### Benefit Paid Farmers

Latah county farmers who have signed crop adjustment contracts had received a total of \$214,847.37, in benefit payments up to the first of June, according to a report submitted to Chester C. Davis by John B. Payne, Comptroller of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. The total for the State of Idaho, according to this report, is \$2,375,495.82.

Total rental and benefit payments for the entire United States include \$120,656,528.38 to cotton farmers; \$68,323,426.17 to wheat farmers, \$9,523,210.69 to tobacco farmers and \$2,055,233.55 to corn-hog farmers up to June 1.

Mr. Payne also reported the expenditure of \$57,785,228.50 for the removal of surplus hogs, wheat, butter and cheese.

### Announce Wheat Payments

Secretary Wallace recently announced an adjustment payment of 29 cents a bushel for the contracted 1934 wheat crop, according to a Washington wire received by E. J. Iddings, Dean of the College of Agriculture, University of Idaho. A payment of 20 cents will be made in October, and the remaining nine cents will be paid in June, 1935, the wire stated. Seedings for harvest in 1935 will be cut 15 per cent below the base acreage. The present processing tax of 30 cents per bushel will be continued.

### Brings In Barley

Walter Biggam of American Ridge was the first reported to have brought in barley, he bringing in a load of this year's crop on Tuesday to the Kendrick Rochdale.

# Rules Regarding Checks And Checking Accounts

Effective July 1, 1934

In Banks of the Clearwater Group of Idaho Bankers Association

On all accounts with a minimum balance of less than \$50.00 a flat charge of 50 cents per month will be made, the minimum charge of 50 cents carrying ten free checks written on the account during the month, and a charge of 3 cents per check will be made on all over ten checks paid. An allowance will be made of one free check for each \$10.00 additional minimum balance in excess of \$50.00.

All transit items, (checks drawn on points other than Kendrick), deposited by customers shall bear a charge of 3 cents per item up to and including \$50.00; 4 cents per item up to and including \$100.00; and 5 cents per item on all items over \$100.00.

Banking hours will be from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 p. m. to 3:00 p. m., except Saturdays, which will be from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon.

As members of the Clearwater Group of the Idaho Bankers Association we must adhere to the above rules, and ask our patrons to please conform to the above regulations.

## EARLY HISTORY OF KENDRICK BY MRS. ROBERTS

Presbyterian minister, and the Rev. C. D. Bell, the first resident Methodist minister, tended to the spiritual welfare of the people. Dr. Justice was the second doctor in Kendrick.

A tragedy was enacted in this drama of a thriving town when it was flooded on January 12, 1900. Fred Crocker, endeavoring to deliver Mrs. Hamlin and her children from danger went after them in a buggy. His efforts met with failure when 40 cords of wood being swept down the main street by the flood waters struck the

buggy and overturned it causing the three little Hamlin girls to be drowned. Mr. Crocker succeeded in rescuing Mr. Mitcham out of the Post Office on horseback.

The business section of Kendrick was burned August 5, 1904.

Ira Sperry's three children were the first buried in the Kendrick cemetery.

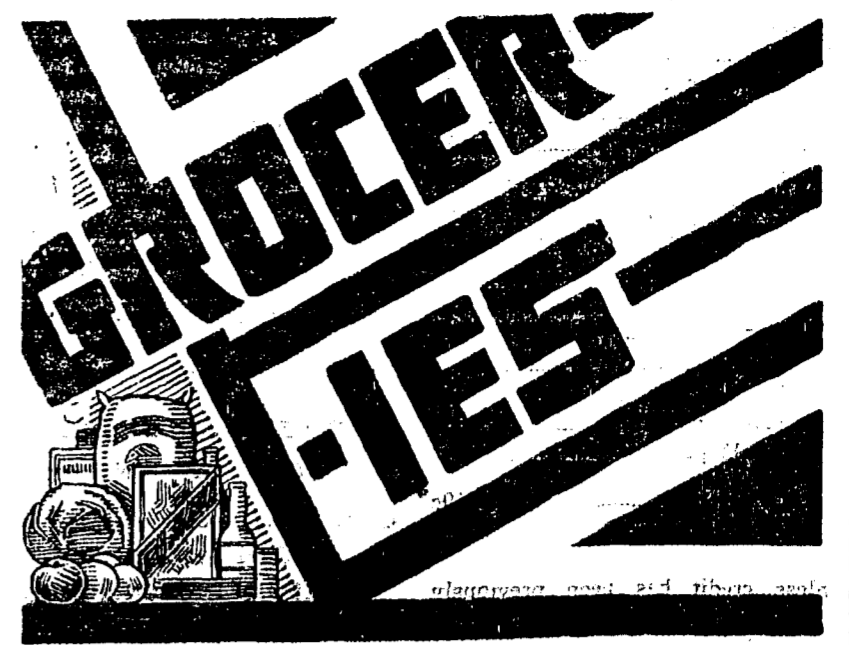
