Wheat receipts at Portland for the week were 92 cars, as compared with 152 cars last week and 145 cars the week before.

Cash wheat bid prices at Portland on October 30, for 15-day ship-ment were: Soft white, \$1.13; soft white (no Rex) \$1.15%; white club \$1.16½; western red \$1.15, and hard red winter \$1.10. For deferred shipment, on basis of country warhouse receipts, prices averaged about %c per bushel higher.

The San Francisco wheat market was dull but steady during the week ending October 30, with prices very largely unchanged compared with a week ago. While demand was slow from practically all classes of trade, light offerings made for steadiness. wheat under government loans, the 99 growers were generally holding remaining supplies quite firmly in the anticipation of higher prices later in the crop year. Growers were being bid around \$1.82½ to \$1.85 per 100 on a country warehouse receipt basis 123 for No. 1 hard white and No. 1 soft white wheat, sacked, but were sell-121 ing only scattered lots at these prices. Bay region mills reported a

very slack flour demand. At Kansas City the volume of trading in the wheat futures markets continued at a very low ebb during the past week and closing prices were only moderately changed from the previous period. Movement of wheat into Kansas City was 150 132 cars less than the week previous, while shipments increased a like amount with the result that public elevator stocks were reduced approximately 150,000 bushels, leaving remaining stocks at slightly under 40 million bushels. There were occasional instances of some improvement in demand but open market offerings were sufficient to satisfy daily re-

quirements. The cash wheat situation at Minneapolis remained unchanged for the week with the current trading basis still governed by the government buying program. Receipts of wheat 66 for the week amount to 2,151 cars at Minneapolis and 918 at Duluth. The average quality of the receipts was good for the fore-part of the week but arrivals during the last two days again showed the effects of rain and snow which set in a week ago. Because of the shortage of labor, harvesting operations in the spring wheat area are well drawnout this season and some grain still remains unthreshed.

The new winter wheat crop continues to make satisfactory growth with light to moderate rains facilitating germination of winter wheat in much of the eastern belt, where seeding is well along or completed, and where much of the grain is up to good stands. In the western belt wheat fields are offering much pasturage. In Kansas, wheat now generally covers the ground and is establishing a good root system. In the Pacific Northwest conditions have improved as a result of rains, which will make further seeding pos-62 sible and assist germination where grain was sown in dust and has

Of further interest is the wheat under loan, as follows: Wheat, 1942 crop under loan October 24 was: 255,946,000 bushels; older crops still held, 276,916,000 bushels. Barley under loan 5,905.000 bushels, including 1,275.000 bushels in California.


