"Hunger Marchers" To Capital

The first contingent of the national "hunger marchers" reached Pocatello Saturday after having started from Oregon on their march to Washington, D. C., to attend the farmers' national relief conference December 7 to 10.

At a meeting at Pocatello the leaders stated this group is the first to pass through that city and that others will be going through all day Sunday and Monday. The first group arranged for the billeting of those to follow.

By the time the marchers reach the capital there are expected to be at least 30,000 farmers' representatives in the conference, according to P. Dal of Astoria, Oregon, and George Keith of Buhl, Idaho.

The conference will demand immediate relief for impoverished farmers, a moratorium on all tax and mortgage foreclosures and that there be no eviction because of failure to pay taxes.

Idaho Population On Increase

Automobile accidents caused 18 deaths in Idaho during October, a report of the bureau of vital statistics said.

Total deaths were 329 of which 207 were males. Births totaled 708 of which 382 were male.

Among deaths were eight suicides, two drownings and two homicides, the latter including a shooting of a negro in Weiser by a sheriff in self defense. Heart disease accounted for 60 deaths, or about 20 per cent of the total. Thirty died of cancer, 16 of pneumonia and 28 of apoplexy.
