## Seattle City Light Department

1933 FIGURES

Compared With

## W. W. P. COMPANY

The facts stated below about Seattle's city owned electric system are taken from official reports. The following comparisons are instructive.

### 1. In 1933:

Seattle City Light sold to its 80,904 residential customers 80,479,295 kilowatt-hours, or an average of 995 kilowatt-hours per customer. This company sold to its 47,613 residential customers 78,355,000 kilowatt-hours, or an average of 1,646 kilowatt-hours per customer.

### 2. In 1933:

Seattle City Light received from or charged to said customers for residential service, including water heating, the sum of \$2,325,406.06, or an average of 2.89 cents per kilowatt-hour.



It has several especially good song numbers, among them being "Meandering with Miranda," "Good Morning Glory," and others that you will be humming and whistling on your way home.


