Feather-Eating Hens

Feather eating is a habit that seems to occur most often when the hens are overcrowded, idle, and hungry for something which seems to be lacking in the ration. The best remedy is to turn the hens on range where they will separate and become interested in scratching for a living.

Feed a balanced dry mash containing meat scrap and this may reduce the feather pulling. Hang a piece of raw beef in the house for the hens to peck at.

Birth Weight of Calves

There is considerable difference in the birth weight of calves of different breeds. This factor is of importance when calves are raised for veal but the most important function of dairy cows. According to Eckles, the following weights of calves represent about an average for the breed: Jersey, 55 pounds; Guernsey, 71 pounds; Ayrshire, 72 pounds; Holstein, 90 pounds; Brown Swiss, 100 pounds, and Dairy Shorthorn, 73 pounds.

Dirt and Board Floors Each Have Advantages

Dirt and board floors each have their advantages. If the top soil is inclined to be of a sandy loam, well drained and inclined to dry quickly, the earth floor will be all right. In any case, dirt floors should be a few inches above the land outside so there will be no trouble from water running in and standing. A board floor should be put in some little distance above the ground so rats will not make a harbor under there, and so as to allow the air to circulate under it and prevent dampness to rot the floor. A floor should be well sanded, so it will not be too hard upon the fowls' feet.

Or covered with a good lot of litter. A nice cement floor makes the finest and most satisfactory floor of all.

Poultry Notes

The sun should not shine on the incubator. Watch this through the day.

The Toulouse goose is the larger variety, but the Embden has the longer legs.

Eggs should be kept in a dry as well as a cool place; moisture lessens the impervious character of the shells, and permits the entrance of germs if the shell is soiled.

While it is difficult to get absolute uniformity of color in the eggs of the American and brown-shelled breeds, chalky white is the desired color.

Egg production is often cut short by a limited supply of water. A flock will stop laying sooner if kept without water than if kept without food.

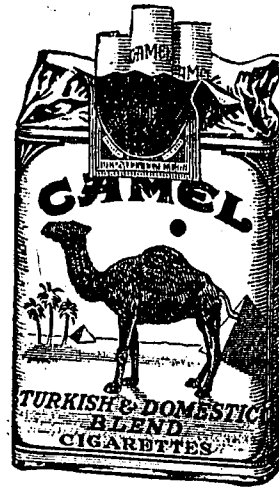

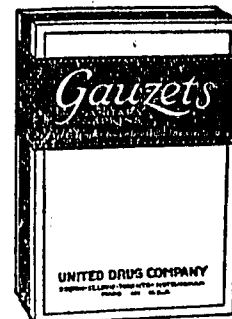

Lawn Clippings Useful

Feed for Laying Hens
Experiments conducted for the last four years at the Idaho agricultural experiment station have shown that the vitamin content of a ration for laying hens is exceedingly important.

Lawn clippings when used as a green feed proved almost as valuable as cod liver oil in preventing mortality from vitamin deficiency, in increasing production and profits over feed cost, and in increasing hatchability. This was found true when the clippings were used with a well-balanced ration from 1924 to 1926.

Results of trial conducted over a two and one-half-year period indicated that dried yeast, under the conditions of the experiment, was not necessary. A one-year trial of orange juice and a six months trial with lettuce indicated that both contain sufficient vitamins to prevent vitamin A deficiency.
