



NAMES AND GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF ELECTION PRECINCTS.

Names of Registrars Appointed, and Location of Each Polling Place; Also Notice for Registration for the Primary Election to be Held August 5th, 1930; and for the General Election to be Held November 4th, 1930.

NOTICE is hereby given that in compliance with the Primary and General Election Laws of the State of Idaho, the Board of County Commissioners in and for Latah County, State of Idaho, have established the Boundaries of the Voting Precincts in said County, and have named the Registrar and designated the Polling Place for each Precinct, as hereinafter set forth.

Registration may be made before the regular Registration officer of the precinct, during each Saturday, including and from the first day of May, to and including the second Saturday preceding the primary election, and on the Saturday following such primary election, to and including the second Saturday preceding the general election.

R. 3 W. B. M., thence westerly about 2 1/4 miles to where the said section line intersects said Pine Creek, thence in a northeasterly direction up Pine Creek to the place of beginning.

**ALL WORK AND NO PAY—  
"HOME WORK" SCHEME**

In spite of the intensive work that has been done by the Better Business bureaus all over the United States and the drastic action that has been taken by the United States postal department, the so-called "Home Work Scheme" continues to operate. This scheme takes advantage of the desire on the part of many wives and mothers to help out with the family expenses by trying to do some kind of money-making work at home. The victim's attention is attracted by an advertisement in some magazine or newspaper which makes some such offer as this: "Ladies wanted to sew aprons at home. We pay \$12 to \$15 a dozen. All materials furnished. Write to So-and-So Dress Company for particulars."

In response to her request the home

worker receives a circular which tells in glowing terms how easy and pleasant the work is and how nice it will be to have a nice sum of money coming in each week. "Just send \$1.50 for complete outfit, sample lot of material all cut out for you, and complete instructions." She sends the \$1.50 and soon gets her "outfit." To her disappointment, however, she soon finds that it is impossible to make any money making these aprons at the price the advertiser now offers which is not the \$12 or \$15 a dozen offered in the advertisement, but \$2.50 a dozen. If the patient homemaker should go through with it and send in a completed dozen of garments she learns that they are not quite up to "standard" and is requested to "try again." Then she comes to the realization that all the advertiser wanted was to get her deposit for the "outfit" and that

the firm is not interested in whether or not the homemaker can make any money sewing aprons or smocks or whatever the garment may be. Disillusioned, she decides to charge it up to experience.

Sewing aprons or smocks is but one of a multitude of these "Home Work Schemes." The making of neckties, garters, table cloths, bed spreads, dresses, gilding cards, addressing envelopes, distributing advertising hand bills and slipping news items to be sold—the list is a long one. But in every one of these schemes that has been brought to the attention of the Better Business bureau there is always a demand for a deposit on the part of the homemaker, to show "good faith." Seldom is the deposit mentioned in the advertisement. That is reserved for follow-up literature. The real purpose of the advertisers is, of course,

to get the deposit for the outfit. Profitable spare time work for those who reply to these advertisements seems to be remote from the minds of the advertisers.

The Better Business bureaus have examined dozens of these schemes and there is no record of anyone who has found the average home work scheme a money making proposition—for the homemaker.

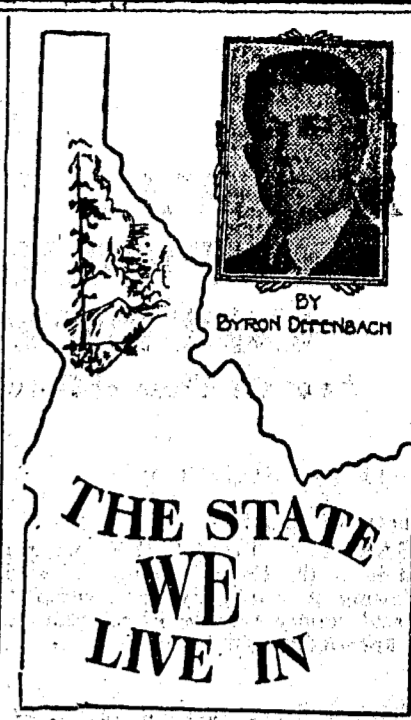
No matter what kind of a proposition you receive in the mail, whether in response to your inquiry in answering an advertisement or sent you unsolicited, if any deposit is required or if the proposition doesn't look exactly right, take it up with the Better Business bureau, whose files are filled with information on countless fake and fraudulent schemes and questionable concerns.

**The River of Whirlpools**

In November, 1811, the celebrated Astorian expedition under Wilson Price Hunt, came across the desert from Snake river probably along the present Mountain Home highway. Freezing, thirsting, starving, they arrived one afternoon at the camp of a band of thievish Indians on the banks of what the latter called the "Whinast" or "River of Whirlpools." The stream had likely been seen a few days earlier by another detachment of the same party, but so far as recorded history relates the Boise river and the site of our state capitol was discovered by young Wilson Price Hunt on November 21, 1811.

