Rye was firmer with wheat but fair new crop prospects and further offerings of foreign rye held the advance to about 41/2c per bushel. Corn strengthened with bread grains but was influenced also by light remaining supplies. Gains were less marked however, and amounted to 2c to 3c per bushel. Marketings remained light but demand for cash grain was not urgent. Oats futures advanced with wheat and corn, but prices lost ground despite light market receipts and diminishing supplies with continued dull demand and liberal offerings of foreign grains. Barley was unsettled. Futures were were slightly higher and feed grades were steady, but malting types were weak with demand slow. Flax was independently weak and declined 3c to 4c per bushel, influenced by prospects of increased seedings this spring and abundant supplies of foreign seed.
