Intermountain and Pacific Coast markets were rather unsettled. Movement continued heavy, both by rail and truck in southern Idaho and in northern Utah, but farmers were selfing less freely at the close of the week. No. 2 soft white was quoted at Ogden FOB Utah and Idaho common points at 77c per bushel, No. 2 hard winter at 79c, No. 2 hard white at 81c and other classes at 83c per bushel.

Portland futures declined with Chicago but cash prices were rather unsettled with some classes somewhat higher and others slightly lower. The eastern inquiry slackened somewhat with local prices above a shipping basis to middlewestern and Atlantic coast points. Local inquiry was principally for hard winter and hard white for milling. Demand from California was also largely for milling types. Country marketings were moderate with farmers more disposed to Ed. Deobald is suffering with a hold for higher prices.


