Many of the desks in assembly have been refinished and a new window put in the typing room.

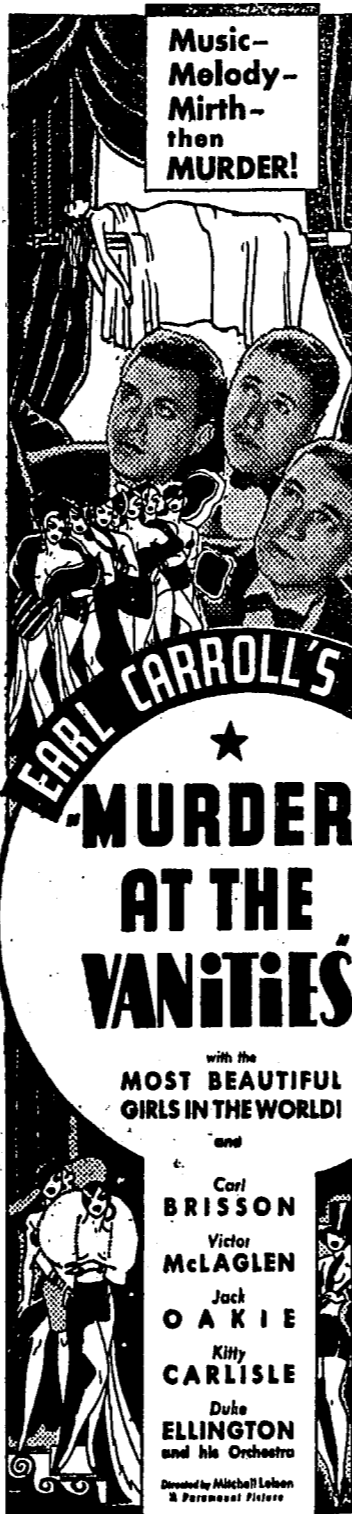

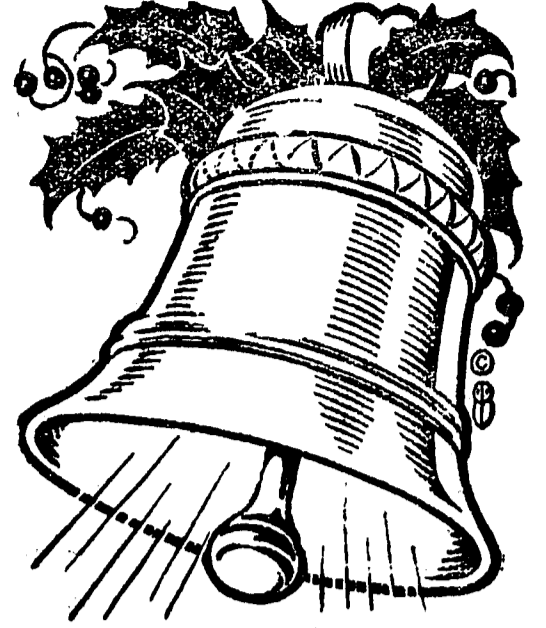

Subway To Cost \$45,000.00

Contract for the construction of the \$45,000 concrete subway beneath the railway tracks, to be built in connection with the Myrtle-Spalding highway link on the Lewis & Clark highway, is expected to be let by the Idaho bureau of public roads shortly after the first of the year, according to J. J. McCready, district engineer.

Railway engineers are now drawing plans for raising the level of the tracks three feet. This work must be done before work is started on the subway. Tentative plans for the work call for a 500-foot subway with a passageway 30 feet wide.

Completion of the work will provide an important link in the route from Lewiston up the Clearwater river.

Work is progressing on the Myrtle-Spalding link with the Max Kune company of Spokane in charge. A steam shovel has been installed and a stretch of heavy rock work along the river has been started.—Lewiston Tribune.

The above is in Nez Perce county—and so is the portion of the Ross Highway between Arrow and Kendrick that has been almost impassable since last December 22, 1933 (and for a year or so before that).

The supply of money for United States reached a new high of \$14,103,345,205 at the end of November.

Imports of approximately \$130,000,000 in gold supplied most of the increase over October's figures of \$13,919,395,014. During December the gold stock advanced another \$31,000,000.

Most of the money stock was held in the treasury and in federal reserve banks. The coin in circulation, however, was \$5,548,797,702 as compared with \$5,453,335,407 at the end of October. The per capital circulation increased over this period from \$43.05 to \$43.78.

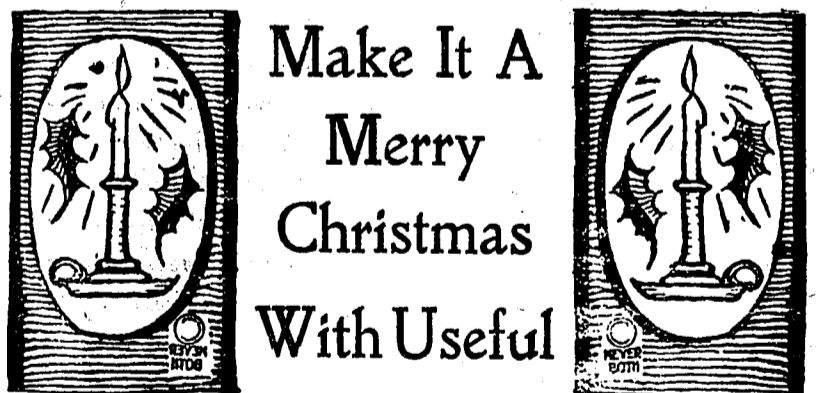
