February 1, Deadline

The attention of motorists is called to the fact that February 1 has been set as the deadline for the procuring of 1930 automobile license plates and unless you have the new tag on your machine by that date you will be subject to arrest and fine, according to the state law.

Your attention is also called to the fact that you must show title to your machine before a license can be issued to you. There has been some considerable trouble and delay in procuring the plates on this account in the past. A bill of sale or other evidence of ownership must be in your possession when application is made for plates.

In Washington January 1 was the deadline but you will still find those in Washington and Idaho, who are willing to "take a chance" just the same.

At a regular meeting of Kendrick Lodge No. 26 A. F. and A. M. on December 26, 1929, the following officers were chosen for the ensuing year:



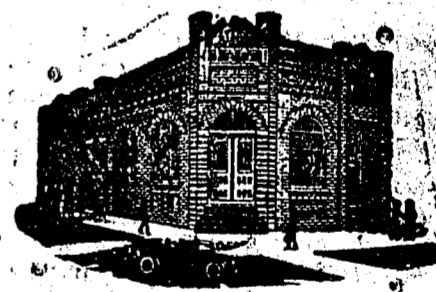
