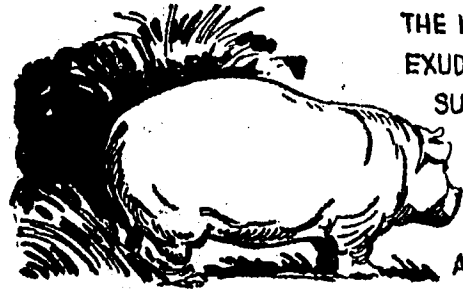

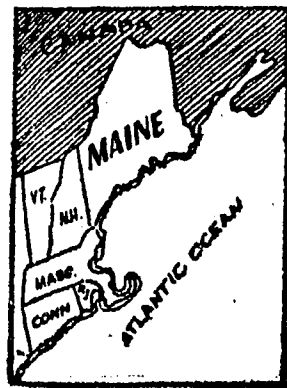

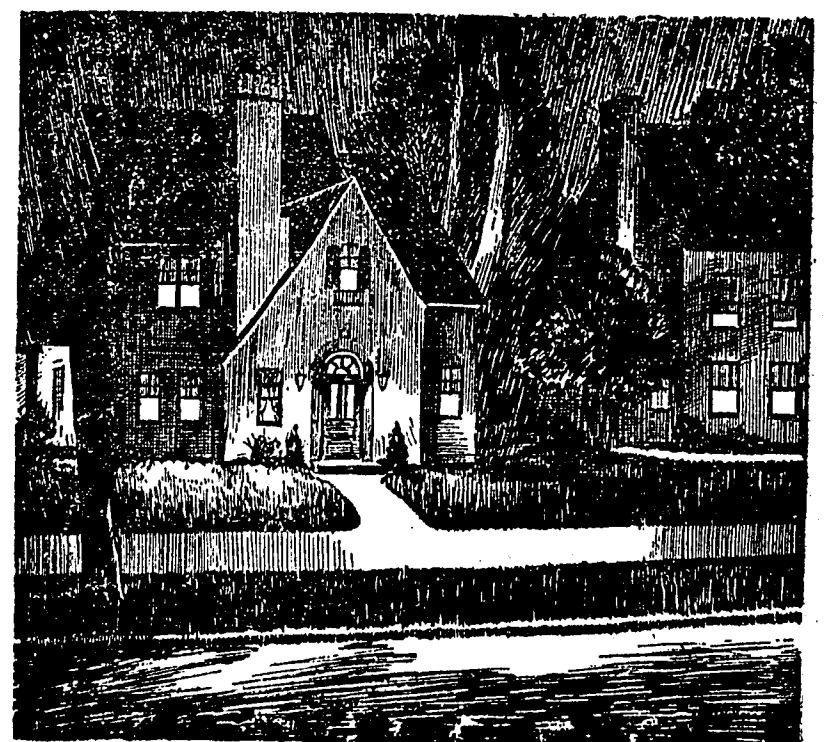

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TREES TRANSFORM A HOUSE INTO A HOME
A project of lasting benefit both to the individual citizens of Idaho and to the state at large is that of establishing forest and shade trees about the home. The expenditure is slight and the dividends returned to the planter in the way of landscape improvement and increased value of the property are tremendous. Forest and shade tree planting stock may be obtained from the School of Forestry at Moscow for merely the cost of production, according to the 1934 edition of "Forest and Shade Trees for Planting in Idaho" circular just issued and now available on request.

A wide choice of both hardwoods and conifers or evergreens are available to citizens of Idaho. Trees adapted for planting in the different sections of the state are indicated on a chart included in the circular. Suggestions for the planting and care of trees are also included and otherwise every assistance possible is given to the prospective tree planter to enable him to succeed. Farmers are given the privileges of obtaining small-sized tree stock for woodlots, shelterbelts and windbreaks at half cost of production since under the terms of the Clarke-McNary law, the federal government pays the remaining half. This law, enacted in 1924 has been the incentive for a large amount of farm forest plantings scattered throughout Idaho. The excessive amount of moisture stored in the soil should prove of decided advantage to tree planters this coming spring season in insuring a survival of trees.

GRAIN PRICE ADVANCE CHECKED — DEMAND SLOW
week by Australian shippers at prices below American quotations. No. 1 bluestem hard white was quoted at Portland, January 26, at 77½c, dark hard winter at 83c and export grades at 74½c per bushel, sacked, basis No. 1. California wheat markets were dull and slightly lower. Inquiry for milling wheat was only moderate despite a fairly heavy flour business. Mills were mostly drawing upon storage stocks and purchasing only small quantities of high protein wheat to complete milling mixtures. Inquiry for feed wheat was limited and was supplied almost entirely by local shippers. Washington and Oregon shippers were supplying high protein wheat to central California mills and some inter-mountain wheat was moving to Los Angeles. On January 26, No. 1 hard white wheat was quoted at San Francisco at \$1.27 to \$1.30 per 100. Oats markets were quiet with an easier market tone. Pacific Northwest markets displayed independent firmness, reflecting the moderate but steady demand for Willamette valley oats for shipment to the Atlantic seaboard. Light offerings from growers were an additional strengthening influence.
