In the Selway section of Idaho the snow ranges around 40 inches in depth at an altitude of 5,000 feet.

The abundant fall of rain and snow insures plenty of moisture for the coming year, both for irrigated and non-irrigated sections.

## SUNDAY SERVICE PLEASURES

The church service last Sunday evening at the Community church was devoted to the Wesley Foundation work carried on at our state university, for the development of religious activities and education. It provides a shrine of worship, a school of religious education, a home-away-from-home for social activities, and a laboratory for training in the service of the church.

Gerald A. Ingle, a past-president and treasurer, presided at the meeting and clearly explained in general the purpose and scope of the organization at Moscow. He also called on students present to speak on work carried on in various departments of this organization, who had either been or were chairmen or leading workers in these things.

Two post-graduates, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Reichman, spoke lucidly on inter-church relations and recreational work, respectively. Miss Doris Emery told very interestingly of the Kappa Phi organization, whose slogan is "Every Woman in the Church and Each Training for a Leadership."

William W. Ingle forcefully set forth the promotion or expansion work among the students.

Raymond Lyons clearly explained training carried on in dramatics for entertainment. The major production this year being "The Servant in the House."

Miss Edna Bolon gave a very interesting talk on the fine Christian fellowship that prevades the students and faculty relations at Gooding College, to which she won a scholarship and where she is attending.

These excellent young folks of our community did themselves honor in their addresses and the audience felt very proud and grateful to each of them.

### Henry Ford, Philanthropist (?)

The labor policies of Henry Ford were criticized at Washington by S. M. Levin, head of economics department of Detroit City college and a member of that city's unemployment committee.

"The tragedy of Ford unemployment," Levin asserted, "is being countered not by deed, but by an outpouring of words, a turgid flood, abounding in moral exhortations and noble ideas."

The professor said, "Hosts of Ford workers are denizens of public soup kitchens and lodging houses and thousands of others have been reduced to dependence on the skimpy allowances of public and private charity."

Levin, who spoke before the American Economic association, accused the Ford company of failure to cooperate with unemployment relief agencies. He used copious quotations from Ford's public statements in discussing the Ford high-wage and short-hour program. He said the auto manufacturer's unemployment policy of the last few years was "almost completely negative." He said the number of families helped by the Detroit community union while their breadwinner was employed by Ford "increased successively from 8592 from the 12 months period from July 1, 1924, to June 30, 1925, to 10,162 for the same period ending June 1930.

The five-day week, Levin continued, "has not proved invulnerable to temptation," and "a seven day week is not unknown in the Ford plants."

### Back Seat Driver Scores

The Idaho supreme court Monday in effect stamped its approval on back seat driving.

Because Ed. Dillon failed to complain against alleged speeding, the court decided he was not entitled to damages from an accident received while he was riding as a guest in the automobile of W. M. Brooks of Caldwell.

Dillon was injured while returning from a fishing trip when Brooks' automobile tipped over.

The court declared Dillon was guilty of contributory negligence in not warning Brooks from the rear seat that he was driving too fast and not exercising due caution.

## STATE PURCHASING AGENT REPORTS ROAD MACHINERY

A great many stories appearing under the guise of authentic news articles, published under recent dates have been so misleading in character that it is time for a statement of facts concerning the much talked of Idaho Equipment Company lease contract with the Department of Public Works. Not only has it been proven beyond any shadow of doubt to the average individual that the so called lease agreement between the Department of Public Works and the Idaho Equipment Company under date of September 23, 1931, was "unreasonable" but it has been shown contrary to sound public policy. Even so, certain interests in the state are continually attempting to cloud the real facts concerning the issue. They have earnestly tried to poison the public mind and cause it to be generally believed that the administration is making use of legal technicalities to perpetrate a fraud upon the citizenry of the state. Writers have been permitted to willfully misrepresent the facts regarding the recent abandonment of this lease agreement as well as the recent purchase of snow removal equipment by the State Purchasing Agent.

It is not necessary to enter into a discussion on the Idaho Equipment Company's lease agreement, for this document has been examined and declared void by the special assistant to the Attorney General, who was employed to investigate its legality. It is, however, quite proper to make clear the absolute facts and true situation surrounding the more recent purchases of snow equipment.

