**About Potato Diseases**

Idaho potatoes are subject to disease while in storage and transit as well as during the growing season, says J. M. Raerer, associate plant pathologist with the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station. "Black heart," a common storage trouble, is caused by poor ventilation. Potatoes must have air to breathe the same as human beings, says Prof. Raerer. Whenever their oxygen supply is deficient, they suffocate, and the result is dead, blackened tissues within the tubers. Proper ventilation must be coupled with low temperature for good storage conditions. Early potatoes, particularly those dug during hot days in August, quite frequently are damaged by shipping disease known as "leak." This disease is caused by soil-borne fungus that enters the tubers through wounds. Care must be used in harvesting the crop quickly and placed in iced cars to prevent "leak" losses. Crops such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, cabbage and carrots are subject to a wide range of rot-producing organisms. Such organisms increase their activity as storage temperatures rise. Consequently, best control resolves itself in keeping the temperature within a few degrees of freezing and supplying good ventilation.
