GRAIN MARKET WEAKER AS CROP LOOKS BETTER

Domestic grain markets declined during the week ending June 3, under the influence of improved crop prospects and a continued light demand, according to the Weekly Grain Market Review of the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Rains in the central west were beneficial to growing crops and particularly helpful to corn. Rains in the north central states and Canada maintained favorable conditions for spring grains. Wheat declined 2c to 4c per bushel in domestic markets. Feed grains were down 1c to 2c, but barley held relatively firmer than corn and oats. Rye was independently weak, while flax declined to a new low on the crop, despite reports of a sharp reduction in acreage this season.

Pacific Coast markets were quiet and mostly lower. Prices in Washington and Oregon markets declined 4c to 5c per bushel, influenced by the decline in Eastern markets and improved crop conditions. Winter wheat was headed well in the milder districts and no frost damage has been reported. Marketings of old crop wheat were light, receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals totaling only 329 cars for the week as compared with 1,082 cars received during the corresponding week last year. Farmers generally were not inclined to sell old crop wheat at the current low prices, except to obtain advances necessary to harvest. At the close of the market June 3, Big Bend Bluestem hard white was quoted at Portland at 66½c, soft and western white at 56c, hard winter, northern spring and western red at 55½c, sacked, basis No. 1. The decline during the week placed the northwestern wheat on an export basis and sales of about 8,500 tons of new wheat for August and September shipment were reported made during the week at around 52c per bushel, F. O. B. Portland for white wheat, principally to Ireland and the United Kingdom. No Oriental business was reported since local prices were around 2c above offers from foreign competing countries.

GEO. W. WELKER, WELL-KNOWN PIONEER, PASSES

George W. Welker, three times elected commissioner and four times sheriff of Nez Perce county and one of the best known citizens of central Idaho, died at his home at Lewiston at 3:35 o'clock, May 31, after a lingering illness. He had suffered a paralytic stroke Wednesday.

Born at Topeka, Kan., Dec. 28, 1859, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Welker, with his parents he came west in 1875 and for five years lived in Oregon. In 1880 the family left Oregon and drove to Idaho, the father taking up a homestead on Potlatch ridge about four miles east of Leland.

Later George W. Welker homesteaded a place in that section and remained until 1904 when he and his family moved to Lewiston. The family was one of the earliest to locate on Potlatch ridge.

Prominently identified with republican politics of the county, Mr. Welker was elected two terms as justice of the peace in what is now Leland precinct, and in 1894 was elected to the board of county commissioners, and again in 1902 and 1904. He was elected sheriff in 1910 and again in 1916, 1920 and 1922. He served as deputy sheriff in the office of the late Sheriff Harry Lydon. He lived a retired life since leaving office.

He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Maude E. Welker; three sons, Roy Welker of Lewiston; James P. Welker, Tacoma, and Floyd Welker, of Calgary, who arrived Saturday. Mrs. James P. Welker, accompanying; two daughters, Mrs. I. B. McDonald and Mrs. Homer Curtis both of Lewiston; three sisters, and a brother, Mrs. Thomas J. Buckles and Mrs. S. D. Oylear, of Lewiston; Mrs. F. S. Vaughn, Lenore, and William Welker of Clarkston.

Funeral services were held from the Brower-Wann chapel Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with interment in Normal Hill cemetery.

May Construct Rearing Pond
Walter Harris, deputy game warden for Nez Perce county, was in Kendrick last week and was very much interested in the making of a trout rearing pond in what is known as the "deep hole," near the Vollmer-Clearwater warehouse. The only drawback seems to be that it would deprive the youngsters of a few weeks of swimming each year in that spot, forcing them to go just above town to what is known as the "Jacob's pool." But most everyone likes to fish, and it might be that the youngsters would be willing to forego the swimming in order to get a nice start of trout in the Potlatch and Bear creeks. The scheme has not been completely worked out, but Mr. Harris thinks it altogether feasible. He is interested because the creek represents the line between Nez Perce and Latah counties.

A later report will probably be made on the matter.

Surveyors Again In Kendrick
It has begun to look like Governor Ross is going to make good on his promise to aid Kendrick in getting the road question straightened out. At least there have been several surveyors sent here at various times and just now one man has been ordered from Orofino to Kendrick and he has rented Mrs. Stanton's house, saying he expected to remain until fall. Just what this may mean, we are unable to say, as no authentic information has been obtained. But suffice it to say, the road question for this section seems in a fair way to have at least a survey.

More information will probably be obtainable next week.




