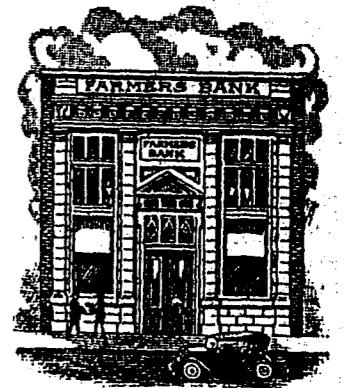

**WHEAT DROPS TO NEW LOW LEVEL FOR SEASON**

Markets were about the same as during the previous week, totaling 3,646 cars for seven of the larger markets. Receipts at Kansas City averaged slightly lower in protein than a week ago, the average for the 1,289 cars inspected being 12.5 per cent. Mills were fairly active buyers of good quality milling wheat, but export takings were negligible with export bids well below current market quotations.

At the close of the market on Sept. 12 ordinary protein No. 1 hard winter was quoted at Kansas City at 79 to 80c, with 12 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent protein bringing a 2c to 3c premium over ordinary types. No. 2 hard winter, ordinary protein was quoted at Omaha at 79c per bushel and No. 1 hard winter at Fort Worth delivered Galveston export rate at 92c to 93c per bushel. Offerings of soft red winter wheat were hardly equal to current trade needs and some wheat was taken from store to supply mill orders. Mills were reluctant to advance bids, but prices held generally steady.

Pacific Coast markets appeared independently weak, reflecting the liberal offerings of new crop grain and continued dull demand. Milling grades were especially weak, prices on Bluestem at Portland declining 4c per bushel during the week. At the close of the market Sept. 12 Big Bend bluestem or early baart hard white was quoted at 96c, soft and western white at 79 $\frac{1}{2}$ c and hard winter, northern spring and western red at 77 $\frac{1}{2}$ c epr bushel, basis No. 1 sacked. Montana No. 1 dark northern spring in bulk with 14 per cent protein was quoted at 89c and No. 1 dark hard winter, 14 per cent protein, at 86c per bushel. No. 1 western white was quoted at Seattle at 79 $\frac{1}{2}$ c, No. 1 hard winter and western red at 78c and No. 1 Big Bend bluestem hard white at 97c, No. 1 dark hard winter 14 per cent protein, from Montana in bul kat 88c and dark northern at 89c epr bushel. Domestic mills were moderate buyers of wheat at Portland but flour was reduced about 20c per barrel. A good export flour demand was reported from China and sales of around 100,000 barrels were reported for the week at about \$4.00 per barrel. Export sales of wheat were of moderate volume with around 6,000 tons of white and red wheats taken by the United Kingdom and Continental buyers. Farmers were reported not selling freely at prevailing low prices but making heavy deliveries to country warehouses where storage space is becoming scarce.

California wheat markets were also dull and lower with demand relatively light. Trading in local wheat was of small volume, as growers were marketing remaining supplies very slowly at prevailing prices, which are averaging about 60c per 100 lower than a year ago. Outside wheat was being offered considerably cheaper than local wheat and many mills were supplying their needs from these offerings. No. 2 soft white wheat from Washington and Oregon was quoted at \$1.40 to \$1.50 per 100 sacked, delivered on dock at San Francisco. No. 3 hard winter from the Inter-Mountain states was offered at \$1.42 in bulk delivered California points. No. 2 soft white from the Klamath Falls district was offered delivered at \$1.60 per 100 for rail shipment.

Demand at Los Angeles was also limited to current trade requirements and was of small volume. Trading was principally in feeding wheat. No. 2 hard winter was quoted at Los Angeles Sept. 12 at \$1.50 to \$1.55.
