
#### Entertain Okoke Club

Some of the famous lakes of the world appear insignificant when compared with those of the state we live in. The highest peak in England is 1,300 feet above sea; our Mt. Hyndman is nearly ten times as high. England's largest lake is the famous Windermere, ten miles long and less than a mile wide. Few English-speaking people but have heard of Lake Katrine in Scotland, seene of Scott's "Lady of the Lake." It is about onefifteenth the size of Pend d' Oreille or Bear Lake. Ellen's Isle, around which the fair heroine paddled her canoe, covers less than three acres. If one of our Coeur d' Alene steamers were launched on Katrine, the water would overflow and be wasted. The Scotch people would never stand for that.

Salt or Fresh

Idaho has no important lakes that are salt or likely to become so. Some of the earth's salt lakes, such as the Caspian Sea, were formerly parts of the ocean, later cut off by some volcanic or other distributing action.

Most salt lakes were formerly larger bodies of fresh water whose surfaces long ago fell below their outlet and have been kept down by evaporation. The Dead Sea lies 1,300 feet below sea level; it has nowhere to go. The Great Salt lake was once an enormous body of fresh water. It long ago fell below its outlet into Snake River, so that minerals flowing into it do not escape. It is still falling, and has become a saturated solution; it covers only one-tenth of its ancient area and has decreased in extreme depth from 1,100 to about 56

The term "salt" lake tends to convey a wrong idea. Dead Sea water is more than 22 percent mineral, but contains twice as much lime and magnesia as salt.

Antelope Lake, in Bonner county, altho small, is a typical "salt" lake. It has an area of 25 acres, is fed by mineralized streams and has no outlet. It contains much insect life and some thirty years ago was artificially stocked with German brown trout. For a time these fish increased rapidly, but the few that still survive are so impregnated with mineral as to be unfit for food. The day will come when all animal life in Antelope Lake will have disappeared; it will be as dead as the Dead Sea.

How Idaho's Lakes were Formed Such lakes as Payette, Pend d' Oreille, and Coeur d' Alene, are expansions of river channels; like Bear and Gray lakes, they occupy great natural depressions in the earth's surface. Antelope, probably Lake Waha, and several smaller pools, are in volcanic craters.

But the greatest number of our mountain waters, such as the Redfish group, are the result of glacial action. In some cases they lie in depressions caused by the breaking down of the earth's surface under the enormous weight of glaciers hundreds of feet deep; in others, they are ponds held by dams or moraines formed at the melting feet of ancient glaciers.




