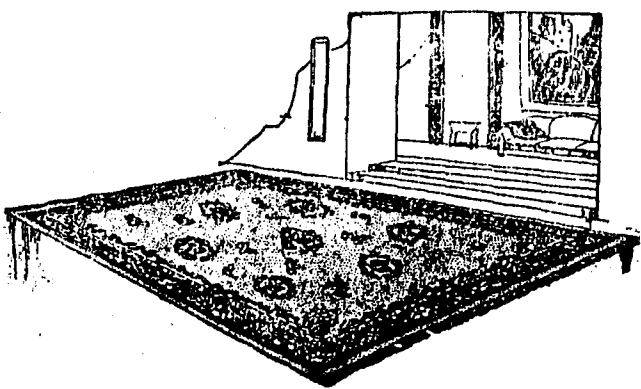

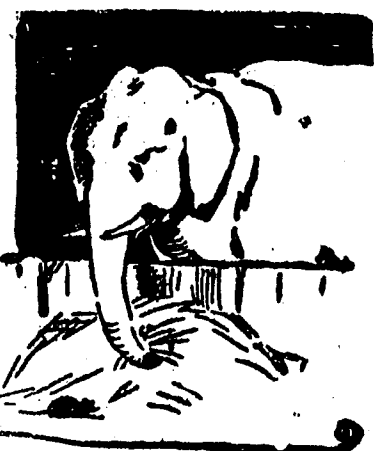

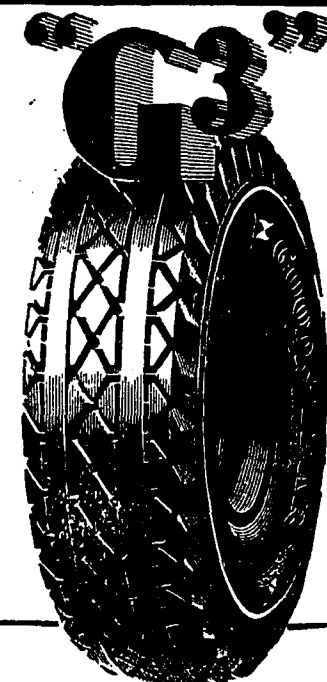

EDITORIAL

We have now added the milk business to our already fast growing plant. As in everything else, we intend to give you the best product possible. To accomplish this we have added special milk handling equipment, both in our plant and at the barn. All cows will be milked with a Serge milker, then the milk filtered immediately. All milking machine apparatus will be very thoroughly washed and steam sterilized at our plant. When the milk comes to the plant from our barn it will be refiltered and properly cooled, and

then bottled in steam sterilized bottles. We have also added some new cows to our herd, and, if possible, intend to furnish a milk of higher test.

KENDRICK MEN CIRCU- LATE ROAD PETITION

The following article was taken from Wednesday morning's Lewiston Tribune:

Business men in Lewiston, anxious to aid in highway development of tributary territory, yesterday signed a petition sponsored by N. E. Walker, M. O. Raby and Marvin Long of Kendrick, urging Nez Perce county commissioners to use every possible effort to build the piece of road between Arrow and Southwick via Julietta and Kendrick. The petition asks that construction start as soon as possible following the report made by the highway department engineers.

"This stretch of 24 miles is an important link," said Mr. Walker yesterday. "It will connect with the Orofino-Cavendish road and will serve some 5,000 people when completed. Farmers and stockmen residing on Big and Little Bear ridges, Texas ridge, American ridge, Cedar Creek, Fix ridge and other regions will be directly benefitted by completion of the highway which is now in deplorable condition."

"Part of the present road has never been touched by highway machinery and farmers are forced to use the old country feeder road.

"The proposed route connects with the Bear ridge project of 4 1-2 miles.

"Eighteen miles of the proposed 24 are in Nez Perce county, hence we feel that the support of Lewiston businessmen as well as that of the county commissioners is important in securing immediate action."

Some 80 names of Lewiston business men and firms were secured.
