It just seems impossible for the Administration in Washington to learn how to bring about business recovery.

Few will question the Administration's sincerity, especially the sincerity of the President in his desire to accomplish this, but unfortunately the wish to accomplish is not enough—the result is what counts.

A few months ago it looked as if the Administration had at last discovered that unless industry received some encouragement there would be little chance for permanent revival of business.

Industry has been "rarin'" to go ahead—eager to employ more workers—sincerely anxious to help bring about recovery.

But just as business men begin to feel encouraged Washington short-circuits whatever progress may have started.

Now comes the Rayburn Utility Bill backed strongly by the President—a bill so unfair that it would almost lead one to believe that it was suggested by that Louisiana "clown" Huey Long and not by the president himself.

If this bill passes, it will help destroy the investments of 10,000,000 of our citizens.

It will place control and management of privately owned properties in the hands of politicians. The utility industry employs over a million people and spends normally \$2,000,000,000 annually for wages and materials. Passage of the bill would result in a breakdown of the entire electrical industry.

Yes, the Administration says that companies which can show usefulness and freedom from bad practices shall be exempt.

What a mockery! How can companies continue to function if, as the bill reads, they may be put out of business in 1940?

This newspaper has fought for lower utility rates; however, it is the duty of the State Utility Commission to protect the public—but the government now steps in and threatens to destroy an industry which serves 100,000,000 of our people.

If Washington tried its very best to prevent recovery in business, it could not do better than to pass the Rayburn bill.

NOTICE OF KENDRICK VILLAGE ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that there will be held in the City Hall of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, on the 23rd day of April, 1935, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a. m. and 7:00 o'clock p. m. of said day, a municipal election, in accordance with Chapter 164, Title 32, of the Idaho Compiled Statutes A. D. 1919, and all acts amendatory thereto, for the purpose of electing three Village Trustees to serve for a term of four years.

That all qualified electors of the State of Idaho who have resided within the corporate limits of the said Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, for a period of three months next preceding such election, if and when properly registered according to law, shall be entitled to vote at such election.

That after an elector has registered for a general city or village election he shall not be required to again register so long as he or she shall continue to reside at the address, ward or precinct in which he is registered.

That if such elector shall fail or neglect to vote for two successive general biennial city or village elections, the clerk shall strike the name of such elector from the Elector's Register, and such elector, in order to vote at a general city or village election, must again register.

That whenever an elector shall have removed from the city or village in which he is so registered, and shall remain away from such city or village for a period of one year, his name shall be stricken from said register, and if he shall thereafter again reside in such city or village for at least thirty (30) days, he shall again register.

That the place for registration shall be at the office of the Village Clerk (Kendrick State Bank). You may register up to and including the Saturday just preceding the date of election.

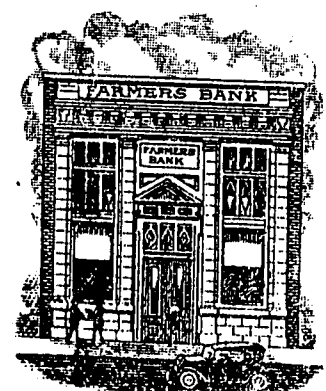
