### MARKETS UNSETTLED FEED GRAINS FIRM

however, is more than offset by a prospective reduction in this season's harvest, which is now estimated at approximately 9,000,000 bushels, giving a total supply of a little over 12,000,000 bushels as against nearly 15,000,000 bushels for the 1933-34 season. At the close of the market June 15, No. 1 Hard White was quoted at San Francisco at \$1.32-1.37 and at Los Angeles at \$1.42-1.45, No. 1 Soft White wheat at San Francisco at \$1.30-1.32 and at Los Angeles at \$1.40-1.42 per 100, sacked.

Oats markets reflected the serious crop damage and prospective short outturns and prices advanced. Receipts at Minneapolis increased and inquiry for shipment into the Northwestern drought areas provided the principal outlet for the current offerings. Elevator stocks decreased only moderately during the week. No. 3 white oats were quoted at Minneapolis June 14, at \$1.33-1.36 per 100. Oats market at Portland was firm during the week and prices advanced around \$1.00 per ton compared with the previous period. No. 2 white oats, sacked were quoted at this market June 14, at \$1.35 per 100, and No. 2 gray oats, sacked, at \$1.25 per 100.

Pacific Northwestern barley markets strengthened materially during the week. Local supplies were light and the longshoremen's strike eliminated water shipments of California grains. Local demand from nearby feeders was only moderately active. Supplies of malting barley from the Willamette Valley are practically exhausted but nominal quotations were held around \$1.25 per 100. No. 2 Bright Western feed barley was quoted at Portland at \$1.00 per 100, or about 5c above a week ago.

**Ozarks Names Are Queer**

Residents of various sections of the Ozarks region are known to each other under names that puzzle an outsider. The "hog rangers" live south of the Osage river and their neighbors, the "elm peelers," live on the north side of the river. In the hunting country live the "rabbit twisters," who save ammunition by twisting a stick in the fur of rabbits in hollow logs and dragging them out. The "squirrel knockers" kill their game with rocks. The "scissorsbills" live in the valleys, the "ridge runners" atop the cedar-studded hogbacks, the "sprout splitters" in the cutover timber country.

**Be Withheld Until Fall**

The Idaho liquor problem advisory board has announced that in order "to keep this report out of politics" it will not make public until after the November elections its suggestions for the control of the liquor business.

The report was submitted by a committee of three members of the commission as the final business of the meeting and immediately was opened to discussion. Neither the discussion nor the final recommendations will be made public, William S. Cady, Pocatello newspaper publisher and chairman of the board, announced.

**12,000 Tons Opium Yearly**

China is producing 12,000 tons of opium annually, seven times more than the rest of the world, American Delegate Fuller told the League of Nations opium conference recently.

Such an accumulation of opium constitutes a danger to China as well as the rest of the world, he added.

Fuller stated that the American government is justly alarmed over the increase of opium entering the United States from China and Persia.

In certain sections of Manchuria there is reason to believe that 30 per cent of the population are opium smokers and in some cities young girls are being used to sell opium, he said.

**PRESIDENT IS QUESTIONED ON CHANGE OF ATTITUDE**

If President Roosevelt had told the people all of these things when he was a candidate in 1932 what would have been the result? asks Senator Roscoe C. Patterson, of Missouri.

"Suppose he had told the people that instead of taking the government out of business, he would advocate putting it into every business?"

"Suppose he had told the American people that if elected he would bring about a system of collectivism and regimentation of all agriculture and industry to supplant the rugged individualism under which we advanced to the greatest nation in the world."

"Suppose he had told them if elected he would spend hundreds of millions of the taxpayers' money to destroy and reduce crops on the one hand and then spend millions more to increase the production of such crops."

"Suppose he had told them that if elected he would in the face of the campaign pledge to uphold the anti-trust laws, sponsor a measure suspending such laws and thus permitting organized big business to prey on the public and destroy its smaller competitors."

"Suppose he had told them that if elected he would violate the campaign pledges to keep government expenditures within government receipts by spending public money so lavishly and recklessly that during the first two years of his administration our public debt would be increased by \$10,900,000,000 to an aggregate federal total of \$32,000,000,000—the greatest debt with which our government has ever been burdened."

"Suppose he had told them that instead of balancing the budget as he had promised he would bring about a deficit of approximately five billion during his first year in office."

"Suppose he had told them that instead of abolishing bureaus as he had promised, it was his purpose to create thirty-seven new government employees in thirteen months."

"Suppose he had told them that if elected he would sponsor a measure repudiating the Nation's just obligations."

"General Johnson, the blue eagle of industry, although he has his open moments of candid doubt, is pressing for the adoption of the N. R. A. in every state, to remove any restrictions preventing the cracking down upon the little fellows in business in every American community. The victim gets his hearing before his accusers and their findings virtually terminate his legal resources. His property and his person are at the mercy of the new laws."—Chicago Tribune.
