moscow Chamber of Commerce.

The annual poultry institute will be another special event of importance. It is to be held on Wednesday afternoon in the Vandal theatre. Addresses will be given by Pren Moore, University of Idaho extension specialist; Prof. John C. Carver, head of the Washington State College department of poultry husbandry; M. R. Lewis, head of agricultural engineering, University of Idaho; and R. T. Parkhurst, University of Idaho poultry husbandman. The speaking program will be followed by a motion picture entitled, "Cooperative Marketing on the Pacific Coast."

The show itself promises to be the largest in history. Entries are being received from all parts of the Inland Empire. The Williamson building, at the corner of First and Main streets will, as usual, house the exhibits.

Entries will be received until noon, Monday, December 13, and all birds must be in place by 8:30 o'clock Tuesday morning. Judging will start at 9 o'clock Tuesday. Pren Moore, university specialist, will judge.

Entries are being received by C. W. Hungerford, secretary, at Moscow. Members of the association's board of directors are Edward Solberg, Troy; F. E. Leeper, Lewiston; E. H. Rosenkrantz, Colfax; Wash. J. E. Horton, Spokane, Wash.; E. G. Wride, Garfield, Wash.; Archie Haynes, Erick Oller and Beecher Beal, of Moscow; R. T. Parkhurst, Moscow, is president.

### Lewiston School Bonds Carry

The bond election held in Lewiston last Tuesday for the purpose of voting \$275,000 bonds for school purposes, carried by a vote of 973 to 213. It required a two-thirds vote to carry the election. The money will be used for constructing a new \$250,000 high school building and \$25,000 will be spent on a five-room addition to the Lewiston Orchards school house.

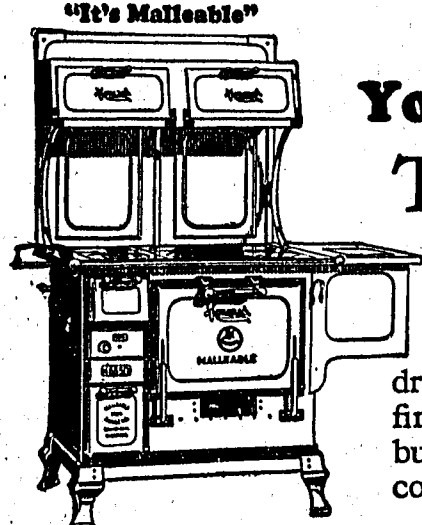

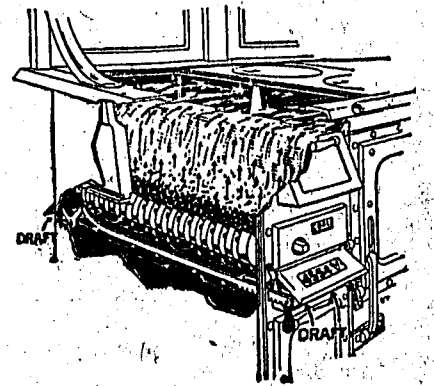

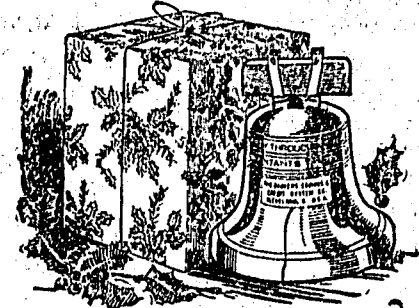
