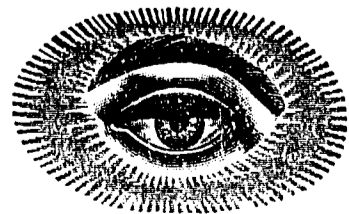
**Bang's Disease Work To Start**

It has been announced that a federal appropriation has been made to conduct work on Bang's Disease control in the State of Idaho. The federal inspector in charge advises that the starting of the work is dependent on the signing of a sufficient number of agreements by cattle owners interested in taking advantage of this project.

It is proposed to give two free tests to herds that are enrolled and indemnity will be paid to reactors found and disposed of according to federal instructions. The maximum indemnity to be paid is twenty dollars (\$20.00) for grade cattle and fifty dollars (\$50.00) for purebred.

Cattle owners interested in having their herds tested for abortion are urged to secure agreements from L. V. Benjamin, Moscow, Idaho, (the County Agent) and acquaint themselves with the requirements. Those who are willing to fulfill necessary requirements should sign the agreement and leave with Mr. Benjamin. Agreements may also be secured by writing to Dr. T. W. White, Director, Idaho Bureau of Animal Industry, Boise, Idaho, or the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry, 312 Federal Bldg., Boise, Idaho.
