

The army air corps prepared to fly into the new year with an expansion program which the war department asserts will give the United States an aerial armada rivalling that of any other power. Announcement by Harry H. Woodring, assistant secretary of war, of the award of a contract for 71 observation planes to the Douglas Aircraft corporation of Santa Monica, Calif., for \$1,655,394, leaves only one more award to complete the war department's \$10,000,000 purchase program for 1934. With the end of the year contracts will have been awarded for 362 planes, motsly fighting types, for replacement of obsolete or "washed out" planes. The new year will permit the air corps to begin acquisition of more than 800 additional new planes to give the army an air fleet of 2,320 serviceable machines.

Convinced the peak of the feed crisis for livestock is yet to come, the government Monday lifted the duty on Canadian hay and organized an importing organization. The farm administration announced the setting up of an "agency for deficiency distribution," established base prices to be paid Canadian farmers and maximum resale prices to American farmers, fixed maximum freight rates and proximately 200,000 tons of roughages from Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba will be shipped in North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming and Minnesota under the plan, administration officials estimated.

do. "Pressure is in this direction," he said, adding that it seems likely to continue "unless we get a great in-

crease in foreign trade." He asserted such a move might be necessary in the future to prevent non-cooperators from explanding production and nullifying the work of the 3,000,000 cooperating farmers.
