At least 36,000 persons in the U. S. were killed in automobile accidents in 1934, year-end statistics of the Travelers Insurance company ginning next July 1. showed. The death and injury list for the year, the insurance company rea port said, marked the high point in destruction on streets and highways. The record showed a person killed every 15 minutes and one injured every 31 seconds in automobile mishaps. While the death rate showed an increase of 16 per cent over 1933, the statistics showed a decrease in the frequency of accidents.

Winter wheat planted in Idaho for harvest in 1935 is estimated at 570,-000 acres by Richard C. Ross, United States Department of Agriculture statistician. This is an increase of about 10 per cent over the acreage planted in the fall of 1933, he said. 
> The San Francisco wheat market was quiet with pre-inventory duliness apparent in the limited trading. Advances in central western markets imparted a fair tone to the local situation, but prices held about unchanged. Pacific Coast barley markets were quiet but prices held steady. Trading and movement reflected the usual holiday and pre-inventory dullness. Demand for malting types was light with inquiry from middlewestern points negligible. Light remaining supplies of good malting barley in the Willamette valley were reflected in the small market offerings, with good quality malting barley quoted at \$1.85 per 100 FOB valley points. Local and nearby mixers were providing the principal outlet for feeding grades, and No. 2 bright western barley was quoted at Portland at \$1.57 per 100.