Heavy snows and blocked highways in some sections of the state created a real emergency, making immediate purchase of adequate machinery necessary. The State Purchasing Agent, acting under an emergency arrangement, set out to purchase for the state, with the least possible outlay of money, four trucks with snow removal equipment attached. He requested prices on snow removal equipment from several equipment companies in the state. It was made clear that anyone having equipment of this nature was privileged to quote prices for careful consideration by the Purchasing Agent. As a result, memorandum of equipment with prices were submitted by five concerns in the state of Idaho, all more or less confining their figures to machinery of a certain class, to-wit—3½ ton trucks with snow plows. The Dufresne Automobile Company of Boise quoted on a 3½ ton truck with no snow removal equipment attached. The price quoted was \$3476.00 for one truck.

The Oshkosh Motor Trucks, Incorporated, through their agent, the Ashton Implement Company of Ashton, Idaho, quoted prices on four 3½ ton trucks with Hercules Model Y. X. C. motors, 90 H. P. with four-way hydraulic dump bodies, and four Snow King rotary snow plows, model 747-CB, together with auxiliary motors and North Star "V" plows No. 3, at a total price of \$39,629.88.

The Northwest Machinery Company of Boise, Idaho, quoted prices which included four 3½ ton Coleman trucks, each equipped with Buda motors, 105 H. P. 3½ to 4 cubic yard dump bodies, together with four Buda auxiliary motors and four Rightway rotary snow plows, which included the "V" plow service for a total of \$42,896.00.

The Howard-Cooper Corporation of Twin Falls quoted prices on four, 3½ ton Walters trucks with 3½ to 4 cubic yard dump bodies and 100 H. P. S. R. L. Waukesha motors together with four Snow King rotary snow plows, model 747-CB, also four North Star No. 3 "V" plows and four auxiliary Waukesha motors with the same H. P., at a total price of \$39,947, but with the recommendation that the auxiliary motors not be used provided five-ton trucks were used.

The mounting of the motors and snow plows and delivery of the trucks, fully equipped to Boise, Idaho, and two trucks fully equipped to Pocatello, Idaho.

The Idaho Equipment Company, through the president, H. Busman, quoted prices on four FWD 3½ ton trucks, equipped with 100 H. P. Waukesha motors and four Rightway rotary snow plows, with "V" service, together with the four Waukesha auxiliary motors, for a total price of \$43,000.00, and made it clear that the price of \$43,000.00 did not include mounting, delivery or service of any kind, but offered such service at a figure to be determined between the

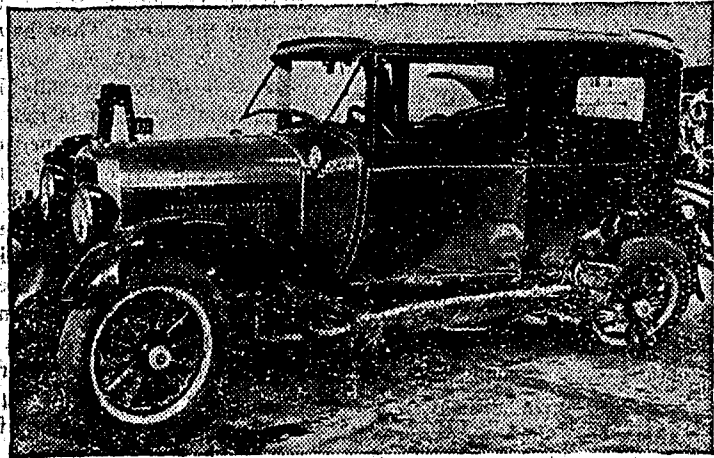

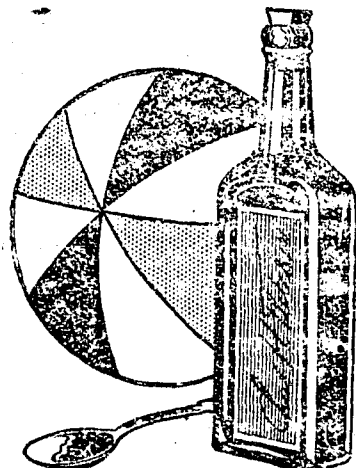

**Ratify Moratorium**

Congressional ratification of President Hoover's one year's moratorium on debt payments was completed on Monday night, with senate approval.

By a vote of 69 to 12, the senate endorsed the holiday on intergovernmental debts which went into effect last July 1.

Senator Dill voted against the moratorium, but Senator Jones, the other Washington senator voted for the proposal as did both Idaho senators.

The ban raised by the house against any further reduction or cancellation of the ten billions in war debts outstanding was left untouched.


