

Discount For Taxpayers

The Idaho house of representatives last week passed a house bill 33 to 25 to provide relief for Idaho taxpayers who have paid their taxes when due and kept the government in funds.

The measure allows the taxpayer, who makes full payment of his taxes before the fourth Monday in December, to deduct 4 per cent and permits those who make a 50 per cent payment in December and pay the balance before the fourth Monday in June, a 2 per cent discount.

The bill was described by Representative Wilson, one of its sponsors, as a measure to encourage prompt settlement of tax bills and one which will serve as evidence of the state's appreciation of those who pay the state's claims promptly.



"Cooked—hell," said the puncher. "I've seen cows hurt worse than that and get well."

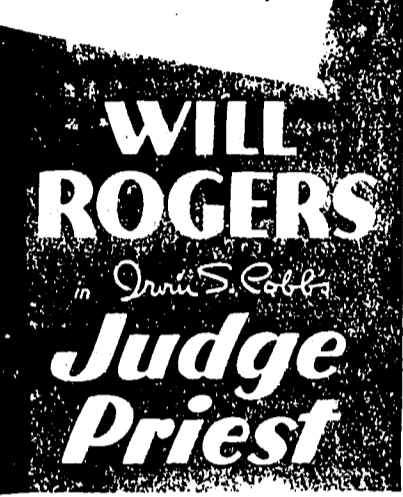
