GRAIN MARKETS STEADY
 —DEMAND MODERATE

bring premiums of 1c to 3c over similar grades from other areas. No. 1 Dark Northern was quoted at Minneapolis March 23, at 86½-89½c with good milling wheat selling near the top of the range. Durum markets were independently firm reflecting the light remaining supplies. The Duluth May advanced 1½¢ and closed at 87c. Ordinary protein No. 2 Amber Durum was quoted at Minneapolis at 84½-89c, while choice milling lots sold at \$1.00 to \$1.18 per bushel.

Pacific Coast markets were quiet and generally weaker than eastern points. Inquiry from domestic mills was limited at Portland reflecting the quiet flour trade. Export sales by the Emergency Export Association totaled only about 200,000 bushels and no bids were put out by the Assn. during the week. Outside milling demand was dull and prices declined slightly with Big Bend Bluestem hard white quoted at Portland March 23, at 76½c, dark hard winter at 81c, and other varieties at 74½¢ per bushel, sacked, basis No. 1.

Air-Conditioned Homes

Inland Empire homes may now be air-conditioned just like the new streamlined, air-conditioned trains, according to Homer C. Bender, air-conditioning engineer for the Washington Water Power Company, who urges the public to inspect the new Union Pacific train which will be on exhibition in Spokane March 31. Windows of this train are sealed and its passengers breathe filtered air of proper temperature and humidity.

"On a recent six-weeks' trip around the United States I traveled on air-conditioned trains whenever possible and found it a most delightful way to travel," said Mr. Bender. "On this type of train one awakens in the morning feeling clean and refreshed."

"I found that hay fever sufferers throng to the building of the field museum in Chicago because of the relief they enjoy while in that air-conditioned building. I also found that in one city, air-conditioned buildings have an occupancy of 80 per cent while buildings without air-conditioning had an occupancy of only 30 per cent."

"Great developments have been made in the field of air-conditioning in the home and inexpensive equipment is now available which will make it possible to control the climate in the home, warming or cooling the air, regulating the humidity and filtering out all impure particles."

"Special units are now being made which can be installed anywhere in the house. Air-conditioning not only results in better health and comfort but also results in fuel savings and gives longer life to the home furnishings. Attic ventilation, another development, makes upstairs rooms comfortable even during spells of hot weather."