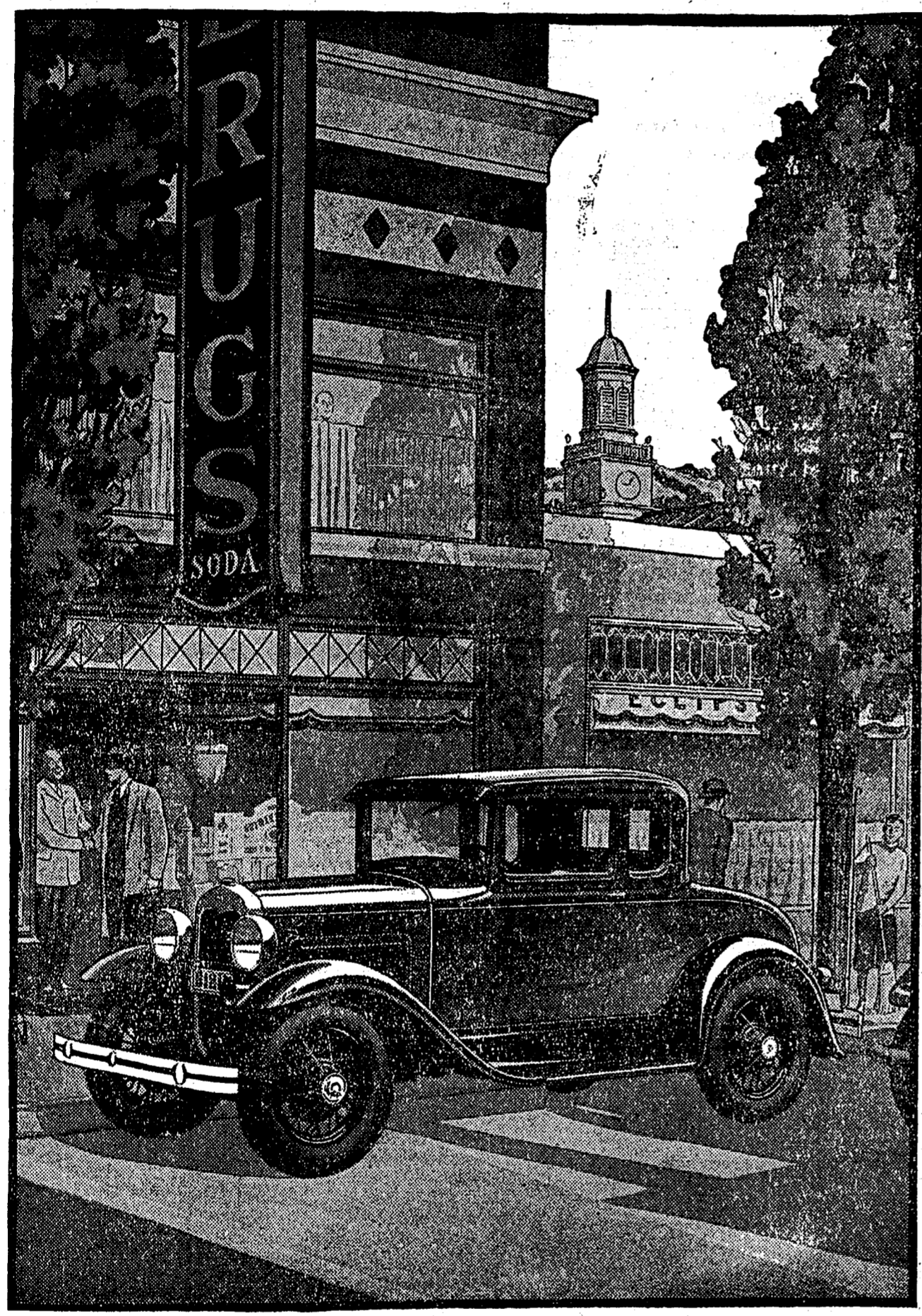
The Hunt group of 23, including the famous Dorion family, went on down the south side of the river, camping near Eagle and Caldwell, fording the stream below Parma, thence following the Snake across the mouths of the Payette and Weiser, down into the yawning depths of Box canyon. Finding it impossible to proceed farther they came back to Weiser and following about the present railroad line finally reached Astoria.

Seven men of these Astorians, again accompanied by the Dorions, later came back to the Boise, and in January, 1814, the men were all killed by Indians. The trappers were in two groups, one about at Caldwell, the other above Boise. The woman and little boys made their way back to friendly Indians on the Columbia. After the massacre the river was called "Reed's river" for many years, in honor of the leader of the trappers, the honest, impetuous, reckless Irishman, John Reed. The present name of Boise, meaning "The Woods," was given the river by a detachment of Captain Bonneville's Frenchmen.

The Boise river has an average normal flow of 3,000 second feet. Its sources are in the Sawtooth mountains, in seven different counties. Just below its principal forks is the famous Arrowrock dam, completed in 1915—248 feet high and furnishing storage for 290,000 acre feet of water. Below the dam the river receives its main tributary, Moores creek, which drains the Boise basin, one of the great placer gold fields of our early history. Above the capital city the Boise is a typical mountain stream, its swift current running between high banks. The lower river is a fickle and shifting current whose wide level valley has nearly all been reclaimed and is Idaho's most densely populated area.

The river of whirlpools has played a great part in our past, and occupies a prominent place in our present. The first of the Reed party, to fall was the French-Canadian squaw man, Delaunay, a gloomy, sombre, sulky fellow whose thrilling career reached its tragic close late in 1813, when his scalped and mangled body was thrown into the brush near the river.

Pierre Delaunay was the first white man to be killed by Indians in what is now Idaho.
