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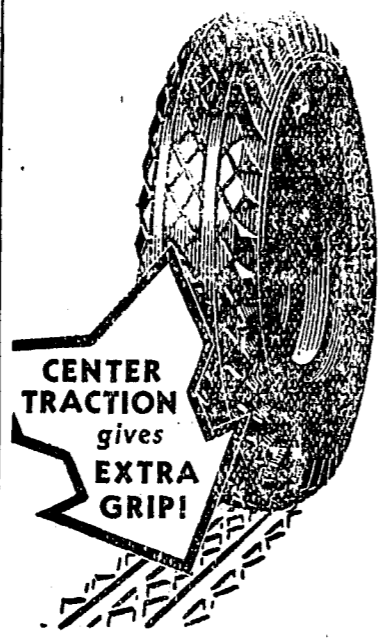

Heavy Hog Movement in February
Railroad circles in Spokane this week report the largest hog movement for any February in two years, with an estimate that 10,000 hogs arrived in Spokane from February 1 to 21, over all carriers.

Shipments are coming from the Dakotas and western Nebraska, billed to Spokane, Inland Empire points and the coast.

Hog shipments in February ranged from 30 to 35 per cent more than in January, with the increase more than seasonal, it was estimated. This traffic shows a gain of about 10 per cent over February, 1932.

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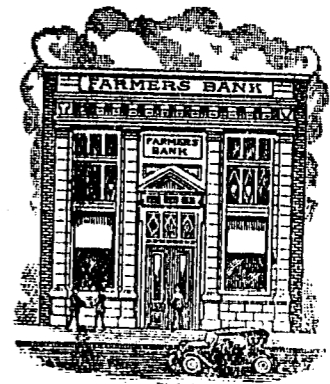

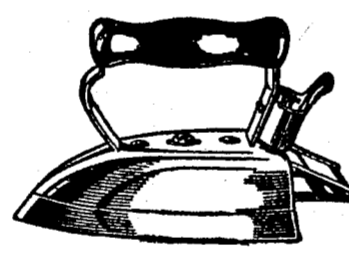
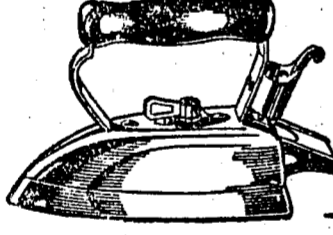
