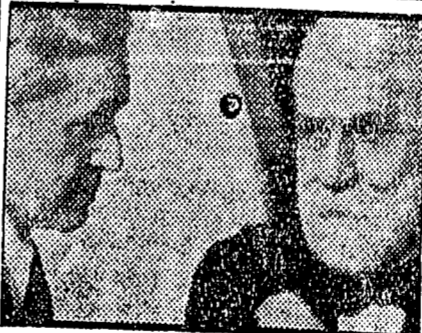
Vernon Akins of Ahsahka spent Sunday with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Akins.
