GRAIN MARKETS WEAK WITH DEMAND DULL

Continued weakness prevailed in the Weekly Grain Market Review of prospects for winter wheat in the United States was more than offset by increased offerings of the new crop grain from the Southern Hemisphere and the slow movement into consuming channels of surplus stocks in exporting countries. Sharply increased country shipments of corn tended to weaken the market for that grain but current offerings were readily taken and price declines were not great. Rye, oats, and barley were lower with wheat and corn. Flax markets were unsettled but closed slightly lower, reflecting the weakness in linseed oil and meal markets.

Pacific Coast markets were rather unsettled. Future prices declined with eastern markets but cash grain was steady as a result of a fair inquiry from domestic mills and continued light receipts Receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals totaled only 460 cars compared with 912 cars for the corresponding week last year. The first export business for some time occurred during the week when a sale of 1,000 tons of No. 2 western white wheat was made to Japan on the basis of 431/2c per bushel in bulk, F. O. B. Seattle.
