### Poultry Items

Sweet or sour milk seems to give equally good results in chick feeding.

Colds and roup are preventable diseases. If we remove the causes the diseases will not occur.

Watch for the pullets that lay early, and mark them. They make the high producers—the ones to get next spring's hatching eggs from.

Geese are the best grazers of all poultry. A large part of their diet after the first four weeks is composed of green feed. For this reason they cannot be reared successfully unless feed of this kind is furnished.

### Cool Cream Immediately After It Is Separated

Cool the cream immediately after separation by setting the can in cold water. The spoiling of cream as well as the decomposition and putrefaction of other foodstuffs is caused by germ life, bacteria, yeast and molds. Like other living organisms, germs require warmth to thrive. In the absence of warmth they are inactive and are unable to continue their work of destruction. When the cream comes from the separator it is warm and in ideal condition for bacterial decomposition and spoiling. If it is cooled promptly the activity of the bacteria is checked and the cream will keep sweet for a reasonable length of time. The lower the temperature to which it is cooled the longer it will keep in normal condition. Cooling to the temperature of the water available on the average farm alone greatly retards bacterial action and prevents spoiling.

### Dairy Facts

Use well-bred dairy cows.

Allow free access to salt daily.

Follow the practice of the most successful dairymen.

Use well-balanced rations made from a variety of feeds.

Give cows six to eight weeks of rest between lactation periods.

Good pasture grass holds a place in the list of delicacies for dairy cows which no other feed can quite fill.

The ability of grass to produce milk is generally overestimated, and a cow cannot maintain a heavy flow of milk on grass alone.

Supply an abundance of pure fresh water never colder than that of a deep well.

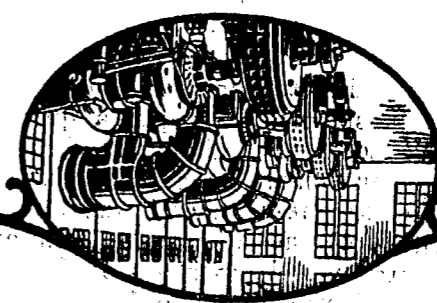

## Individual Feed Record Will Determine Profit

Feeding, more than anything else, determines the profit a cow makes. The average cow is fed carelessly. Too often the farmer feeds the same amount to each animal. A cow cannot produce the greatest amount of milk it is possible for her to produce and do it profitably unless the amount of grain fed her is enough to first meet her bodily needs with enough extra to make the highest yield of milk she is capable of giving.

Increased profits of from 25 to 100 per cent can be secured by any farmer who will adopt the simple method of feeding each of his cows according to her individual production. This means weighing each cow's daily milk production two successive days each month, and then feeding each individual cow a pound of good grain feed each day for every two and one-half to three pounds of milk she produces, if she is of the Jersey or Guernsey breed, and a pound of grain for every three and one-half to four pounds if she is of the Holstein breed.

## Feeding Good Cows Grain as Pasture Is Insufficient

"Grass alone is not enough," declares A. J. Cramer, supervisor of Wisconsin Herd Improvement associations, speaking in terms of summer milk production in Wisconsin.

While a firm believer in the fact that it pays to feed grain to good cows, whatever the pasture conditions are, Cramer insists that this season, with pastures being unusually short, many Wisconsin dairy cows will not receive sufficient nutrients to maintain milk production and body flesh, unless their pasturage is supplemented with grain.

A ration containing about 50 to 75 per cent corn, oats, barley, or hominy will help to maintain the physical condition of our cows, he says. Grass alone will furnish milk, but how long will this heavy milk flow last, without some grain feed to help keep it up, and to hold some of that body weight on our cows? he asks.  
To the doubtful one, he suggests trying grain feeding on one or two cows to learn if it pays.

## Silage From Grains

It is fast becoming common practice to use small grains in the making of silage. Any of the small grains may be put into the silo alone or mixed with other crops. Pans and oats form a popular mixture in certain sections of the country. This crop should be cut when the kernel is in the dough stage, also cut fine and packed firmly in the silo. Silage from small grains is usually inferior to that of corn silage, but superior to legume silage.

## Dairy Hints

- Have cows in good flesh.
- Follow a regular schedule of daily work.
- Treat cows gently and avoid exciting them.
- Weigh the milk of each cow at each milking time.
- Provide a comfortable box stall or suitable place for calving.
- Regulate the amount of feed by the milk records and the individuality of the cow.
- Let every dairyman remember that the dairy barn is the "kitchen" in which milk is made.
- Join a cow testing association and other organizations that help one to practice up-to-date methods of managing a dairy herd.
- Using milk pails with small tops and clipping the cows' udders and tails will help in keeping down the bacteria content of milk.
- Begin using ice for the milk and cream that is held on the farm. If there is not an ice supply, pipe spring water to the tank in the milkhouse or where the milk is kept.

## Best Woods Food

The rule of the woods is that a man can do very well on three pounds of assorted foods per day, and out of that given three pounds of food, three teen ounces per day is reserved for panache. It is one necessary item that must be considered so far as food is concerned; it will stay with you longer per given portion than any other food and produce in proportion a far greater amount of energy.—For est and Stream Magazine

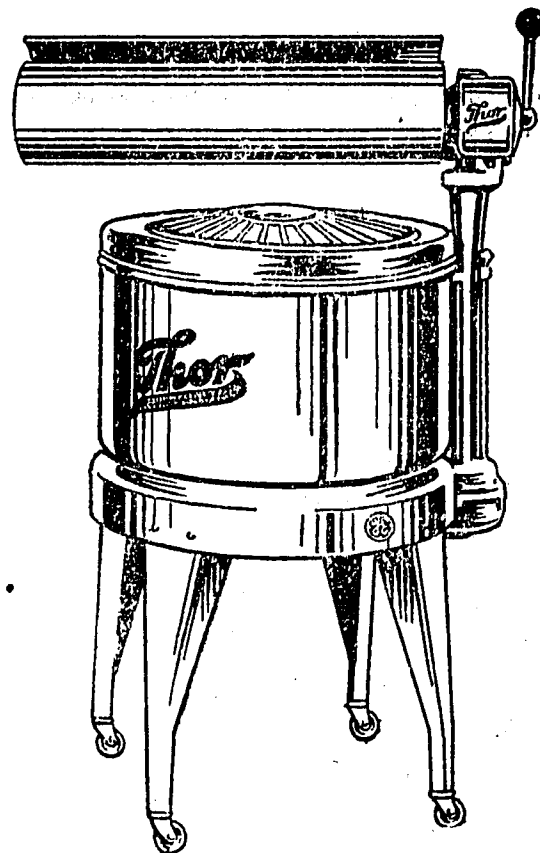
