Many Delinquent Taxes Paid
Taxes amounting to \$244,926.64, an increase of \$9,133.84, have been taken in on the first installment of the 1933 tax bill, according to information given out Friday at the county treasurer's office. A total of \$235,792.80 had been taken in at the same time last year. The total delinquent taxes taken in during December, 1933, was \$27,617.45 and set a record here for delinquent tax collections.

GRAIN MARKET HAS A MUCH FIRMER TONE
lected also an active inquiry for the limited offerings. Prices of both winter and spring wheat advanced 2c to 3c per bushel, with No. 2 hard winter quoted at Kansas City Jan. 12 at 81c to 82c. Pacific Coast markets strengthened slightly but did not follow the full advance at eastern points. Marketings in the Pacific Northwest were comparatively heavy, with receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals totaling 967 cars. A large percentage of these, however, were delivered on recent sales to the Emergency Export Corporation. Bluestem hard white and dark hard winter wheats advanced at Portland under a fairly active inquiry from domestic mills, but export grades held about unchanged. At the close of the market January 12 bluestem hard white was quoted at Portland at 77c and dark hard winter at 82½c per bushel. Other classes sold at 74c per bushel. Export sales by the Emergency Export Corporation now total 10,250,000 bushels, of which 6,700,000 bushels have been shipped. Inquiry for northwestern wheat from California and from the Atlantic seaboard continued dull. California wheat markets were very slightly firmer. Current trade needs, however, were being supplied principally from locally grown wheat and only occasional cars of northern wheat were being taken by mills to complete milling mixtures. Demand for milling wheat was fair and feed grains moved more readily, with dealers and industries replenishing stocks which had been allowed to run low
