Miss Leola LaHatt of Kendrick and in many instances the stands are A rather sharp advance in wheat prices early in the week, under the influence of unfavorable winter wheat prospects, was offset by a decline that lost most of the gain, Beneficial rains in both winter and spring wheat areas, the excellent progress of the spring wheat crop, recurrent weakness in security markets and continued dull export inquiry for the remaining stocks of North American wheat, were principally responsible for the weaker situation towards the close of the week. Feed grain remained in dull demand. Offerings were only of moderate volume, but easily sufficient for the limited trade needs. Prices were mostly lower compared with a week ago. Rye was independently weak, while flax declined to a new low for the 1931 crop.

With the exception of the domistic winter wheat, developments for the 1932 harvest continued generally favorable, although crops are mostly two International Institute of Agriculture places the 1932 world wheat acreage about 7,000,000 acres over that of 1931, with an estimated increase of partially offset by a decrease of about winter wheat crop materially, since harvesting has already begun in the southern part of Arizona. 




