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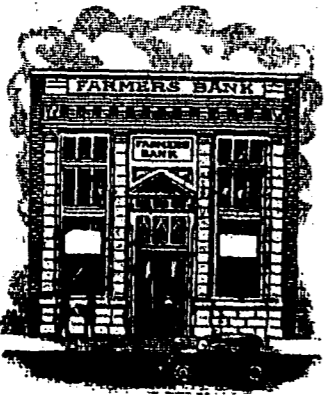

N. Idaho and 1930 should be our best year.

A publicity campaign has been instituted by the Spokane dailies to carry the message of the Inland Empire and its resources to 250,000 of the leading sales and advertising executives of the nation.

There will be \$50,000 worth of the finest poultry produced in the west at the Western Royal Poultry show which will be held one week in Spokane starting December 9. There will be 1,000 birds on exhibit, some of them valued at \$500 and more. Cash and merchandise prizes amounting to \$1500 will be offered.

The Moscow Star-Mirror says that "from a financial as well as a civic standpoint Moscow's first air circus proved itself a success Sunday and Monday. Hundreds of people were brought into the city from the surrounding country and several thousands witnessed the aerial exhibition either from the airport field or from nearby fields or roads which furnished points of vantage.

While actual receipts account for approximately 2000 people that got into the airport grounds, a great number failed to pay, difficulty being experienced the first day to handle the crowds that streamed by auto and on foot through the gate. A better system Monday checked much of the non-paying admissions."

The Idaho Electro-Chemical company, an Arizona concern, plans to construct a huge hydroelectric plant on the Snake river. Articles of incorporation for the company were filed at Grangeville Tuesday.

At the meeting of the North Idaho chamber of commerce in St. Maries this week, the highway committee of the Lewiston chamber will offer a proposal that the state issue bonds to finance the completion of its highway system. The North Idaho chamber will be asked to present the plan to the legislature at the next session.

It is said that seven copper claims recently developed six miles from Kamiah will become high grade producers of copper in the near future.

GIGANTIC RUM RING IS DISCOVERED

The federal grand jury has discovered what appears to be a gigantic liquor ring in the Coeur d'Alene area of north Idaho. Forty-four public officials and prominent citizens have been indicted for conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act, according to H. E. Ray, United States attorney. Among those indicted are Sheriff Winegar of Shoshone county, Deputy C. Bloom of Wallace, and several members of the city council in Mullan. Attorney Ray told a reporter of the Star-Mirror that "It is my belief that the action taken by the grand jury against these men was the greatest step forward ever taken in the history of Idaho to break up a rum ring which has defied the efforts of federal officers to enforce the 18th amendment for eleven years."
